
FROM THE PASTOR:

Greetings in Christ!

I wanted to take my first contribution to this newsletter to introduce myself. I was born and raised in Chattanooga, Tennessee,



HARVEST *Irail Mix*

This portable snack combines favorite fall flavors.



- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- ²/₃ cup pecan pieces
- 1/3 cup roasted pumpkin seeds
- 1/3 cup almonds
- 1/4 cup raisins
- ²/₃ cup dried fruit (any)

What you do:

- 1. Microwave syrup, spices, seeds and nuts for 30 seconds at a time, stirring frequently, until mixture thickens.
- 2. Spread the mixture on a baking sheet lined with wax paper. Let cool and harden.
- 3. Break the candied nuts into chunks. Combine with dried fruit.
- 4. Store in airtight container.

Our ladies were involved in the worship service by participating as readers, ushers, and greeters. Marcia Pate and Mary Engel spoke about our ongoing projects after the 8:00 and 10:45 am services. We wish to acknowledge Cynthia Pruitt who made the beautiful corsages this year. Our thanks to our members and friends who contributed so generously to our door collection this year. Those funds will be sent to The LCMS Seminary Fund.

The LWML Yard Sale on October 21 was a great success, this year. We had the Fellowship Hall and The Sunken Room filled with sale items. We had a beautiful day and we were thankful for the favorable weather. This was a tremendous amount of work, and the proceeds totaled \$1500.00. We appreciated all the help we received from the regular attendees of our group and those who "jumped in" to help price things and organize items beforehand. We had a lot of people working that day to make it all a memorable event!

Our work at The Rose of Sharon continues with the monthly loaded baked potato lunch on the 4th Thursday of the month. We served approximately 100 lunches on October 26 and there were many

"go" orders given out for family members and children who were in need of food at home. Theresa Wilson the Director at Rose of Sharon said they will be collecting food boxes for Thanksgiving. All the traditional holiday foods, either boxed or canned, are welcome.

We ask for your prayers that a grant from the Gulf States District for \$5000.00 be approved for use

The Rose of Sharon. We applied for this grant in October and await their response. We have adopted



this facility as our local community outreach project and their stipend from a local business has now reached its end with funding. If this money is approved it's to be used for food boxes for families in need.

There is another ministry that is ongoing in LWML and is mentioned in our monthly minutes but has not received an in-depth explanation on how it serves as a blessing to our baptized children and their parents.

The Cradle Roll duties are attended to by Roberta Willenberg. She has been serving in this capacity for many years, and I recently asked her to explain how this program works, and what items families receive from their home church after their child is baptized.



Examples of items that are sent are

- pamphlets on Baptism for parents, and a Book on Baptism for the child, "Your Growing Baby" which is sent at six months.
- They receive their first birthday card and a First Baptism birthday card with a "My Bible" book about Jesus.
- At eighteen months we send "Your Growing Toddler and "My Book About the Church."
- They receive their second birthday card and Second Baptism birthday card with a "My Bible Story Book."
- At age three she sends a birthday card and a Third Baptism birthday card with a Family Devotional.

She has taken on this Cradle Roll Ministry and stayed connected with the parents of our baptized infants in order to remind them of this important sacrament. type of follow-up gives families the opportunity to reflect on their child's baptismal day and the significance of that special day in their life. All these materials are furnished through Concordia Publishing House.


BE GRATEFUL AND GIVE THANKS

I love Thanksgiving. It's time for friends, family and food. For many, it's the start of the holiday season. Just thinking about it, I can almost smell the roasting turkey.

Luke 17:11-14: Now on his way to Jerusalem, Jesus traveled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he was going into a village, ten men who had leprosy met him. They stood at a distance and called out in a loud voice, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" When he saw them, he said, "Go, show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were cleansed.

