From the Pastor:

Peace on earth was spoken by the host of angels when the birth of Jesus had been announced by one to the shepherds keeping watch over their flocks by night in the hills overlooking the town of Bethlehem. As we traveled back from a short vacation recently, Christmas songs were playing on the radio, but some did not really seem to be Christmas songs. One was "Let There Be Peace on Earth (and Let It Begin with Me)." This particular one was performed by Vince Gill and his daughter, and it was from his 1993 Christmas album of the same title. It is also apparently the final song included with the "IllumiNations" fireworks show at Epcot Center in the Walt Disney World Resort in Florida every year during the holidays. It works very well as a Christmas song, since the angel did indeed announce peace... but it was not written as a Christmas song, and is used year-round for many purposes—and that is as it should

Jill Jackson-Miller wrote the lyrics in 1955 according to an article in Wickipedia. That article reports that she had been suicidal after the failure of a marriage, and that she claims to have written those lyrics after discovering the life-saving joy of God's peace and unconditional love. This song of peace was presented first at a retreat for youth high in the mountains of California. It was not a holiday celebration, but an attempt to bring together people who did not automatically gather with one another. They were teenagers selected from their schools for the week-long event from different racial, cultural, and

economic backgrounds, brought together to experiment with creating understanding and friendship through education, discussion groups, and living and working together in a camp situation. (From "A Brief History of "Let There Be Peace on Earth, and Let It Begin with Me", Jan-Lee Music)

The song traveled home with the teens and was shared with their families, schools, churches, and clubs. It has by now flown around the world, and is used by peoples of various nations, cultures, and faiths. Lyrics are sometimes altered to reflect differing needs, but the whole retains the longing for peace on earth, without the greed for power so prevalent in our world.

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem, and laid to rest in a manger (a feeding trough for the animals), shepherds watching over their flocks in the nearby fields were encountered by an angel of the Lord. This angel was surrounded by God's glory, shining, and understandably the shepherds were terrified. The angel reassured them, however, saying, "Do not be afraid. I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger."

Suddenly there was with the angel many more... all of whom were praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace, good will to people. (This and the previous paragraph come from



Luke 2, various translations.)

How is peace obtained? Is it a magical occurrence since Christ has come? Or, might Jesus Christ be the inspiration and the possibility for the people to work for peace, especially when peace seems unobtainable, when hope seems to

die—on a cross in Jerusalem?

It was 1988 when Michael Jackson's "Man in the Mirror" was released as a single. He did not write the song, but added his personal commitment with the lines: I'm starting with the man in the mirror. I'm asking him to change his ways. And no message could have been any clearer: If you wanna make the world a better place, take a look at yourself and then make a change.

The birth of Jesus brings hope and promises peace. His death and resurrection brings forgiveness—that we may rise again after every failure, and strive again for peace on earth. Let there be peace on earth, in Jesus' name. Amen



Parish Nursing Notes.....

All of a sudden, we're in the middle of the holiday season. There is snow on the ground, below freezing temperatures, and Christmas decorations up all over. People are making plans for Christmas, trying to think of the perfect gift for all those on their list. But what we have to remember is written in James 1:17, and I like the Kid's Study Bible version best. "Every good and perfect gift is from God. It comes down from the Father."

And that reminds me of an essay my 12 year old great-niece wrote for school. They were asked to write about what they wanted to do when they grew up. She wrote that she always wanted to be a princess at Disney World, but had recently changed her mind. She didn't want to be that far away from her family, cousins, and other relatives

who all live in the mid-west. What she liked best were the twice yearly get-togethers with everyone—at Christmas, and the summer camping trip. At Christmas we all get together at our house. And the kids enjoy sledding together, sitting in front of the wood stove, working together to fill our wood rack, and planning a play to perform in front of the grownups. In summer, we all get together on a camping trip which includes a group hike, bonfires, and another play to perform for us. In between, they make phone calls, send letters, and post occasional photos on face book. Family is a wonderful example of "a good and perfect gift from God." And I am so glad she realizes that. Both my sisters and I had tears on our cheeks when her mother let us read it! She ended the essay by saying she hoped that her children would enjoy similar experiences, and that she would be able to look down from heaven and see her grandchildren and greatgrandchildren enjoying them, and each other, as well. That essay was "a perfect gift" for us!

As the holidays approach, we have to pause and remember what we should really be celebrating: the gift of God's

Son. Advent is a time for hope, joy, love, and family not mounds of gifts and copious amounts of food. Consider what has real meaning for you. Is it the family gathering with all the shared and cherished memories, singing "Silent Night" on Christmas Eve (with tears streaming down my face), watching the face of a young child as they gaze in wonder at the lit Christmas tree, or hugging the friend from far away who has returned home for Christmas? After everyone else has gone to bed, my sisters and I often stay up, talking and sharing Very often a memories. certain word or glance will send us into gales of laughter, leaving the others wondering about our sanity. The decorations do not matter at all, except for the memories they stir up.

"And we have received God's Spirit so we can know the wonderful things God has freely given us." 1 Corinthians 2:12.

This holiday season, remember the spirit of Christmas, share your presence with others, reduce your stress, and create meaningful traditions that demonstrate God's love..... Jean


