Easter Meditation on "Christians, to the Paschal Victim" (LSB 460)

Just as our lenten hymns help guide our meditation and contemplation through the season of Lent so do the Easter hymns of the Church aid us in meditation and celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. Some Easter hymns sneak into other times of the year, including funerals as we, in the midst of death, sing out Christ's victory over death.

The hymn "Christians, to the Paschal Victim" (*LSB* 460) finds its roots in a Latin hymn titled *Victimae Paschali*, and is commonly used as a sequence hymn. "Sequences are choral chants that historically followed the Gradual and the Alleluia and proceeded the Gospel for the day; not infrequently, they offered sung commentary on the Gospel about to be read" (*Lutheran Service Book: Companion to the Hymns*, 1:338). This may be done responsively with "Christ Is Arisen" (*LSB* 459), with a choir singing 460 and the congregation singing the stanzas of 459. The responsive nature of these hymns well serves the text of "Christians, to the Paschal Victim," which sings a dialogue between a narrator and Mary Magdalene, a witness of the resurrection.

The following text commentary is from Lutheran Service Book: Companion to the Hymns. "In the Middle Ages, [this hymn] was used all over Europe as part of a drama performed on Easter morning outside the Mass itself. In the sequence, the narrator begins by calling Christians to join their voices in giving thankful praise. The risen Christ is identified as the Paschal Victim. The word paschal comes from the Greek pascha and ultimately from the Hebrew pesach, meaning 'Passover'; but it was used as early as the second century to refer to Christ's Passion and by the middle of the third century to His resurrection, as it is used today.

"In the sequence, the author connects the risen Christ with the Passover lamb. The language employed in the first stanza reminds the singer of the significance of the Easter Victory: 'Death and life have contended in that combat stupendous: The Prince of life, who died, reigns immortal.'

"In stanza 2, the narrator addresses Mary Magdalene, , recalling the Easter events described in the Gospels. He asks Mary to tell us . . . what she saw on her way. Mary identifies Christ as her hope . . . and states that Christ will precede His disciples into Galilee.

"The concluding stanza reinforces the point of Easter as the ongoing way of life for the Church. Christ is our Lord, and we need the mercy of Him who reigns forever" (1:460).

This hymn is also adapted to rhyme in hymn 463, "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today; Alleluia." God bless our praises of the crucified and resurrected Christ.

April 2, 2023 – Palm Sunday Psalm 118:19-29; Philippians 2:5-11; John 12:20-43 "Seeing Jesus" – Sermon Text: John 12:20-21 – Rev. Thomas Eggold The answer to the Palm Sunday crowd, and to you and me, is that to see Jesus, is to see the

cross. This is the message of Palm Sunday. That Jesus knowingly, willingly, obediently, resolutely rode into Jerusalem to the misguided shouts of "Hosanna" to do for us what had to be done – and what only He could do – by enduring an undeserved and unthinkable death in our place to give us life.

April 9, 2023 – The Resurrection of Our Lord (Easter Sunrise) Psalm 118:15-19; 1 Corinthians 15:1-11; John 20:1-18 "Christ Is Risen!" – Sermon Text: John 20:17 – Rev. Dr. Lawrence Rast, Jr. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia. We shout these words joyfully and triumphantly because the resurrection of Jesus shows us that the work of salvation is complete. As those he has called by name, we rejoice that we, too, will rise, just as he did.

April 16, 2023 – 2nd Sunday of Easter Psalm 148; 1 Peter 1:3-9; John 20:19-31 "Words and Wounds" – Sermon Text: John 20:19 – Rev. Shayne Jonker Jesus' Words and His wounds make every Sunday a little Easter. With His words and His wounds, Jesus brings peace to His fearful disciples. With His words and His wounds He sends them to speak forgiveness with His own breath and Spirit. And with His words and His wounds He reaches out to an unbelieving disciple and to each of us.

