<sup>11</sup> For this is the message that you have heard from the beginning, <sup>1</sup> that we should love one another. <sup>2</sup>

<sup>12</sup> We should not be like Cain,

who was of the evil one and murdered his brother.

And why did he murder him?<sup>3</sup>

Because his own deeds were evil and his brother's righteous.

<sup>13</sup> Do not be surprised, brothers, <sup>4</sup>

that the world hates you<sup>5</sup>.

<sup>14</sup> We know

that we have passed out of death into life, because we love the brothers.

Whoever

does not love

abides in death.

<sup>15</sup> Everyone

who hates his brother

is a murderer,<sup>6</sup> and you know

that no murderer has eternal life abiding in him.

<sup>16</sup> By this we know love,

that He laid down His life for us,<sup>7</sup>

and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers.8

<sup>17</sup> But

if anyone has the world's goods and sees his brother in need,

yet closes his heart against him,<sup>9</sup>

how does God's love abide in him?

<sup>18</sup> Little children, let us not love

in word or talk

but in deed and in truth.