Because leprosy was contagious, people who had leprosy were required to stay away from other people and to announce their presence if they had to come near. Sometimes leprosy would go into remission. If a leper thought his leprosy had gone away, he was supposed to present himself to a priest who would declare him clean. Jesus sent 10 lepers to the priest before they were healed – and they went. They responded in

faith, and Jesus healed them on the way. Is your trust in God so strong that you act on what He says, even before you see evidence that it will work?



Luke 17:15-19: One of them, when he saw he was healed, came back, praising God in a loud voice. He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him—and he was a Samaritan. Jesus asked, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine? Has no one returned to give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well."

Not only was the man a leper, he was also a Samaritan, a race despised by the Jews as idolatrous half-breeds. Once again, Luke is pointing out that God's grace is for everyone.


Jesus healed all 10 lepers, but only one returned to thank Him. It is possible to receive God's great gifts with an ungrateful spirit – nine of the 10 men did so. Only the thankful man, however, learned that his faith had played a role in his healing. Only grateful Christians grow in understanding God's grace. God does not demand that we thank Him, but



He is pleased when we do so. And He uses our responsiveness to teach us more about Himself.

Psalm 65:1-3: Praise awaits you, our God, in Zion; to you our vows will be fulfilled. You who answer prayer, to you all people will come. When we were overwhelmed by sins, you forgave our transgressions.

Although we may feel overwhelmed by the multitude of our sins, God will forgive them all if we ask sincerely. Do you feel as though God could never forgive you, that your sins are too many, or that some of them are too great? The Good News is that God can and will forgive them all! Nobody is beyond redemption, and nobody is so full of sin that he or she cannot be made clean.



Psalm 65:4-5: Blessed are those you choose and bring near to live in your courts! We are filled with the good things of your house, of your holy temple. You answer us with awesome and righteous deeds, God our Savior, the hope of

all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas.

Access to God, the joy of living in the temple courts, was a great honor. God had chosen a special group of Israelites, the tribe of Levi, to serve as priests in the tabernacle. They were the only ones who could enter the sacred rooms where God's presence resided. Because of Jesus' death on the cross, all believers today have personal access to God's presence, everywhere and at any time.

Psalm 65:6-13: [the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas, who formed the mountains by your power, having armed yourself with strength, who stilled the roaring of the seas, the roaring of their waves, and the turmoil of the nations. The whole earth is filled with awe at your wonders; where morning dawns, where evening fades, you call forth songs of joy. You care for the land and water it; you enrich it abundantly. The streams of God are filled with water to provide the people with grain, for so you have ordained it. You drench its furrows and level its ridges; you soften it with showers and bless its crops. You crown the year with your bounty, and your carts overflow with abundance. The grasslands of the wilderness overflow; the hills are clothed with gladness. The meadows are covered with flocks and the valleys are mantled with grain; they shout for joy and sing.



This Psalm glorifies God the Creator as reflected in the beauty of nature. Nature helps us understand something of God's character. Nature was a sign of His love and provision for them. Nature shows God's generosity – giving us more we need or deserve. Understanding God's abundant generosity should make us grateful to God and generous to others.

Psalm 92:1: It is good to praise the Lord and make music to Your name, O Most High.

During the Thanksgiving holiday, we focus on our blessings and express our gratitude to God for them. But thanks should be on our lips every day. We can never say thank you enough to parents, friends, leaders and especially God. When thanksgiving becomes an integral part of our lives, we will find that our attitude toward life will change. We will become more positive, gracious, loving and humble.

But what is Thanksgiving all about? Feeling thankful is not enough, nor the counting of blessings. Thanksgiving is more than full stomachs and personal satisfaction. What satisfied the psalmist? To be in the house of the Lord - not just to feel thankful, but to give thanks to the God of creation, the Lord of our salvation. At life's end, all we will have to offer is our thanks. Ten lepers were cleansed, but only one returned to Jesus to give thanks. So today, let us thank God for house and home, family, friends and our very own lives. Then let us move toward the Eucharist, which is the feast of thanksgiving. With Mary, we can be thankful that God fills the hungry with good things and sends the rich away empty (See Luke 1:53). Whether or not our tables or plates are full, rejoice in the things that endure. Like the leper, we have been cleansed. Nine lepers felt



thankful, one returned to Jesus and offered the sacrifice of thanksgiving, the stuff of the Eucharist. See you in church.




