The scenes of Lent are familiar. The Upper Room, the Garden of Gethsemane, the halls of Pontius Pilate, and the hill of Golgotha—these are the places we remember when we meditate on our Lord’s Passion. Yet when Jesus enters a place, He never

Week after week, we will enter the places of the Passion only to discover our Lord . . . waiting for us . . . willing to share with us a love that was set in place before the foundations of the world.



Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths. But you, keep your head in all situations, endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist, discharge all the duties of your ministry.” 2 Timothy 3:16-17, 4:2-5

home on a daily basis. This is a spiritual battle we are in (Ephesians 6:12) and if we do not equip our children for this battle from a young age onward, they will not be prepared for the attacks against their faith which are **guaranteed** to come.

For example, when it comes to creation, the world teaches that evolution is “fact”, despite **overwhelming evidence** in science that reveals Intelligent Design. Our children, from a young age, are taught that the universe, our planet, and our own bodies are a result of random occurrence’s that took place billions of years ago. As Christian parents, **we need to educate ourselves** on all the scientific evidence that backs up what the bible teaches about creation—that our universe, planet earth, our bodies, etc. were created by a powerful, intelligent, and loving God.

I’ve spent the past 35 years working with children and youth through church ministries and I have to tell you, it **GREATLY** concerns me to see the negative influence the world is having on our children and young people. In recent years, I have focused mostly on ages 12-18. I worry that, by this age, what is being taught & promoted through school, movies, the internet, social media, etc. has already laid a dangerously strong foundation for what shapes our children and how they see the world. ***I think we need to start teaching apologetics (reasoned arguments or writings in justification of our faith) to our children at a much younger age.***

Do you realize that if our children grow up believing that the world was not created by God, then they have no need to believe in God. If they don’t believe in God, they don’t believe in His Son, Jesus either. If they don’t believe in God or Jesus, then they don’t believe the truth of the bible or any of its teachings. If they don’t believe in God, Jesus, or the truth of the bible, they will not realize their need for a Saviour! If I seem a bit dramatic about this issue, it’s because ***it’s literally a life or death issue!!!***

We need to incorporate biblical teachings into ***daily living, at home, through parents,*** right from the time a child is born. We cannot depend solely on Sunday School and church services to teach our children the truth about scripture. It must begin from the moment they take breath and must come from the



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Parents, I **STRONGLY** urge you, if you haven't already, please study for yourselves **WHAT** you believe and **WHY** you believe it. ***In 1 Peter 3:15, we are told, "But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect"***. This command is not just for sharing our faith with non-believers, but also for sharing our faith with our children. If your child comes to you and says, "How do we know the bible is true?", do you know how to answer? If your child says to you, "I learned about evolution at school today. How do we know if God really created the world?", do you know how you would respond? What if your child challenges you with, "If God is loving, then why does he allow bad things to happen?", do you know how to deal with that topic?

ing can lead to! Does that mean I can create⁵ my own morals, my own "right and wrong" depending on how I want to live, regardless of how it affects those around me? How do we, as parents, respond to our children when they start coming home from school with this mindset? Do you know yourself what the bible teaches about this kind of thinking and would you know how to respond to these teachings? If our children do not grow up believing in absolute truth, then ***they will fall for anything because they will stand for nothing!***




Our children are growing up in an anti-Christian world. They are being told that everything in the bible is just stories & myths. Many people have never even heard of Jesus. If they have heard of him, they think he was just a fictional character. We can no longer assume our children will believe in Jesus or trust that the bible is true just because we tell them it's so and send them to Sunday School. As parents, we need to first examine for ourselves why we believe in Jesus and why do we think the bible is true. Then we need to teach our children how to think through their beliefs and how to ask the right questions.

I would like to give parents some resources to research (see list of resources below), in order to help equip them for answering their children's questions. I would also like to emphasize the importance of defending our faith **WITH GENTLENESS AND RESPECT** (1 Peter 3:15). When you are discussing these topics with your children (or anyone for that matter), pray for the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom and discernment. Pray for Him to give you the right words to say and also to guide you in what NOT to say. Our children need to feel heard and validated. We must let them share their thoughts and viewpoints ***without judgement***. If all we are doing is preaching *at* them, they won't hear what we have to say anyway. ***Proverbs 15:1 says, "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger."***

The world teaches our children there are no absolute truths. A favourite saying among young people nowadays is, "You do you and I'll do me". In other words, whatever feels good for you, go ahead and do it and I'll do whatever is good for me. This popular world-view says that nothing is absolute—nothing is completely wrong or completely right. What a dangerous, slippery slope that kind of think-

Let your child express their thoughts and beliefs openly and honestly. If their views are contrary to scripture, don't immediately tell them they are wrong and you are right. **Learn to ask the right questions in order to get them thinking more thoroughly about what they believe and why they believe it.** Gently and lovingly share with them what the bible teaches and why you personally believe what the bible says (this is where you really need to educate yourself and know exactly what you believe and why). **Most importantly, PRAY for your children.** Pray very specifically for the Holy Spirit to be at work in their lives,



revealing to them **HIS truth** and **praying for the Holy Spirit** to give them wisdom and discernment. After all, it is **only through the power of the Holy Spirit** that faith and understanding of God's Word can come to any of us.

are ultimately **God's children** and a precious gift He has given us. Let us treasure this precious gift by ensuring that we teach our children the truth, giving them a **firm foundation** to build on for the rest of their lives. **"Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it."** Proverbs 22:6



Stewardship Moment

“Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out” (Deut 28:3-6).

