PASTOR'S PAGE Learning from the First Christian

Since at least the fifth century, Mary has been recognized by the Church with thanksgiving on August 15. Martin Luther not only acknowledged the obvious—that she was the mother of Jesus (God the Eternal Word come into this world in human flesh)—but also that she was the first Christian (believing, even when not fully understanding). Therefore, she's the model of faith for all who come after her; teaching and showing us what it means to live trusting in Christ Jesus our Redeemer. Luke is the only Gospel-writer to give us almost all we have about Mary (likely interviewing her), including her song of praise ("The Magnificat")—on which Martin Luther based his following words (in the two months after his excommunication):

Tell me, was not hers a wondrous soul? She finds herself the Mother of God, exalted above all mortals, and still remains so simple and so calm that she does not think of any poor serving maid as beneath her....

Now it is much more difficult to practice moderation in the midst of riches, honor, and power than amid poverty, dishonor, and weakness, since the former are mighty incentives to evildoing. So the wondrous pure spirit of Mary is worthy of even greater praise, because, having such overwhelming honors heaped upon her head, she does not let them tempt her, but acts as though she did not see it, remains "even and right in the way," clings only to God's goodness, which she neither sees nor feels, overlooks the good things she does feel, and neither takes pleasure nor seeks her own enjoyment in it. Thus she can truly sing, "My spirit rejoices in God, my Savior." It is indeed a spirit that exults only in faith and rejoices not in the good things of God that she felt, but only in God, whom she did not feel and who is her Salvation, known by her in faith alone....

Mary begins with herself and sings what He has done for her. Thus she teaches us a twofold lesson. First, every one of us should pay attention to what God does for him rather than to all the works He does for others.... In the second place, she teaches us that everyone should strive to be foremost in praising God by showing forth the works He has done to him, and then by praising Him for the works He has done to others....

Mary confesses that the foremost work God did for her was that He regarded her, which is indeed the greatest of His works, on which all the rest depend and from which they all derive. For where it comes to pass that God turns His face toward one to regard him, there is nothing but grace and salvation, and all gifts and works must follow.... Therefore she adds, "And holy is His name." That is to say: "As I lay no claim to the work, neither do I to the name and fame. For the name and fame belong to Him alone who does the work. It is not proper that one should do the work and another have the fame and glory. I am but the workshop in which He performs His work; I had nothing to do with the work itself. No one should praise me or give me the glory for becoming the Mother of God, but God alone and His work are to be honored and praised in me. It is enough to congratulate me and call me blessed, because God used me and did His works in me."

FAMILY DEVOTIONS: PUTTING ON THE ARMOR OF GOD

Family devotions and Bible study are integral parts of our daily household routine, but it has not always been this way. Neither Jeremy nor I grew up with a strong spiritual leader in the home or anything like family devotions. Our current practices have grown out of homeschooling, really. Once I had readers on my hands, I thought about how to make them Bible-literate. I started planning ways to incorporate that into the rest of our schooling, but I found myself running out of time and attention span during our morning schoolwork. So I delegated. I told Jeremy he was the Bible teacher, and our suppertime family devotions were born. It's funny to me how relatively short a time we've spent with this routine (about 3 years), because it is so very integral to our daily rhythm now!



I started out by selecting a children's Bible with stories that were about the right length for a 5minute reading during supper. After we bless our meal and fill plates, we sit at the table and do our devotion. Jeremy reads or leads it, but I usually select the content. Once we finished the children's Bible, I selected a book of devotions targeted to kids. We've continued to alternate those two types of devotions until recently. When we started eating outside on the deck last spring, we found our-

selves away from the books we were used to having right there, so Jeremy would play the LHM Daily Devotion audio on his phone. We've stuck with that for the time being and will likely change it up again for some unforeseeable reason. Clearly, the key is not that you have exactly the right format or content on hand, but rather that you build the routine for doing a devotion together. Sometimes discussion ensues about the devotion; sometimes not. Either way, it's often the kids who remind us when we get distracted with the (formidable) chore of getting a hot meal to the table and forget. It is so gratifying to see that they are counting on that time of hearing God's word together!

Our family devotion time is brief, easy, requires very little preparation, and is quite simple. Nevertheless, the power it has had over our household is formidable! Conversations in our house are very often about spiritual and Biblical matters, and this includes the frequent times that neighbors are visiting. Bible studies have been incorporated into the morning schoolwork because the kids are familiar with the Bible's stories and contextual differences from today's world and hungry to learn more. Jeremy and I have each developed our individual Bible reading habits, both because the kids getting older means we have a little more time and brain space for it and because, well, we have to stay a little ahead of their quickly advancing knowledge! This year we and Nana are all three reading through the whole Bible using the same study program, which is yet again next level. And now Bryce has been folded into that routine (so much for staying ahead of the kids!). God's Word is a powerful builder of family unity centered on Christ and a necessary part of the Armor of God that we all, young and not so young, need.


