designation of "Lead Teacher." According to DHR regulations, there must be a second in command for those times the director is unavailable. We have a call committee in place that has started meeting after receiving the necessary information from the district.

Does that mean that all the bases are covered – not in the least. We are constantly in need of more teachers and subs. Our



Toddler Two teacher is retiring on January 31. Although Amy has agreed to another day, we still need someone to be here on Thursday and Friday mornings. That's where each of you step in and step up. Will any of you be willing to serve in a volunteer or paid position at the CDC? We are willing to train new employees. We can use baby rockers. Please let Charla, or Susan Bridges know.

The church is being served by a very competent group of servant leaders, who take their roles seriously. They are looking at both short-term and long-term initiatives. A leadership retreat is in the planning stages after being absent for many years. Our youth are planning to attend the National Youth Gathering in July. Vacation Bible school has been set for July 7-10. The materials to be used are entitled "True North."

There have been and will be many improvements to the physical aspect of the campus. The beams have been repaired. The air conditioning in the east end of the building has been replaced. The windows in the sanctuary are being replaced. The roof of both the sanctuary and remainder of the building is under study. An HVAC unit in the CDC is currently being replaced. We are in the planning stages of building a school age playground to be used by the congregation, CDC, and home school group, as well.



THE EFFICACIOUS WORD OF GOD

And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. (Gen 1:3) And God said, "Let there be ..." (Gen 1:6a, 14a) And God said, "Let the ..." (Gen 1:9a, 11a, 20a, 24a) And God said, "Let Us make man ..." (Gen 1:26a)

The Word of God is incredibly powerful. Genesis 1 describes how the entire universe and everything in it was created by the spoken words of God. This is the ultimate definition of the word "efficacy" (and "efficacious," its adjective form), which Merriam-Webster defines as "the power to produce an effect."



The spoken Word of God had the power to create the entire universe out of nothing. Talk about producing an effect, creating everything out of nothing!

For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart. (Hebrews 4:12)

We might describe the writing of a good author as exciting and page-turning; we might even go so far as to say he makes the story he has written "come alive". However, that is a pale comparison to the description of the Word of God in Hebrews. The Word of God doesn't simply make the scriptures "come alive" (which it does). The Word of God is itself "alive and active" and

able to penetrate the soul of the listener/hearer. While other writings might be "inspirational", none of them can penetrate our souls, can judge our thoughts and our attitudes, can bring us to our knees in repentance. Only the efficacious Word of God can have this effect.


While the words spoken by God can do miraculous things, like creating the universe, the written Word of God (or the written Word of God spoken by one of us) is also powerful, is also capable of miraculous things. The power of God's Word, even when simply read or spoken by flawed humans, is still efficacious, is still capable of penetrating the souls of the readers/listeners and producing the desired effect of converting their hearts.

"So is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it. (Isaiah 55:11)

The passage above from Isaiah is pretty much the Biblical definition of "efficacy." God's Word does not come back to Him empty-handed. It accomplishes whatever God desires. It achieves the purpose for which God sent it. This is what "Biblical efficacy" is, the "power of the Word of God to produce the effect that God desires."

So what does this mean for you and me? In the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20), God commanded us to teach all nations, to baptize them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. So how do we do this? Perhaps even more importantly, how do we do this efficaciously? How do we reach others in such a way that their hearts/souls might be stirred to life? All of us know people that aren't saved, that don't believe and trust in Jesus as their Lord and Savior. How do we reach these people? What can we say or do that might convert them?



While we are all expected to be able to give a defense (an apology) of what we believe, using logical reasoning (apologetics) to defend our faith is unlikely to lead others to saving faith (although it can help overcome their barriers to openly listening). For them to be converted we need to share the efficacious Word of God and trust in God that His Word will accomplish what He desires. We can do no more. Our arguments will not change them. The exercising of our will to convert them will not work. Nothing we do by the force of our personality can stir their spirit. Only the efficacious Word of God can accomplish this. Therefore, for our evangelism to be effective, we must (simply) share the Word of God and trust in His Word to do what He desires. A good example of this was the most recent Christmas Eve service. This service typically has the most visitors and infrequently attending members of any service during the year.



Lessons and Carols

In the latest Christmas Eve service, Pastor Waffel read nine passages from the Bible starting with the fall into sin, going through the Messianic prophecies and the birth of Jesus and ending with the beautiful words of John 1. This is a good example of sharing God's Word and trusting in its efficacy. Regardless of whether anyone's souls were stirred that night, whether anyone was awakened spiritually, Pastor Waffel did exactly what he should have. He shared the Word of God and trusted that it would accomplish that for which God intended.

We should do the same. Next time the opportunity arises to share your faith, quote some passages from the Bible, preferably some that include Law and, for sure, several that include the wonderful Gospel that Jesus died for our sins!