This is God’s promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground or their wombs, their flocks or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there’s a catch. He would do this for Israel only “if you obey the voice of the Lord your God” (Deut 28:2b). If they did that, He would cause that “all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you” (Deut 28:2a).

If they didn’t obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn’t keep the commandments of the Lord and walk in His ways (Deut 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh, fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit; died for us – in our place and for our benefit; and is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit.

By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon His work and not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and thereby it becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is not in order to receive blessings but because in Christ we already have.

It is with this in mind that we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).

MALAWI COMFORT DOLLS

The basic method for making each doll is the same. Begin at the feet and knit a rectangle, changing yarn colour for each body segment. The head is stuffed and the neck is formed by pulling in with a gathering thread. When the body is stuffed, pulling in with a thread forms the feet. The arms and legs are defined by stitching through all layers after the doll is stuffed. Finished height of each doll is approx. 6 inches.

You need:

Small quantities of Worsted weight yarn
1 pair of Can #8 or 4mm needles
Tapestry needle
Polyester fiberfill

To Make:

Always leave 10 to 12 " of yarn at each beginning and end of colour changes. You will use this yarn to close the centre back, pinch arms and divide legs. It is best to use shades of *beige* brown for feet and face.

Cast on 32 stitches. (I start with 30 stitches & then increase 2 stitches on 4th row of feet)

Working in **garter stitch** work 4 rows for the feet (2 ridges)

Change yarn and work 20 rows for the pants (10 ridges)

Change yarn and work 16 rows for the sweater (8 ridges)

Change yarn and work 10 rows of **stocking stitch** for the face. **(USE BROWN YARN)**

Change yarn and work hat as follows:

Rows 1 to 4 work in garter stitch (2 ridges)

Stop knitting now and decorate the face. Place a small pin between the 16th and 17th stitch to mark the centre of face. Using red yarn, mark mouth and nose (3 stitches for mouth and 1

for nose) Place 3 french knots on shirt for buttons. Sew X's for eyes out of black yarn.

Outline eyes with finer white yarn if using a dark brown for the face.

Work rest in stocking stitch, decreasing to form hat as follows:

Row 5: (knit 4, knit 2 tog) five times, knit 2 (27 sts)

Row 6: Knit 1, purl across, knit 1

Row 7: (Knit 3, knit 2 tog) five times, knit 2 (22 sts)

Row 8: as row 6

Row 9 (knit 2, knit 2 tog) five times, knit 2 (17 sts)

Row 10 : as row 6

Row 11: (knit 1, knit 2 tog) five times, knit 2 (12 sts)

Draw yarn through remaining sts and pull up to close.

To Finish:

1. Sew sides together to form a centre back seam.
2. Stuff head. Weave a single strand of matching yarn across the first face row. Draw up to form neck and secure ends.
3. Stuff body; sew across to close pant bottom.
4. Backstitch up from bottom of feet to bottom of pant to form the feet. Stuff feet and sew up at bottom, pulling in as much as possible.
5. With matching yarn, form arms with tiny backstitches through all layers from waist to 2 rows beneath the neck. Define legs in the same way, from bottom to just below waistline.

Baby Bobble Hat Knitting Loom Pattern

Skill Level: Beginner

Time to Make: Two hours

HOW TO MAKE

1. Pick the colour of wool that you want the hat to be, The great thing about the 6 piece loom is you can choose what size hat you want to be and it doesn't really matter what type of wool that you use.
2. Start off by making a slip knot on the yarn and attach it to the hook on the outside of the knitting loom.
3. Wrap the yarn completely around the first peg clockwise so it crosses on the inside of the ring, then move onto the second peg. Keep going until you have wrapped the last peg.
4. Slide the yarn loops on each peg towards the bottom of the pegs – you now have your first row!
5. For the second row, wrap the yarn around all pegs starting with the first pegs so you have two rows, secure the loose end of yarn around the outer peg.
6. Now this part is a bit fiddly – with the hook which is included in the set lift the bottom loop over the top loop and over the top of the peg. Continue this all the way round until you have one row of loops left on your pegs – this is your first knotted row.
7. Push the loops to the bottom of the pegs and repeat steps 5 and 6 until you have reached the desired length for the hat. Once you have completed several rows you can take off the slipknot from the outer peg.
8. Once you have the desired length of hat you are ready to complete the hat. You need to have left one row of loops on the loom, cut the end of the wrapping yarn leaving a 10cm tail.
9. Then from the ball of yarn cut a piece about 60cm long – it won't look long enough but it is – thread this onto the needle which is included in the knitting loom set.
10. Starting with the first peg use the needle to sew through the yarn loop on each peg starting from the bottom of the peg to the top of the peg, once it is threaded lift the loop up and over the peg. Continue this until you have sewn through all the loops and pulled them off the pegs. Make sure that the end of the yarn is still sticking out of the first loop you pulled off!
11. Turn the hat inside out and pull the two ends of the yarn together to gather the yarn for the top of the hat. Tie these in a secure double knot and weave the ends of the yarn into the hat to tidy up.
12. Turn back the right way and you have completed the main part of your hat, you can now attach a pompom or leave the hat as it is!
