EFLECTION

"O sons and daughters of the King, whom heavenly hosts in glory sing, today the grave has lost its sting! Alleluia!" Thus begins one of our Easter hymns, number 471 in LSB. Perhaps nothing sums up the meaning of Easter for us better and more succinctly than that sentence. Because of Jesus and his resurrection, you are now a son or daughter of the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, born again to new life in the water and Spirit of baptism. Because of Jesus and his resurrection, death is now nothing to fear; the resurrection makes it irrelevant and powerless. Why fear death when your Lord has already proven that he can (and promised he will) reverse and undo and defeat it?



This is what sets Christians apart from everyone else, and what the message of the Gospel has to offer. It is a radical reorientation of how we view the entire world! What seems the most intractable, permanent, unavoidable part of life - the end of life - is no longer permanent or intractable. What a gift, and what a message! The refrain of Easter is "Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia!" and because he is risen, He will raise you too. You too are a son or a daughter of the King.

We are called to live our entire life in the light of the Resurrection – both that of Jesus, and that of our own. What a wonderful message of light and hope to share! There is no wrong time to invite someone to church or speak about this hope, but the Easter season is perhaps the most appropriate time of all. This is, after all, what it's all about: Jesus, true God and true human, who died for the forgiveness of our sins and rose from the dead for our eternal life. Invite those you know to share in this joy and this joyful season! This year is quite a "late" Easter, falling almost as late in the calendar as it can, but it is never too late while this life lasts for someone to come to Christ.

Throughout the season of Easter, our schedule of readings during worship changes: instead of an Old Testament reading, we have passages from the book of Acts. This helps reinforce our connection with our ancient predecessors in faith in the early Church, one Body of Christ together. We also witness the ever-expanding circles of inclusion in God's plan and Kingdom, sharing in the commission given to the Apostles: make disciples. As you have been a disciple, a student, an apprentice of Jesus, now be sent out as apostle to share what you have. "Sons and Daughters of the King" goes on to talk about Thomas' experience and Jesus' response to him; Jesus truly did rise from the dead, and this is good news for all to believe. May we share the prayer of the early believers from Acts 4:29, "grant to your servants to continue to speak your word with all boldness.' Rev. Derek Waffel

have all had food for thought, known as "soul food." All are welcome to attend the last two Midweek services before Holy Week.




Palm Sunday is April 13, which begins Holy Week. The highlights of this week are seen in the graphic above, from palm branches to a Passover meal celebrated by the disciples and Jesus, to the crown, the cross and the grave. Just so you know, if you're a two-times-a-year church attender, you're missing a lot of precious time that you could use to become very emotional and fall in love with Jesus.

Easter morning, bright and early (6:00 AM), will take you to the Garden when three women came to anoint the body of Jesus, who had been dead three days. It's hard to *really* imagine that morning since we've heard the story since

RIDE ON TO DIE

"And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose."

Romans 8:28

God works in all things - not just isolated incidents - for our good. This does not mean that all that happens to us will be pleasant, and we do not have to call pain good. God is able to turn every circumstance around for our longrange benefit. Note that God does not work only to make us happy, but to fulfill His purpose. Note, also, that this promise is not for everybody; it can be claimed only by those who love God and are called by Him – that is, those the Holy Spirit convinces and enables to receive Christ. Such people have a new perspective and a new mindset. They trust in God, not in life's treasures. They find their security in heavenly priorities, not earthly ones. Their faith in Christ does not waver in pain and persecution because they know that God is with them.



THE TRIUMPHANT ENTRY

Now when they drew near to Jerusalem and came to Bethphage, to the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, you shall say, 'The Lord needs them,' and he will send them at once." This took place to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet,

saying,

"Say to the daughter of Zion,

'Behold, your king is coming to you,

humble, and mounted on a donkey,

on a colt the foal of a beast of burden."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and put on them their cloaks, and he sat on them. Most of the crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" And when he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up, saying, "Who is this?" And the crowds said, "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth of Galilee."

Stewardship (Continued)

Matthew mentions a donkey and a colt, while the other Gospels mention only the colt. This was the same event but Matthew focused on the prophecy in Zachariah 9:9, where a donkey and a colt are mentioned. He shows how Jesus' actions fulfilled the prophet's words. thus giving another indication that Jesus was, indeed, the Messiah. When Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey's colt, He affirmed His Messianic royalty, as well as His humility. On the practical side, what better way to lead an unbroken colt for its first ride down a crowded road than to have its mother with it?

