From the Pastor:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

In August, I tend to write about vacations, or priming up for the fall resumption of activity. This year, something else sneaked into my consciousness, and I'm inspired to write something different.

It was some time ago that a cousin involved with the military posted a challenge that he'd received trying to increase the awareness of veteran suicides (that is, suicides of people who are veterans of the military). The statistic given was that twenty-two military veterans commit suicide every day. Therefore, the challenge was to do twenty-two push-ups every day for twenty-two days.

I'm not entirely certain how that statistic was determined, and I have read an article that tries to explain it away and assert that the actual statistic is much lower. That article says that the statistic comes from a study that included fewer than half the states in our nation, rather than being a straight report.

However, suicide is a problem growing more prevalent in our country, and not just among those who have served in the military.

Recently I opened a book that begins with a quote that lists its author as unknown. I tried to validate the quote, but could not find it anywhere, so I'll share that quote also with the author unknown: I have nobody to talk to, to confide in and share my problems with. I have nobody to cheer me up when I'm down, nobody to love or love me back. I have nobody. I am alone. unknown

While attempting to discern the source of that quote, I came upon a query from a person who wondered if it was normal not to have a friend close enough to trust with the kinds of things you don't want shared beyond the confines of that relationship. The answer I read is that this actually is normal.

TV and novels often give the impression that everyone has that one best friend with whom anything can be shared, and when such a thing is not the case, we might wonder if there is something wrong with us.

When we wonder that, we might feel as if we are more alone than anyone else in the world.

Is this one reason suicides seem to be occurring more often in today's world?

When people die by suicide, some are quick to condemn them as having committed a crime from which they cannot repent. It's not that easy, though. It's not that clear.

Today, we've come to realize that suicide is a result (usually) of depression or other disorders that are not easily treated. Many stressors come together at the wrong time and people are



overwhelmed. They believe they are helping the people around them by removing themselves, when the opposite is true. The people around them are the ones to suffer the most when suicide occurs.

When Jesus knew that he was about to be put to death by Temple authorities via the Roman occupation, he prayed for that cup of suffering to be removed, but it was not. He died an excruciating death on a wooden cross. We don't call that suicide, even though with the power of God Jesus could have avoided his death. His resurrection gives hope to all... but many who live with depression are unable to hope.

As we live our lives, I'm hoping that we are able to shine the light of hope in this world in a way that reaches people who suffer from loneliness, fear, or depression. I'm hoping we can reveal God's love in this hurting world with a different kind of push-up, the kind that pushes up those who feel weighed down. Let us love one another. Amen

Jesus knew the importance of rest, relaxation, and renewal. time **is** taken, it is filled with as much activity as can possibly be crammed into it. God gave us a beautiful world with varying and special seasons. our blessings in each of them. He gave us family and friends as additional blessings to enjoy in He gave us this world. wonderful bodies that are able to do necessary work, but also require rest and relaxation. Most importantly, He gave us His Son, to carry our burdens and give us rest.

We can incorporate rest and relaxation into our lives in other ways on a daily basis. Practice deep-breathing from abdomen several times a day. Take a minute-vacation by imagining yourself in your favorite place. Make time each day for a walk outside. Play with vour children grandchildren. Watch a sunset (or a sunrise). Read the book you've been wanting to get into. Go to an outdoor concert in the park. Take a picnic lunch to a park, the beach, or your own back yard, and listen to the sounds of water, birds, or children playing. There are many ways to uplift your spirit as well as your body, and most of them are free!

Our minds need first aid for all the planning, activity, facts, and figures that tend to cram into our every waking moment. Social first aid includes sharing time, thoughts, and feelings with our family and friends. Let them know how much they are appreciated. We need to share our blessings with others—with friends, and those who are not yet friends.