SHARE SEEDS OF LOVE AND WATCH BLESSINGS GROW


The word "love" is probably the most used and least understood word in any language. Jesus Christ came to demonstrate the meaning of true love when He willingly gave His life for all humanity. He took our punishment upon Himself to redeem us from our sinfulness. As He said, "*Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends.*" John 15:13. True love involves making sacrifices for the sake of another. It is tolerant, patient, and understanding, even in the most trying circumstances. It involves making sacrifices, forgiving and giving of yourself for the benefit of others. It means to love others as Jesus loves you.

GOD'S CROOKED LINES

Before the days of the GPS, it happened that someone setting out on a journey



would make a wrong turn and end up in a different location than planned. The interesting aspect of these wrong turnings is how many led to better-thanexpected outcomes – a better view, a better restaurant, or a serendipitous meeting that led to a wedding. Even when a wrong turn means a sinful choice, repentance can be used by God to bring about good. The psalmist prays, "Save me for the sake of Your steadfast love" (Psalm 6:4), not for my sake, but to show forth the mercy of God.



<u>Genesis 50:15-21</u>: "When Joseph's brothers saw that their father was dead, they said, "It may be that Joseph will hate us and pay us back for all the evil that we did to him." So they sent a message to Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this command before he died: 'Say to Joseph, "Please forgive the transgression of your brothers and their sin, because they did evil to you."' And now, please forgive the transgression of the servants of the God of your father." Joseph wept when

they spoke to him. His brothers also came and fell down before him and said, "Behold, we are your servants." But Joseph said to them, "Do not fear, for am I in the place of God? As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today. So do not fear; I will provide for you and your little ones." Thus he comforted them and spoke kindly to them."

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Joseph demonstrated how God graciously accepts us even though we do not deserve it. Now that Jacob was dead, the brothers feared revenge from Joseph. Could he really have forgiven them for selling him into slavery? But to their surprise, Joseph not only forgave them, but also reassured them, offering to care for them and their families. Joseph's forgiveness was complete. He demonstrated how God graciousness accepts us, even though we do not deserve it. Because God forgives us when we have ignored or rejected Him, we should graciously forgive others. God

brought good from the brothers' evil deed. Potiphar's wife's false accusation, the cupbearer's neglect and seven years of famine – the experiences in Joseph's life taught him that God brings good from evil for those who trust Him

because, as Joseph learned, God can overrule people's evil intentions to bring about His intended results.

MERCY

<u>Genesis 8:21-22</u>: "And when the Lord smelled the pleasing aroma, the Lord said in his heart, "I will never again curse the ground because of man, for the intention of man's heart is evil from his youth. Neither will I ever again strike down every living creature as I have done. While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease."

<u>Deuteronomy 4:31</u>: "For the Lord your God is a merciful God. He will not leave you or destroy you or forget the covenant with your fathers that he swore to them."

<u>Nehemiah 9:31</u>: "Nevertheless, in your great mercies you did not make an end of them or forsake them, for you are a gracious and merciful God."

Exodus 33:19: "And he said, "I will make all my goodness pass before you and will proclaim before you my name 'The Lord.' And I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy."

<u>2 Samuel 24:14</u>: "Then David said to Gad, "I am in great distress. Let us fall into the hand of the Lord, for his mercy is great; but let me not fall into the hand of man."

<u>Psalm 6</u>

"O Lord, rebuke me not in your anger, nor discipline me in your wrath. Be gracious to me, O Lord, for I am languishing; heal me, O Lord, for my bones are troubled. My soul also is greatly troubled. But you, O Lord—how long? Turn, O Lord, deliver my life; save me for the sake of your steadfast love. For in death there is no remembrance of you; in Sheol who will give you praise? I am weary with my moaning; every night I flood my bed with tears; I drench my couch with my weeping. *My eye wastes away because of grief;* it grows weak because of all my foes. Depart from me, all you workers of evil, for the Lord has heard the sound of my weeping. The Lord has heard my plea; the Lord accepts my praver. All my enemies shall be ashamed and greatly troubled; they shall turn back and be put to shame in a moment."



David accepts God's punishment, but he begged God not to discipline him in anger. Jeremiah also asked God to correct him gently and not in anger. David recognized that if God treated him with justice alone and not with mercy, he would be wiped out by God's wrath. Often, we want God to show mercy to us and justice to everyone else. God, in His kindness (and love), forgives us instead of giving us what we deserve.

Pouring out his heart with tears, David was completely honest with God. We can be honest with God even when we are filled with anger or despair because God knows us thoroughly and wants the very best for us. Anger may result in rash outward acts or turning inward in depression, but because we trust in our all-powerful God, we do not have to be victims of circumstance or be weighed down by the guilt of sin. Be honest with God and He will draw your attention from yourself to Him and His mercy.