April 23, 2023 – 3rd Sunday of Easter Psalm 116:1-14; 1 Peter 1:17-25; Luke 24:13-35 "A Walk With Jesus" – Sermon Text: Luke 24:13-35 – Rev. Paul Shoemaker Two disciples were walking to Emmaus. They knew of Jesus' death but not His resurrection. They were despondent. They lost all hope. But when the risen Jesus revealed Himself hope was restored. Let's keep our eyes on Jesus, even in the midst of trying times, so our eyes may be opened and we may have hope in Christ.

April 30, 2023 – 4th Sunday of Easter (Good Shepherd Sunday) Psalm 43; 1 Peter 2:19-25; John 10:1-10 "Wanted: Good Shepherd" – Sermon Text: 1 Peter 2:19-25 – Rev. William Mueller If a job description were written for a shepherd, how would it read? What things would be identified as critical items for a shepherd to perform? How would the job description of the Good Shepherd read? Dig deep into Scripture to discover and celebrate how Jesus is the Good Shepherd.

Sometimes that character expresses itself as a word well spoken, sometimes as a bandage well applied, and sometimes as a child well fed.

What is Orphan Grain Train?

Orphan Grain Train is a 501c3 Nonprofit Christian volunteer network that shares personal and material resources with needy people in America and around the world. Grain Train volunteers gather donations of clothing, medical supplies, food, Christian literature, and other aid to meet real needs. The Orphan Grain Train movement is a loving response to Jesus Christ's example as a servant and His love for us.

Present Day

Since 1992, Orphan Grain Train's 27 regional locations have delivered more than 45 million fortified-rice meals and 4,230 shipments of humanitarian aid to needy people in several states and 69 countries on 5 continents. Orphan Grain Train built a mobile chapel with help from a grant funded by LCMS Disaster Relief division for St. John's Lutheran Church in Pilger, NE after their church was demolished by a F4 tornado. In October 2017 hurricane Michael ravaged the shoreline of Texas and a majority of Houston. Michael left behind homes and businesses in ruins and lives lost. Orphan Grain Train purchased and delivered 15 shipments of building construction materials and 5 semi-loads of groceries to help stock shelves in a food pantry feeding volunteers and those that have lost everything. In October 2018 OGT had 400 turkeys delivered for Thanksgiving meals to those still living in desperation a year later. The mission of Orphan Grain Train is uniquely dependent upon dedicated volunteers, many of whom have given numerous years of service for the sake of others. Since 1992, more than 4 million hours have been volunteered!

Orphan Grain Train is a recognized service organization (RSO) of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod (LCMS). Many shipments have been in cooperation with Lutheran Hour Ministries, LCMS World Mission, LCMS World Relief, and other Christian ministries.

Easter means Forgiveness and Peace

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The resurrection of Jesus is the foundation of our faith. St. Paul even says that if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain (1 Cor. 15:14). That means, if Jesus didn't really rise from the dead then Christianity is a false religion. He goes on to say, And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins (1 Cor. 15:17). So, if Jesus didn't really rise from the dead then Christianity is also a useless religion. If Jesus didn't really rise from the dead then we are still under the power of sin and death.

What this means is that the message of Easter is more than just "Jesus is alive again." The message of the Easter is bigger and more powerful than just the fact that one man came back to life. The resurrection of this one Man means something. It means forgiveness and peace.

On the evening of that first Easter day, the first day of the week, the doors being locked where the disciples were for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." When He had said this, He showed them His hands and His side. Then the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord (John 20:19–20). The very first words out of the risen Lord's mouth are "Peace be with you." Jesus can say that because of what His death and resurrection accomplished for us. His death paid the price for our sins and His resurrection destroyed the power of death. So, the full message of Easter is that Jesus died and rose again, and because He lives our sins are forgiven and we have peace with God.

But this forgiveness and peace is not limited to our personal relationship with God. Jesus shared His peace with the disciples as a group, a community, a family. And He gave them the power to share His forgiveness within that holy community, known as the Church (John 20:22–23). So, the forgiveness and peace of Jesus is spread among us. We share it with one another. This means that the life of Easter, the new life of forgiveness and peace is lived out by Christians in the Church, in our homes, and even in our school. Everything we say and do should be filled and motivated by these three parts of the Easter message: Jesus lives. Sins are forgiven. Be at peace.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!






