AS WE GATHER

Each Sunday in Lent brings us closer to Holy Week and closer to the foot of the cross. In a sense, we are annual pilgrims traveling on the way of and to the cross. Each year is slightly different from the one that has come before on that cross way. According to the liturgical year in the Church, we are closer today to the death of Christ and His glorious resurrection than we were a week ago. And, according to our earthly lives, we are drawing closer to our own individual death and resurrection. Along this way, we intersect with the cross, which serves as a sign for our lives at all times. May we each be blessed in our pilgrimage!

The pottery vessels on the altar remind us that although Holy Communion is not celebrated today, our Lord's sacred gifts are still central to our life of faith. Holy Communion is celebrated every 1^{st} , 3^{rd} , and 5^{th} weekend (and major festivals).

Liturgical Color:

Purple is the color of humility and repentance.

Near the large cross by the pulpit is a basket with slips of paper, pencils, and tacks. Feel free to write down any of your burdens, worries, wrongs, and sins and tack them to the cross at any time during this season of Lent. They will not be read but will be removed on Good Friday and burned in the Easter Vigil fire on Holy Saturday. Our Lord takes our darkness and replaces it with his light!

The quilts on the pews today were made by Bethlehem's twice-monthly Tuesday quilters and will be taken to Lawrence and shared with students through Haskell LIGHT.





Old Testament Reading..... Ezekiel 37:1-14

The hand of the LORD was upon me, and he brought me out in the Spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of the valley; it was full of bones. And he led me around among them, and behold, there were very many on the surface of the valley, and behold, they were very dry. And he said to me, "Son of man, can these bones live?" 
Epistle ReadingRomans 8:1-11

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do. By sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fulfilled in

us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot. Those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit who dwells in you.

Holy GospelJohn 11:17-27, 38-53

When Jesus came, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Bethany was near Jerusalem, about two miles off, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them concerning their brother. So when Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, but Mary remained seated in the house. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother

would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask from God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord; I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who is coming into the world." . . .

Then Jesus, deeply moved again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, by this time there will be an odor, for he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus lifted up his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this on account of the people standing around, that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said these things, he cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out." The man who had died came out, his hands and feet bound with linen strips, and his face wrapped with a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what he did, believed in him, but some of them went to the Pharisees and told them what Jesus had done. So the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered the Council and said, "What are we to do? For this man performs many signs. If we let him go on like this, everyone will believe in him, and the Romans will come and take away both our place and our nation." But one of them, Caiaphas, who was high priest that year, said to them, "You know nothing at all. Nor do you understand that it is better for you that one man should die for the people, not that the whole nation should perish." He did not say this of his own accord, but being high priest that year he prophesied that Jesus would die for the nation, and not for the nation only, but also to gather into one the children of God who are scattered abroad. So from that day on they made plans to put him to death.

The original facility called Haskell LIGHT became a part of the Haskell Indian Nations University community of Lawrence, Kansas, in 1972. Several years ago, Haskell LIGHT changed to Sacred Ground Haskell. Last year marked 50 years on campus, so as part of that proud milestone celebration, it was decided to return to roots and Haskell LIGHT as the name. The Haskell LIGHT mission to promote healing and growth, and to support Haskell students into tribal community leaders remains the same.

Pola Farve has the honor to actively partner, lead and support this effort as the Haskell LIGHT Campus Student Center Program Director. The goal is to walk with and alongside Native brothers and sisters, "letting our light shine before them, that they may see our good works and glorify our Father in Heaven" (Matthew 5:16). Around 800 students from 145 tribes attend the university each semester. Farve, with the help of student outreach coordinators, volunteers and partners; strive to develop meaningful relationships with these young adults at a time when they are searching and forming their core values and beliefs.

Commenting on what they do at Haskell LIGHT, Farve shares: "We set goals and meet challenges each semester but most importantly- we have fun! Haskell LIGHT is a drop-in student center that's a great space for students to grow in the ways they want and need. We want Haskell LIGHT to feel like a safe space and place for all different kinds of needs. Learning new skills needed in life, supporting traditional values, representing people from all walks of Indian country, and walking along side students shining Christ's goodness in their journey. We support physical, mental, emotional, spiritual, scholastic and cultural wellness and confidence. This is a lot of ground to cover but we do surveys at the beginning of each semester and align with their feedback. We do our best to flex and spend more focus on the most requested areas. What we need this semester may shift and be less of a focus next semester, so we keep this in mind and try to remain agile and flexible. Each group of students can have different needs or interests." She requests prayers for all students to safely matriculate in the degrees of their calling and asks for continued blessings that God grant as they each go back to lead in their Native communities.

Farve is an alumnus of Haskell Indian Nations University, University of Kansas, University of Alaska Anchorage, and Western Governors University. Her most recent degree includes a Master of Education with an emphasis of Learning & Instructional Design. Farve is a lifelong Christian.


