In 1776, 56 of our finest leaders signed the first Declaration of Independence, declaring their freedom from English rule. Some 87 years later, Abraham Lincoln, looking out over the battlefield at Gettysburg, would reflect on the cost of liberty in his Gettysburg Address. In New York harbor stands the Statue of Liberty, with words of freedom inscribed on her base. In these great historic documents and symbols we see many parallels to the Christian life. The faith, commitment, and effort that brought this nation into existence is but a dim reflection of the faith, commitment, and effort required of Christians.

As the early colonists died to set America free, so Jesus died to set mankind free. He said, "If the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:36) As the colonists freed themselves from foreign domination, so Christians are free from the dominance of sin to serve their Lord and Savior. Paul reminds us, "You have been set free from sin and have become slaves of righteousness." (Romans 6:18)

Our founding fathers believed they were going "into the wilderness" to claim a land of milk and honey given by God. Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, and John Adams originally proposed that the American experience be pictured on the Great Seal by a scene of Moses crossing the Red Sea. With God's help, Moses led the people of Israel from slavery to freedom.

Fifty-six men signed a pledge risking everything, and they were soon to pay the price. As Christians, we have pledged our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor to the cause of causes – the salvation of our souls. We must be as careful to fulfill our pledge as they were. Our cause is far greater than theirs. Our resources are more dependable. Our goal is more heavenly!

Abraham Lincoln suggested the gravestones at Gettysburg should increase the devotion of the nation to the cause for which they died. Christ died that we might be made holy and free. The apostles and early Christians died that we might be heirs of the faith. The writer to the Hebrews calls our attention to those who have gone before us as an example of our spiritual devotion, "…so that you will not grow weary and lose heart." (Hebrews 12:1-3)

I stand in awe of the sacrifice others have made to preserve our heritage and all the freedoms that come because of their sacrifice. I am committed to the preservation of our government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

As concerned as I am about our nation, I am more concerned and committed to a kingdom "not of this world," whose head is Jesus Christ, my Lord and Savior. As we focus on our independence, declare your independence from the tyranny of sin. Paul reminds us, "We died to sin, how can we live in it any longer...do not let sin reign in your mortal bodies so that you obey its evil desires." (Romans 6:2, 12) Commit your lives, your fortunes, and your sacred honor to the greatest cause of all – winning the world for eternity. Give yourself fully to the unfinished task of sharing the good news. Be prepared to give that full measure of devotion, that those who have gone before shall not have died in vain.

Power washing around the campus including sidewalks, playgrounds and soffits is underway. For July, new lights will be added to the fellowship hall in the Family Life Center.



Soil Stabilization services were engaged to level the floor of the Octagon room as well as several areas around the building perimeters in places where settling left sidewalks uneven and hazardous.





Caulking was added to the perimeters of all three buildings to prevent further water intrusion under walkways.

#### Praise to You, O Christ. Alleluia.

I really had no idea what was about to happen to us when I stood near the chancel after worship one day in late November saying, "Wow. I wonder what God has in store for us now!"

All of our thoughts were already colored by pandemic, cancer, and the recent death of several parishioners. Nevertheless, hope abounded. I was happy. The worship services that day had been especially beautiful and full. We were masked, but the most vulnerable were getting vaccinated. Pastor Alan was hanging in there, and I was looking forward to watching the Lord continue to work. Susan and I had nearly finished all the service planning and preparation for Advent and Christmas.

I was gearing up to enjoy some flexibility in my schedule since I had gotten so much done ahead of time. I thought it would be a great opportunity to work on some things I had laid aside for a while. It was easy to nestle into a routine of prayer and study, singing Matins in the sanctuary in the morning and spending time in the Scriptures; easy to rattle off the Lord's Prayer, the Apostle's Creed, the Kyrie, and all the little sweet responses one retains after singing them every day. I felt secure in our faith and empowered by the Holy Spirit to go boldly. Then, my mother had a massive stroke. Covid19 rules meant we could not visit. She could not talk on the phone. Family members (who happened to be hospital volunteers) gave us insight and let us talk to her on facetime. It was clear this was bad, but my mother was stubborn and had a proclivity for suffering seemingly fatal medical events and somehow being simply fine afterwards. We held hope that this would be the same as last time.

Then she lost the ability to swallow. She was not conscious for a long time. She would respond to stimuli and seemed to have some emotional responses to things around her but no real presence. Certainly no speaking other than a word or grunt once or twice a day. She had a DNR and, given that she was not shy about telling us exactly what she wanted at all times, we knew all too well what her final wishes were.

