AS WE GATHER:

How have you felt while waiting for the arrival of someone you've heard a lot about and eagerly desired to meet? Now think of the people of old who longed for God's coming among them as a fellow human being who would make a way for their rescue and deliverance from all that weighed them down in life. That's where *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel* connects us to them! The Advent-leading-to-Christmas prayers that give us the images and language of this beloved hymn were in use in Rome already by the 9th century and were put into verse form in the 12th—still in Latin. The English translation, in the mid-19th century, made the hymn available to many more people far and wide throughout the world. The tune is thought to be from the 13th century and pulls at people of every generation through its holy and stirring sound of stunning awe, eager longing, and joyful fulfillment. We thank the children of our congregation for helping us explore its richness today!

REGARDING COMMUNION

Advent calls our attention to Jesus—the Word made flesh who came among us, full of grace and truth (John 1:14)—who comes to us still in the bread of His Body and wine of His Blood in Holy Communion and will come again on the last day. As a congregation of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, we celebrate and receive Christ's Holy Supper for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and one another. Our Lord invites to His table those who trust His words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as He forgives and loves us so that we might show forth his death and resurrection until He comes. Christian denominations have differing understandings of Holy Communion, if you are not a member of a Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod congregation and have not communed here before, we ask that you speak with the pastor or elder prior to communing with us the first time. Those not communing are invited to cross their arms over their chests and approach the pastor for a blessing during the distribution. Also, if certain factors prohibit you from partaking of regular wine, non-alcoholic wine is available in the center circle of the tray. If you would like to begin sharing this sacred meal with us on a regular basis, please ask the pastor for a time of faith instruction and formation.

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The Great "O" Antiphons

Each stanza of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" highlights an Old Testament name for the coming Messiah. The hymn's rhyming verse dates to the mid-1800s, but it draws from a much older tradition.

For several centuries, the Church has chanted a set of responsive verses, or antiphons, on the days leading up to Christmas Eve—from December 17 to 23. These antiphons, traditionally sung before and after the Magnificat (Mary's song of praise on finding out about her pregnancy), focus attention on Christ's fulfillment of several Old Testament prophecies.

In today's service, we will hear the Scriptural basis of each antiphon, pray it responsively, and see the prayer fulfilled in Jesus—Emmanuel—"God with us."

And the Spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and might, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord. — *Isaiah* 11:2



O Wisdom, coming forth from the mouth of the Most High, spreading through and filling all creation, mightily ordering all things:

Come and teach us the way of wisdom.

But we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. -1 Corinthians 1:23–24

And God spoke all these words, saying, "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery." — Exodus 20:1–2



O Adonai (Lord) and ruler of the house of Israel, who appeared to Moses in the burning bush and gave him the Law on Sinai:

C Come with an outstretched arm and redeem us.

"And you, O Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel." — Matthew 2:6

In that day the root of Jesse, who shall stand as a signal for the peoples—of him shall the nations inquire, and his resting place shall be glorious. — *Isaiah 11:10*



O Root of Jesse, standing as a sign before the peoples, before whom all kings are mute, to whom the nations will do homage:

O Key of David and scepter of the house of Israel, You open and no one can close, You close and no one can open:

"And to the angel of the church in Philadelphia write: 'The words of the holy one, the true one, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens. I know your works. Behold, I have set before you an open door, which no one is able to shut. I know that you have but little power, and yet you have kept my word and have not denied my name.'" — Revelation 3:7–8

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone. — *Isaiah 9:2*



He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts; he has brought down the mighty from their thrones and exalted those of humble estate: he has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent empty away. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, as he spoke to our fathers, to Abraham and to his offspring forever."

And Mary remained with her about three months and returned to her home.

In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be registered, each to his own town. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.




Communion Distribution
