FROM THE PASTOR *by Pastor Hahn*

Do You Love Me More Than These

Are you in a struggle to obey God? Are you struggling to love God? To love God means putting Him first before any other thing. It is letting go of what must go for you to do the will of the Father. What are some things that can be done in order to walk in love towards the Lord?

"So when they had eaten breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me more than these?' He said to Him, 'Yes, Lord; You know that I love You.' He said to him, 'Feed My lambs.' He said to him again a second time, 'Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me?' He said to Him, 'Yes, Lord; You know that I love You.' He said to him, 'Tend My sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon, son of Jonah, do you love Me?'... You know that I love You." Jesus said to him, "Feed My sheep." - John 21:15-17 (NKJV).

Loving God means obeying His commandments (John 14:15), and that includes the ones that we personally won't want to do. It means obeying God in all things, whether it's convenient or not, we understand it or not, it makes sense or not, it's a sacrifice or not. The good thing is that every instruction from God is aimed at blessing us. When God demanded that Abraham should sacrifice Isaac, He tested his love for Him above that which he had for Isaac. Abraham passed the love test and God swore great blessings to him, which his generations after him are still reaping till today (Genesis 22:1-18).

Sometimes, obeying God demands that you let go of certain things, especially things that are competing with your full obedience to God. As a Christian believer, such things may not be bad in themselves, but are obstacles in fulfilling the Lord's perfect plan for you. It may be to let go of a relationship, hobby, food, or even a business or career. You may not quite understand why God is asking for you to let go of it, but as you obey you will discover the reason. The Alpha and Omega never makes mistakes, neither can He fail you. His thoughts for you are of peace and not of evil (Jeremiah 29:11).

Peter was originally a fisherman fishing fish before Jesus called him to fish men. When Jesus died, Peter remembered his fishing again. Apparently, Peter loved fishing. Jesus had to ask him three times if he loved Him more than fish to show how serious He was about the assignment He had given Peter. Fishing on its own was not wrong, but it was distracting Peter from the instructions of Jesus. He was to feed and tend the sheep of the Lord. He was to spearhead the spread of the Gospel of Christ (Matthew 16:18-19), and not to go back to fishing fish. The souls of men are more important than fishing fish to earn a living or for fun.

Is Jesus asking you, **"Do you love Me more than these?"** God tested Abraham with his son; this incidence shows that the Lord should always be number one in your life. It is important to note that the Lord will never require of you to do what He had not equipped you to do. He will never ask you to do what is contrary to His Word or impossible for you to do. Therefore, with boldness and certainty, declare to Jesus, "Yes Lord, You know that I love you."

During this difficult time for CLC, I asked our preschool parents to write a Positive Impact Statement telling us how Christ Lutheran Preschool has impacted their child's life or their family's life this past school year. How has Christ Lutheran Preschool impacted your child's life or your family's life this past year?

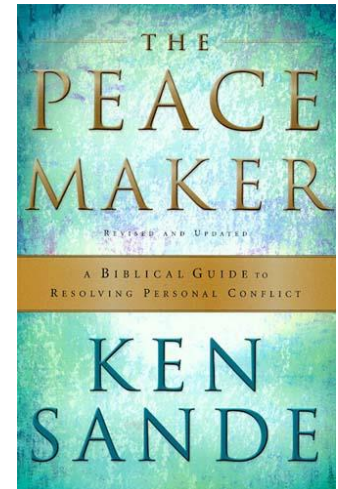
Trustees Hard at Work – Again!

The Peacemaker

For 2018, the Board of Elders and Pastor Hahn are reviewing the book *The Peacemaker* by Ken Sande. Our goal is to be better communicators and learn more about how to resolve conflict in a Christian manner. For May the Elders and Pastor reviewed Chapter 3, *Trust in the Lord and Do Good*. This chapter focuses on God's sovereign power. To be sovereign means to be supreme, unlimited, and totally independent of any other influence. But we, as sinners, have trouble recognizing God's power. Have you ever heard, "God would never let anyone suffer?" This misses the point. As Isaiah warned, "You turn things upside down, as if the potter were thought to be like the clay. Shall what is formed say to him who formed it, 'He did not make me?' Can the pot say to the potter, he knows nothing?" (Isaiah 29:16)



The fact that God is good does not mean that he will insulate us from all suffering. Rather, that he will be with us in our suffering and accomplish good through it.

God also uses our trials to minister to others when they are suffering. One reason many of the people in the Bible faced problems with such confidence is they knew God would never give them more than they could handle. They had unfailing love and faith in God and the path God had placed before them. Look at Paul who was imprisoned in Philippi with Silas. He was falsely accused, flogged, and imprisoned. Instead of doubt and despair, Paul and Silas spent the night praying and singing to God. The result: God brought about an earthquake, conversion of the jailer and his family, and an apology from city officials.

Applied today, your view of God will have a profound effect on how much you trust God. If you do not believe that God is both sovereign and good, trust will be elusive. When you are involved in conflict, you too must decide whether or not you will trust in God. Trusting God does not mean believing that he will do all that you want, but rather believing that he will do everything he knows is good. If you believe God is sovereign and that he will never allow anything into your life unless it can be used for good, you will see conflicts not as accidents but opportunities. This kind of trust glorifies God and is needed for effective peacemaking. Be the Peacemaker God wants you to be!

"The Lord's unfailing love surrounds the man who trusts in him." Psalm 32:10b.

The Promise of Dawn by Laurine Snelling – Book 1 of *Under the Skies Series*

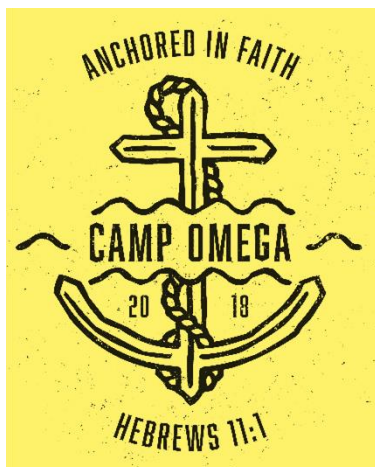
