A Look at the Church Year: What is Pre-Lent?

Bethlehem is beginning a time in the Church Year called "pre-Lent" or sometimes referred to as the "Gesima" Sundays. This is a time of transition in the church calendar between the season of Epiphany and the Season of Lent. The Lutheran Service Book: Companion to the Services notes, The goal of this preliminary season is to strengthen faith in the hope and promise of the resurrection in preparation for the discipline of Lent. It thus maintains the benefit of the transfiguration as the disciples of Jesus descend the mountain with Him" (228).

For the next three Sundays we will prepare ourselves for the penitential season of Lent which begins on Ash Wednesday (February 22). These next three Sundays have historically been known by their Latin names: Septuagesima (within 70 days of Easter), Sexagesima (within 60 days fo Easter); and Quinquagesima (within fifty days of Easter).

But don't be intimidated or burdened by the Latin names. The point is that even in this time preparing for Lent our attention is being directed to the events of Holy Week and Easter, what our Lord accomplished for us by His death and Resurrection. This is incorporated into our baptismal life in Christ as "We were buried with Him through baptism into death in order that just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life." (Romans 6:4).


What to look forward to in the coming Sundays' Gospel Lessons: Septuagesima (February 5): The Parable of the Laborers in the Vineyard. Sexagesima (February 12): The Parable of the Sower. Quinquagesima (February 19) Our Lord Foretells His Passion, Cross and Resurrection.

What else might you notice during this season? The color remains green until Ash Wednesday. Much like Lent and Advent the Gloria in Excelsis is put away until Easter. The same is true for the Alleluias which are put away until Easter. The Benedictus replaces the Te Deum Laudamus in Matins (which we pray in chapel at Bethlehem Lutheran School).

As with all things and in every season of the Church Year, in Pre-Lent we continue to be pointed to Christ and His Work for us, to be taught and catechized, and to be strengthened in our faith in the hope and promise of the Resurrection, even as we prepare for the discipline of Lent. May God bless the hearing and preaching of His Word and the reception of His gifts this season and always. Rev. Samuel Wirgau




THE MURDER AT THE VICARAGE BY AGATHA CHRISTIE