Make Today Wonderful

For the wonder of each hour of the day and of the night, hill and vale and tree and flower, sun and moon and stars of light, [Refrain]





KEEP YOUR EYES ON JESUS

"Lord, if it's you," Peter replied,
"tell me to come to you on the
water." "Come," he said. Then
Peter got down out of the boat,
walked on the water and came
toward Jesus. But when he saw
the wind, he was afraid and,
beginning to sink, cried out,
"Lord, save me!" Immediately
Jesus reached out his hand and
caught him. "You of little
faith," he said, "why did you
doubt?"
Matthew 14:28-31

With everything that's going on in the world and in this country right now, it's easy for us Christians to take our eyes off Jesus and focus on what's happening all around us. Like Peter, when we see the waves and feel the wind, when we focus on the problems, the dangers lurking around us, it's easy to become afraid.



To Peter's credit, unlike the other disciples, he was willing to get out of the safety of the boat and trust in Jesus to have the water hold him up. Only when he got distracted, when he took his eyes off Jesus, when he saw the danger all around him, did his faith fail

him. Even then, he made the right choice and called out to Jesus to save him.



Although he ultimately came up short, there is much we can learn from Peter. First, it took great faith for Peter to get out of the boat and walk on the water. Under the same circumstances, is your faith so strong that you would have followed his example? Second, as long as he kept his eyes on Jesus, Peter was able to walk on top of the water. So, not only did Peter have the faith to step out of the boat, but he also had the faith to walk on the water. However, even with that faith, Peter eventually took his eyes off Jesus and saw the danger lurking around him. His faith then faltered, and he began to sink. However, even as his situation worsened, he knew who to call out to, who could save him.

Despite exhibiting what I think is great faith, when he faltered, Jesus faulted Peter for having "little faith" and having doubt rather than trusting completely in Him. When I read this story, I wonder what Jesus would consider a strong faith. What could someone with a strong faith do? If walking on water, albeit eventually



sinking, is an example of little faith, then what could someone with a strong faith who keeps his eyes on Jesus do?

We so often set our sights very low. We expect so little from God that we are not truly expecting Him to do anything for us. This is not trusting in Jesus. This is not faith. This is doubt. This is hanging back in the boat and letting others try to walk on the water. This is failing without even trying.

With God nothing impossible. Most of us have heard that statement since we were young. But do we believe it? Do we pay lip service to Jesus, to what He has done and can do, but are reluctant to put those words into action in our lives? we hang back and let others be missionaries, be royal priests, be God's ambassadors to a fallen world?

Jesus Christ is the almighty God, the creator of the universe and everything in it. Obviously, if He created this incredible universe, which is so vast that we can't really comprehend it, then anything we ask Him, if consistent with His will, He will surely do. Therefore, why do we expect so little? Why do we offer up prayers hoping that He hears us, hoping that He will answer our petitions, rather than trusting that not only does He hear us, but that He wants to help us?

God loves us so much that Jesus became man, that He lived a perfect life among us for 33 years, that He took on the punishment for our sins by suffering and dying on a cross for us! This is truly incredible. The omnipotent, omniscient Jesus died for us! Why He did this, when we are such miserable sinners, so full of filth, so totally undeserving of His love, His mercy, and His grace, is beyond my comprehension. But He did!



He gave up everything for us! If the all-powerful God was willing to do this for us, surely He will be with us when we endeavor to do His will.

So, let's not be cowards. Let's not be quiet out of fear. Let's not be afraid to share our faith, to tell others what we believe, even if doing so may come with some risk. Jesus loves us and has shown us that love by His actions, by His atoning sacrifice. So, let's be brave. Let's reflect the love of Jesus to those around us.
