January Pulpit Post

“I Know the Plans”

For surely I know the plans I have for you says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope. Then when you call upon me and come and pray to me, I will hear you. Jeremiah 29:11-12

Another new year has arrived. This is often a good time for us to reflect on the events of the past year and in many cases a time when we make plans for the new year. When we look back, there are often events that surprised us with either some type of suffering or events that brought us hope and joy .

This scripture from Jeremiah is a common favorite verse for new graduates as they plan for new beginnings in their lives, but they sometimes misunderstand who holds these plans. At the beginning of the new year, businesses often make projections for the year and we often set personal goals that we hope to accomplish during the year. But when we look back at the previous year, it is not difficult to notice times when our best made plans were interrupted or changed completely.

So we are reminded in this scripture from Jeremiah that the Lord knows our plans. There is no mention of him delivering blueprints of these plans to us in January so that we have a roadmap to follow for the year. Instead, the Lord keeps these plans hidden from us so that we place our trust in him alone.

The plans are hidden from us, but God is not. He is revealed to us in his son Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, who came to us at Christmas and was announced to us as “Emmanuel”--God with us. God is indeed with us in every fearful and joyful event of our lives and this is in whom we place our complete confidence.

Another place that our Heavenly Father has promised to be with us is when we pray. So as this new year begins and in the plans we make, let us know that our Lord is faithful to us and knows our plans for this year and is ready to hear us whenever we pray.

Blessings to you as you place your trust in the Lord who knows your plans!

Jan Faith Community Nursing

As we begin the New Year, we look back on the past year to Thank God for all the Blessings we have received and look forward to another year of Blessings God has in store for us. YES, THE HEMOGLOBIN A1C IS HAPPENING!

November was diabetes month and I was not able to get all the details in place to do a Hemoglobin A1C diabetic testing in our Parish, and now this has all been put in place with the help of my director Karla and the Health Coop for the use of the machine. We applied for the Grant money to provide the cartridges needed and all is now ready for the testing on January 13 after worship in Baltic and after worship at East Nidaros. This testing does not require one to be fasting prior for the results.

If you are not familiar with what the Hemoglobin A1C test is, I am providing information from WEB MD to explain. Hemoglobin is a protein found in red blood cells, which gives blood its red color and its job is to carry oxygen throughout the body. The sugar in your blood is called glucose and when glucose builds up in your blood, it binds to the hemoglobin in the red blood cells. The A1C test measures how much glucose is in the blood. Red blood cells live for about 3 months. Since people with diabetes use a meter to help track the blood sugar at the time of the testing, this A1C averages for the past 3 months. For people without diabetes, the normal range for the Hemoglobin A1C level is between 4 & 5.6% . Levels between 5.7% and 6.4% mean a higher chance of getting diabetes. Levels of 6.5% or greater, mean you have diabetes. People with diseases affecting the Hemoglobin, such as anemia, may get misleading results. Other things that can affect the results include supplements such as Vitamin C & E and high cholesterol levels. Kidney disease and liver disease may also affect the test.

So please stop by the testing area on January 13th. We have enough cartridges for 15 at each church. I am very excited to be able to provide this testing. I also thank Ann Romsdahl, our lab tech pro, for her assistance with this.

Now that winter is officially here, remember that with the shorter winter days and less sunlight the risk of Vitamin D deficiency. Please check with your physician on having your Vitamin D level drawn. With the combination of Vitamin D deficiency and lack of energy to be aware of winter depression or Seasonal Affect Disorder, SAD. This is a well documented condition in the Midwest. These symptoms are often more evident when grieving or feeling a sense of loss.

Once again, our Service of Remembrance was a comforting time for all in attendance. This provides a wonderful spiritual way to remember our loved ones.

Our FootCare Clinics remain busy each month, so if needing to sign up, please do so in advance by calling the church office.

If you are aware of someone in need of a prayer shawl, please contact me also. We are grateful to our wonderful folks who crochet these for us to provide to anyone in a time of need.

Their son was born with the umbilical cord wrapped around his neck so tightly that the doctor had to cut it, resulting in a loss of blood. He was air lifted to the Children's Hospital in Denver, CO. Dan and Jill live two hours West of Denver and were able to stay at a Ronald McDonald House that was within walking distance to the hospital. In a stressful and anxious time, these volunteers provided a meal and a bed for Dan and Jill without asking for anything in exchange. Six years later, our grandson, thankfully, isn't showing any signs of his traumatic beginning to life. Please support this month's Noisy Can for the Ronald McDonald House to help them continue to offer a place for parents to stay and receive meals at a crucial time in a family's life. A Year of Time. Steven B. Cloud, *Pulpit Helps*, Vol. 14, # 2

Though even thinking on the subject of time may prove discomfoting, it is not a bad idea—especially at the beginning of a new year.

As we look into 2019 we look at a block of time. We see 12 months, 52 weeks, 365 days, 8,760 hours, 525,600 minutes, 31,536,000 seconds. *And all is a gift from God.* We have done nothing to deserve it, earn it, or purchased it. Like the air we breathe, time comes to us as a part of life.

The gift of time is not ours alone. It is given equally to each person. Rich and poor, educated and ignorant, strong and weak—every man, woman and child has the same twenty-four hours every day.

Another important thing about time is that you cannot stop it. There is no way to slow it down, turn it off, or adjust it. Time marches on.

And you cannot bring back time. Once it is gone, it is gone. Yesterday is lost forever. If yesterday is lost, tomorrow is uncertain. We may look ahead at a full year's block of time, but we really have no guarantee that we will experience any of it.

Obviously, time is one of our most precious possessions. We can waste it. We can worry over it. We can spend it on ourselves. Or, as good stewards, we can invest it in the kingdom of God.

The new year is full of time. As the seconds tick away, will you be tossing time out the window, or will you make every minute count?

Financial Report

- Alana presented the proposed operating budget for 2019. A discussion was held on the increases of expenses for next year.


