From the Pastor:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

"Sixteen Tons." It's the name of an old song by Merle Travis made famous by Tennessee Ernie Ford. It raises the issue of miners who were subject to the company store. A recurring refrain throughout the piece is, "St. Peter, don't you call me, 'cause I can't go, I owe my soul to the company store."

On October 17 the local paper had a story on the implementation of student loan rules that were enacted because of fraudulent practices by some schools. Some who obtained loans for excessive costs may receive some relief from repayment.

The other day I read a meme that declared each (separated or divorced) parent should contribute equally toward child support regardless of how much each one earns. (Imagine one parent earns \$80,000 per year, and the other \$20,000 per year...)

Just before writing this article, I saw a headline that read, "I'm a teacher, and I qualify for reduced lunch..." Searching for that meme led me to a title from *Time Magazine* just last month. It reads, "I work 3 jobs and donate blood plasma to pay the bills.' This Is What It's Like to Be a Teacher in America."

One week in October, the students in our confirmation classes played a made-up game called "Advantage." Each student received a list of rules, stating how that student would move for a correct answer, for an incorrect answer, or if someone else answered. The lists were all different, and some were able to move forward when others could not. It

did not take long for the students to realize the game was not fair, that it rewarded some students and penalized others for no other reason than the list each one happened to grab. The student who happened to grab the most advantageous sheet was not at fault for gaining more advantage than the one who grabbed the least advantageous sheet, but hopefully it can help us to have a perspective on the world that we might otherwise miss. It's fun to have an advantage for a change. It's not so fun to be arbitrarily placed at a disadvantage. It's even less fun to be at a disadvantage for reasons one is unable to change.

I tell a story now and then of a young man attending an electrician's school in Chicago shortly before this nation's involvement in the Korean war. He decided to get some exercise one day by taking the bus to the other end of Chicago and walking back. He was white, about 5'10", and blonde. found himself walking from familiar and comfortable surroundings into through a part of the city that was filled with people who were larger than he was, with black skin, and with what seemed like suspicious gazes trained on him the entire way. He was able to relax a bit when his surroundings became a bit more comfortable and familiar. never repeated that activity!

The point is that he *could* choose never to do that again. He had the advantage of being able to avoid that neighborhood. He never had to live in a company town working the mines. He had advantages, though he never became particularly rich (with his eventual career in rural education administration). That



young man was my dad... or I might never have heard the story!

We tend to seek whatever advantage we can obtain, and often do not notice when others cannot obtain the same advantage... and then we blame them for being lazy, or making poor choices, or having less intelligence.

It's not that easy. Sometimes advantages are neither earned nor discarded, they merely are, and our responsibility is merely to love our neighbors in whatever way we can, as Jesus calls us to do.

It's difficult to see past the advantages under which we live, and to see the good in those who differ from us. I pray that God will enlighten our eyes to see, will bolster our ears to hear, and will encourage our hearts to love people whose advantages differ from our own, or who seem to have no advantages that we can recognize.

May we love God completely, and love our neighbors wholly, in Jesus' name. Amen



Parish Nursing Notes.....

With the recent cold temperatures and occasional snow flurries, we are reminded of the approaching holiday season – and also of the more rapidly approaching flu season! So as we start thinking about possible gifts for others, we can do something about giving others a gift for good health – flu prevention.



How do we do that? We start by getting a flu shot. The flu vaccine is safe, does not cause the flu, and can protect the ones you love. An annual flu vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older. Pregnant women, young children, older

people, and people with certain chronic conditions like asthma, diabetes, and heart disease are at increased risk of serious flurelated complications. So getting a yearly flu vaccine is especially important for them. And if YOU get a flu shot, you can't pass YOUR flu on to others! And if you DO get the flu, call your doctor. There are anti-viral prescription drugs that can treat your illness and help prevent complications.

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly from person to person through droplets made when people with the flu cough, sneeze, or talk. But flu viruses may also spread when people touch something with flu virus on it and then touch their mouth, eyes, or We think of public nose. restrooms as a place where germs and viruses are spread. telephone, computer railings, keys, light switches, and many more objects are touched daily by multiple individuals. And as we do not wash our hands before and after using them. The flu virus can be passed on to others beginning the day before symptoms are present and up to 5-7 days after becoming sick.

What else can we do to avoid getting the flu or passing it on? Follow Isaiah 1:16, "So wash your hands. Make yourselves

clean. Get your evil actions out of my sight. Stop doing what is wrong! Learn to do what is right." Wash your hands with soap and water frequently. Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, and throw it in the trash after you use it. Avoid toughing your eyes, nose and mouth. Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated and touched by many people. Avoid close contact with sick people, and while sick, limit your contact with others to keep from infecting them. avoid shaking hands when "sharing the peace" in church, or wiping your hands with a disinfectant before and after. So, if you are sick, stay home, drink plenty of liquids, and get plenty of rest. And if you are healthy, share Jesus' love by taking the sick the standard chicken soup or other fluids, and caring for their children.