Matthew 21:8 is one of the few places where the Gospels record that Jesus' glory is recognized on earth. Jesus boldly rode as the King of Peace and the crowd gladly joined Him. But these same people would bow to political pressure and desert Him in just a few days. Today, we celebrate this event on Palm Sunday. That day should remind us to guard against superficial acclaim for Christ.

Earthly kings never turn out the way we hope. Old Testament Israel begged God for an earthly king, but God was their King.



Earthly kings will always disappoint because they are descendants of fallen Adam. Even Israel's great earthly king, David, confessed, "For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me." (Psalm 51:3)

Psalm 118:19-29

"Open to me the gates of righteousness,
that I may enter through them
and give thanks to the Lord. This is the gate of the Lord;
the righteous shall enter through it.
I thank you that you have answered me
and have become my salvation.



The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone.

This is the Lord's doing; it is marvelous in our eyes.

This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Save us, we pray, O Lord!

O Lord, we pray, give us success!

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!

We bless you from the house of the Lord.

The Lord is God,

and he has made his light to shine upon us.

Bind the festal sacrifice with cords,

up to the horns of the altar!

You are my God, and I will give thanks to you;

you are my God; I will extol you.

Oh give thanks to the Lord, for he is good;

for his steadfast love endures forever!"

Now all eyes are on Jesus. Gabriel had told Mary that her child would be the Son of the Most High and His kingdom would have no end. The Wise Men asked, "Where is He who had been born King of the Jews? For we saw His star when it rose and have come to worship Him." (Matthew 2:2)

Stewardship (Continued)

There are days when the last thing we want to do is rejoice. Our mood is down, our situation is out of hand, and our sorrow or guilt is overwhelming. We can relate to the writers of the Psalms who often felt this way. But no matter how low the writers felt, they were always honest with God. As they talked to God, their prayers ended in praise. When we don't feel like rejoicing, we should tell God how we truly feel. We will find that God will give us a reason to rejoice. God has given us this day to live and to serve Him and be glad.

On Palm Sunday (The Sunday of the Passion), we remember when Jesus entered Jerusalem. There was so much hope in this King! Cheers swelled: "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord!" Would this King be everything they hoped for?

Jesus, God of the flesh, is the King of kings. He does not disappoint us because He is the King we truly need. God humbled Himself, coming to earth to save us. He rode on to die to take on the sins of kings and servants, Jews and Gentiles, you and me. He entered

Jerusalem, not to ascend a throne, but to ascend the cross. There, He crowned us with forgiveness of sins, life and salvation.

Christ requires His followers to be faithful. He Himself demonstrated faithfulness when He sacrificed His life on the cross. When Christ asks us to be faithful to death, He also promises a divine and royal reward – eternal life.

It is easy to be faithful when life is exciting and we are in the spotlight, but we need to be faithful when the monotonous routine of everyday duties begins to wear us down. We should be faithful when no one sees us because God sees us.

Be faithful to what is must noble in yourself. Shakespeare said, "To thine own self be true, and it must follow, as the night the day, thou canst not then be false in any man."

Above all, we should be faithful to God. He is the foundation and the source of all that is good in our lives. Without Him, life has no meaning.

Deuteronomy 7:9: "Know therefore that the Lord your God is God, the faithful God who keeps covenant and steadfast love with those who love him and keep his commandments, to a thousand generations."

Proverbs 20:6: "Many a man proclaims his own steadfast love, but a faithful man who can find?"

Lamentations 3:22-23: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness."

Matthew 25:21: "His master said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master.'"

2 Thessalonians 3:3: "But the Lord is faithful. He will establish you and guard you against the evil one."

Adam and Eve tried to hide their sin. Lord, we often do the same. They were invited to confess their sin, be clothed by You with an appointed sacrifice and rejoice in Your promise of the Messiah, which would crush Satan's headship over them. In this Lenten season, may we confess our sin, be clothed in Christ's righteousness and know the victory in Christ crucified for us. Amen.




STATIONS OF THE CROSS EASTER EGG HUNT

THE JOY OF FORGIVENESS

"When Jesus had received the sour wine, he said, "It is finished," and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit."