The story of Joseph demonstrates God creating straight paths from crooked lines. Joseph's brothers, consumed by jealousy, sold him to a caravan of traders and told their father that he was dead. Joseph was taken to Egypt where his life included betrayal by the wife of his owner and imprisonment. Yet Joseph never doubted God's ability to make things right. Joseph's administrative brilliance, along with his gift of dreaming, put him in charge during a famine and enabled him to save the lives of his brothers and their families. Joseph recognized the hand of God in his life and forgave his brothers. Joseph's path, which saved the people of Israel, leads us to Jesus, who saves us from slavery to sin. God is able to make all things right.

FROM THE PASTOR:



A slightly different topic came up in the course of conversation during the Sunday adult Bible class a few weeks ago: the practice of individual confession and absolution in the Lutheran church. There were some mixed views: some people there said "Oh yeah, I remember my parents doing that when I was young," or one or two even said, "I've done that

in the past," while others said something more like, "Really? I didn't think we did that; that's so Catholic." So a few people suggested I share more about the Lutheran view and practice of this.



First, it is certainly an acceptable thing in the Lutheran tradition to practice individual or private confession. It is found in Scripture, such as John 20:23 or James 5:16. I believe it used to be a lot more common, but seems to have rapidly dropped off during the last few generations. In fact, confession is one of the six chief parts of the Small Catechism!

But there are some important differences from how it's practiced in the Roman Catholic church, or the popular view you might see in movies or TV. In the Lutheran church, nobody is ever required to go to confession. It is understood as an opportunity you get to take advantage of in a

time of need, never an obligation or a burden. The Catechism says, "Before God we should plead guilty of all sins... but before the pastor we should confess only those sins which we know and feel in our hearts." The purpose is the Gospel: if you feel weighed down by something on your conscience, by guilt or shame, and you want to get it off your chest – then hear the words of Christ's forgiveness spoken, not just as a general reminder or abstract idea, but in a direct, personal, concrete way. Yes, God still loves *you* and God forgives you even of *that*!

The purpose is the Gospel, not the Law. While a Lutheran pastor may give counsel or advice, there are no conditions placed on God's grace; there is no penance to be done, no "say fifty Hail Marys" or anything like that. Galatians 6 says, "Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness. Keep watch on yourself, lest you too be tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

If you feel burdened by your past, by a sin, by anything, you do not have to bear it alone. And it is absolutely confidential; in many ways, confessing a failure to another person is harder than it is doing in prayer to God, but one of

the vows an LCMS pastor takes at ordination includes "never to divulge the sins confessed to you."


A couple of those folks in Bible class asked about the possibility of having some specific times set aside for that purpose. Of course, anybody is always free to come and talk to me while I'm in the office, or set up a time with me to make sure I'll be there, for this or for any other reason – but if there are members of the congregation who desire it, I'm happy to set aside an hour or two during the week to be available for this. In fact, as the season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 5 this year, Lent is a wonderful time for this; it is a season historically focused on repenting and returning to the Lord, a "spiritual spring cleaning." So if you're interested, look for such times set up during Lent.

This is what Christian faith is all about: from 2 Corinthians 5,

"All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the *ministry of reconciliation;* that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God."

The only solution for sin is not ignoring or explaining it away; it is in facing it head-on, helping bear one another's burdens, in order to rejoice in the grace, forgiveness and reconciliation of Christ.

INFORMATION ON CPR/AED TRAINING



Bottom Line - if you're interested in taking a class to get comfortable with using the defibrillator and administering CPR, we'll need your name and phone number, time of day you can attend (morning/evening/Sunday School hour) and whether you're interested in doing the CPR portion of the class or just checking out the AED unit.

In case you haven't noticed them yet, we have two new defibrillator machines in the church (and I think one is going to be installed at the CDC, at some point in the future). One is located in the Narthex along the west wall before entering the sanctuary; the other is on the east wall of the Fellowship Hall. At this point, the one in the Fellowship Hall has pads for adults, babies and children; the one in the Narthex has pads only for adults. We are getting pads for little ones so that both locations have the ability to be used and also a couple of masks that will fit adult faces. The ones included in the unit are fairly small.

While the AED is set up for *anyone* to use this without much information on how to use it - since it "talks" you through the entire process - there are some things that might help save a life if

the person is not jump-started by simply pressing the button. There is a possibility the AED will tell you to start CPR and it cannot do that for you.

With that in mind, I happen to know a paramedic (or two), one of whom is also a firefighter, and they are willing to come and demonstrate the machine before it starts telling you what to do without any practice, and also instruct you in basic CPR so that you do know how to do that if it is necessary.

They can also show you how to assist an infant, child and adult if there is a time when choking is involved.

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Contact the church office (or email me) if you're interested and there will be a sign-up sheet to put down your preferences. Dates and times will then be announced and we'll go from there. The cost for the CPR training will be paid for, so this is a deal - for a worthwhile cause.
