

#### THE INSPIRATION OF ST. GERASIMOS



On October 20<sup>th</sup> we celebrated the feast of Saint Gerasimos of Cephalonia. I had the opportunity in the Summer of 2016 to visit the church of this saint while traveling with the campers from Ionian Village. I remember going down to the cave where the saint spent much of his time. As we came down the stairs we saw others from our group that were waiting to come up. They were breathing heavily because there is not much air in the cave and it quickly becomes uncomfortable to breathe.

There is a second and even smaller cave that you get into by crawling through a small hole. At first the hole almost looks too small to get through. We made it through and had a brief moment inside because it was still hard to breathe and there were others waiting to en-

ter.

It was quite an experience and the whole time I kept thinking, how did Saint Gerasimos spend so much time down here? It would take great inner strength not to feel anxious from the lack of oxygen and not to feel claustrophobic. Reflecting on this experience and relating it to our lives leads me to the following question. Don't we all have feelings of anxiety and often times feel like the pressures of our lives are closing in on us, so that we can hardly breathe?

This is true and the way that we can overcome these fears is by resting in the presence of God. I suppose that Saint Gerasimos, being in the presence God, was not anxious living in that space. Now, I don't know that we should all find such a cave, but I do know that we all need to find a quiet place where we can quiet ourselves and feel the presence of God and allow Him to take up our burdens.

When I was a seminarian I remember a particular moment that changed me. I was walking from my room toward the chapel and I crossed paths with Bishop Gerasimos of Abydos who lived with the students at that time. I was a young man and he was an old man. As I passed him I heard him say faintly, "You walk like an old man". I quickly realized that I was carrying the weight of all my burdens and they were crushing me. I knew immediately that I had to give my worries over to God and allow Him to be my strength.


All these years later I remember Bishop Gerasimos of Abydos whenever I begin to feel over-whelmed and I remember the need to rest in the presence of God. It is important to keep in mind the words of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew 11: 28-30, "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly of heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light."

In the Gospel of Mark (1:32-39) after an evening of healing the sick and casting out demons, Jesus gets up early in the morning before dawn and finds a solitary place to pray. Our Lord gives us a beautiful example of taking time to pray that He might gather his strength to carry forward to the next towns to preach.

Reflecting on this passage in Mark, Henri Nouwen offers the following that I think is a help-ful in closing, "Somewhere we know that without a lonely place our lives are in danger. Somewhere we know that without silence words lose their meaning, that without listening speaking no longer heals, that without distance closeness cannot cure. Somewhere we know that without a lonely place our actions quickly become empty gestures. The careful balance between silence and words, withdrawal and involvement, distance and closeness, solitude and community forms the basis of the Christian life and should therefore be the subject of our most personal attention."

#### ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE TO THE ONE WHO BELIEVES IN CHRIST

lacksquare aving faith can be difficult. Keeping faith in the face of doubt is the ongoing struggle of every Chris-the Apostle, forever remembered as "Doubting Thomas" because he doubted the first reports of the Resurrected Christ.

In the Gospel of Mark (9:22 NKJV), we read that when the disciples can't help him, a father brings his epileptic son to Jesus in desperation, saying, "...if you can do anything, have compassion on us and help us." Jesus replies to the father's lack of faith, "If you can believe, all things are possible to him who believes." The father's response is a prayer we can pray every day: "Lord, I believe; help my unbelief!"

Faith is our trust in God. Faith is our trust that He watches over us and has a plan for us: "For I know the thoughts that I think toward you, says the Lord, thoughts of peace and not of evil, to give you a future and a hope" (Jeremiah 29:11 NKJV). Living with the uncertainty of daily life requires faith. Uncertainty also invites doubt. But doubt does not indicate a lack of faith. As theologian and philosopher Paul Tillich


has written, "Doubt is not the opposite of faith; it is one element of faith." Doubt is a part of our journey of faith. We need to face our doubt honestly and directly.

Faith is often accompanied by struggle with doubt. Doubt instills humility. Doubt motivates us to learn and to grow. In spite of his doubt, the Apostle Thomas remained open to the truth of the Resurrection. When he saw the Risen Christ, he immediately believed and became a great apostle of the faith. His doubt led him to a greater faith.

Stewardship of our faith in Jesus Christ calls us to do those things that protect and strengthen the faith that lies within us. Taking time to learn about our Orthodox Christian Faith, praying to God for understanding and guidance, and worshiping with others as the Body of Christ - all these things protect and strengthen our faith. As stewards of the faith, Saint Peter instructs us to "...always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you...." (1 Peter 3:15 NKJV).

Faith is not a big rule book of "dos and don'ts." It is about loving and seeing Jesus Christ in others. Stewardship of our faith in Jesus Christ calls us to do those things that reflect our faith to others, living our faith through our actions. Jesus tells us, "By this all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35 NKJV). There is no better way to share the faith that lies within us than to see Jesus Christ in others and to love and care for them.

Through faith, God's will is accomplished in the world. Our great example is Mary, the Theotokos, the Mother of our Lord. When Archangel Gabriel came to her at the Annunciation, tradition and hymnology hold that all creation awaited her response. In faith and obedience to the will of God, Mary replied to the angel, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord; let it be according to your word" (Luke 1:38 NKJV). Mary responds with faith and fulfills God's will for all the world.



"Stewardship is the offering to God as children of faith rather than as hired servants. Children of God make offerings to God as expression of authentic love, whereas, hired servants simply fulfill legalistic duty. Christian stewardship is a manifestation of our love for God through the holistic offering of time, talent, and treasure to Him, through Christ's Holy Church. By this offering of love to our Father in heaven, He further extends the healing experience of His Church to His children, through Her ministry."

Research has shown that as Christians we seek three things from our church: Transcendence, Significance and Fellowship (Lost in America, Clegg & Bird 2001). Transcendence is to know God and to experience His presence. This we do through prayerful participation in Liturgy and the sacraments. To be stewards of the faith we are also called to be stewards of our local church which nurtures our faith and the faith of others. Stewardship is an act of faith.




#### 2019 EPISTLE READERS