John 19:30, ESV

When Jesus announced on the cross that "It is finished," He indicated that His mission in life had been completed, that He had finished bearing on the cross the Father's righteous anger against sinful man, that He had claimed victory over sin, death and the devil, that He had finished the task of salvation and had opened the Kingdom of Heaven to all who believed in Him. These three words say it all. The job was done, the victory complete, the atoning sacrifice of the Lamb of God finished.

While these words brought an end to the excruciating agony of the cross and were said immediately before Jesus' death, they are, to me, perhaps my favorite words in the entire Bible. "It is finished." Jesus has borne on the cross the punishment for my sins, so I no longer must suffer for them. "It is finished." Jesus has traded His perfection for my filthy life. "It is finished." My salvation has been accomplished. "If is finished." My sins are forgiven. "It is finished."

The Kingdom of Heaven has been opened to miserable sinners like me. "It is finished." It's over. Done. The war has been won. The devil has lost.

Hearing these words almost

brings me to tears. Not tears of sadness that Jesus had humiliated Himself by becoming man, had lived a perfect, sinless life, only to be unfairly condemned, mocked, scorned and beaten ruthlessly, and ultimately hung on a tree to die like a common criminal. Instead, tears of joy. Like winning the lottery, only many times better. Like the best day of my life, only greatly amplified. Like a condemned man given a last second pardon. What God has done is beyond comprehension. Why would the all-powerful Creator of the universe humble Himself for miserable creatures like us? The horrific pain of being mercilessly flogged, the intense agony of hanging on the cross, the grotesque shame of being publicly crucified, the unimaginable suffering of His Father placing the sins of all mankind on Him and forsaking Him in His final hour, all these things He did for us. Why? His love for us must be beyond measure, that's the only explanation that makes sense. We certainly don't deserve any of it.

"It is finished." The work of salvation is complete. The state of humiliation is over. The state of exaltation begins. Jesus, the sacrificial Lamb of God led to the slaughter on the cross is now Jesus, the Savior and Lord of all. Our Lord and our Savior. Our hope. Our salvation. Our Redeemer. Our King, now and forever.

As we observe Holy Week, the Maundy Thursday celebration of Passover and the institution of Holy Communion, the Good Friday suffering and death of our Lord and Savior, and the Easter celebration of Jesus' resurrection in glory, let's remember what Jesus, what God, has done for us. Let's remember the interest level He has for us. Let's



the intense love He has for us. Let's celebrate the joy of the forgiveness won for us on Calvary!

And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Mark 15:34

Ah, dearest Jesus,
what law has Thou broken,
that such sharp sentence
should on Thee be spoken?
Of what great crime hast Thou to
make confession what dark transgression?

Do you remember singing that as a child in church? I remember singing that particular verse quite well, although I'm not sure why. Something in the words must have grabbed me and they stuck in my memory. The rest of the 15 verses, not so much, although while reading through them *now*, I resonate with most of them. That must be experience and wisdom showing me things I couldn't understand back then.

What punishment
so strange is suffered yonder!
The Shepherd dies
for sheep that loved to wander;
The Master pays
the debt His servants owe Him,
who would not know Him.

When one thinks of it, who in the world would take a beating and be broken and bloody for someone else? As a parent, one would maybe be vocal about trying to save a child from a punishment that they deserve, but to lay down your life? To give up *your* life that they may or may not appreciate it? Okay, maybe for your very favorite child, but for the people of the whole world, even those (which is most of them) that you don't know? Incomprehensible.

The sinless Son of God must die in sadness; The sinful child of man may live in gladness; Man forfeited his life and is acquitted; God is committed.

O, wondrous love, whose depth no heart hath sounded, That brought Thee here, by foes and thieves surrounded! All worldly pleasures, heedless, I was trying While Thou wert dying.

Jesus had a mission before the world began, right? He was the One who would "fix" what had yet to be broken. He was the One who loved us so deeply who hadn't yet been born. And He was the One who would suffer His own Father's desertion, who would go into the depths of Hell to break the chains that would hold us there if not for Him.

There was no spot in me by sin untainted; Sick with sin's poison, all my heart had fainted; My heavy guilt to hell had well-nigh brought me, Such woe it wrought me.

"And in the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

Why did You forsake Him, God? How could You forsake Him? Your heart must have been breaking, too. How could it not? Do we understand; even more, do *I* understand? Of course not. That must have been on our Savior's mind when He struggled with the nails and the thorns and the piercing of His skin while hanging on the cross.