Suddenly the week of Christmas I found myself with her in a hospice home. I've been with several people in their final days and hours before so I knew what I needed and what had to be done. A little Bluetooth speaker quietly played some of her favorite music (classic rock and Southern Gospel hymns) and I stayed with her most of the time, leaving for occasional walks and meals to give her the periodical relief and an opportunity to relax (people sometimes hold on for a long time when their loved ones are present). Feeling lost, I asked Pastor Glover what I could say to her and he reminded me that I could assure her that she was forgiven, and that there was nothing to fear, which I did.

During times such as these we feel the Spirit moving and working more easily, somehow. We all take hold of our faith and trust in it because everything else around us seems to fail to live up to the occasion. Eventually I turned the music off; even Southern Gospel hymns seemed platitudinal in contrast with the divine silence that prevailed in the last few days. A silence that brought peace to me as well most of the time.

Then, Hannah offered to come sit with me/us one evening. She figured we could leave the dogs for a certain amount of time overnight since they were used to being crated during those hours for sleep anyway. She just needed to leave by about 6:30am the next day.

In the night, Mom's breathing changed. Her feet were cold. Things that folks who have been through this that know happens, happened. It was clear that it was time. I called the nurse in to check her blood pressure, which was nonexistent. Despite the lack of blood pressure, her heart was still beating. The heart that beat for my father and for me my entire life was running its victory lap. Far be the Hollywood movie inspired peaceful death from your mind as you read this: My mother was in the Lord's hands, but her body was holding on.

What to say? What to do? Where to go? The next thing I knew my hand was on her forehead and Hannah and I are praying "Our Father, who art in Heaven..." We continued with what we have learned in worship here at Abiding Savior "I believe in God, the Father Almighty..." In the "Treasury of Daily Prayer," there is provided for us collects for many occasions, which we also prayed, saying "Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer!" between them.

The sights and sounds of that time and that place was overwhelming. When I close my eyes, I can still hear her breathing. I will never forget the look and feel of that room. In that moment it was like the earth was shaking. Perhaps it was anticipation and anxiety, though it was never fear. But of all the things I've prayed and sung in church in my thirty one years of life, it was that tried and true liturgy that sprang to my mind and mouth.

I knew that the Lord had been preparing me for something, but I didn't realize it was to minister to my own mother in her final days, hours, and minutes. As we prayed, that hospice home room that was still dark in the first light of dawn was no longer the valley of the shadow of death. It was the gate of heaven, through which that morning as we sang the Nunc Dimittis, my mother passed.

On Sunday morning it can seem to any of us depending on the day as if the liturgy of the church is a family heirloom, to be set out on display and be used for holidays and special occasions, too magnificent or stuffy for daily use. Too old to be appreciated by anyone except those who are familiar with it already.

In those final minutes with my mother, Christ was there in those words we have spoken since childhood. Hannah and I felt the support of Christ's Church as we spoke the same words we all learn in the pew. Each Sunday morning, we all hear the pastor say "And now with angels, archangels, and all the host of heaven we laud and magnify your Holy name

evermore praising you..." and we sing the Sanctus, raising our voices in unison with the choir of angels and rank upon rank of the departed saints singing praises to our God and to the Lamb. We sing at that moment with all of the faithful who are now gone from the Earth.

God's word certainly brings hope and creates faith. Our classrooms and sanctuaries are wonderful places to learn this faith, but a bed in a hospice home is a different challenge. But thanks be to God that we can find peace in what we learn day by day, week by week in our lives together. The words of the liturgy make daily contributions in us from which the fruits of hope can spring in times of trial.

The structure and timeless nature of the Church's worship calls order out of the chaos of a crisis. It perfectly provides pastoral care at the end of life, because the peace and hope it gives have been accruing for a lifetime. It is familiar, easily recalled, and theologically solid. The words recall a thousand moments in the presence of our merciful and loving Father, bringing us there again.

When we cultivate a liturgical life, we arm ourselves and our children with words ingrained with the Gospel. In times of trial, the Word of the Lord, rather than our own inner voice, is there to guide us home.

The last thing I said to my mother were words first spoken over 3400 years ago: "The Lord bless you and keep you. The Lord make his face to shine on you and be gracious to you. The Lord lift up his countenance high upon you, and give you peace."

My mother was absolutely the most difficult and stubborn person I have ever known, by far. She was not always a very good person. But the faith that was formed in her by the Holy Spirit was immaculate, and though she couldn't speak Hannah and I all but heard her word of greeting to her Heavenly Father: "Amen."

Amen!
