From the Pastor:

"When Can We Reopen?"

As I write this June article, the CDC has just released a lowkey guide to reopening. The earlier draft has been altered so that the guidelines for houses of worship have been eliminated. This may be partly because in this country, the freedom of religion and how we worship is a founding element of our society. It is a prime reason some people braved the crossing of an ocean with no guarantee of landing safely on the very differently, at least for a other side. Because of our emphasis on freedom of religion, there seems to be no end of controversy when someone attempts to tell the church what we can and cannot do!

Earlier this month, I posted an article on our congregational Facebook page that shares the story of a church in Calgary, Alberta, longing for a do-over, as they live with deaths that occurred among members of their congregation after having celebrated the birthday of a member before quarantine guidelines were issued. They used sanitizer. They maintained distance between celebrators. Several still became infected. Some died.

Just today (May 20), I read how Catoosa Baptist in Ringgold, Georgia and Holy Ghost Catholic in Houston, Texas (both of which had reopened) quickly suspended in-person services again after members and leaders tested positive for the coronavirus shortly after reopening. The people were careful to stay six feet apart and walked in and out without having to touch the doors. The Catholic church mentioned has seating for 900, but downsized to 179 upon reopening. They closed again after one of its priests died of complications from the virus on May 13.

When we are able again to gather, we will need to do things while. We will likely be cautioned against singing, because singing produces aerosols that can carry the virus through most masks a distance of (possibly) 30 feet which can apparently hang in the air for hours. Speaking in unison (as we do with the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles' Creed) may have a similar effect.

Holy Communion, which we've been practicing the first and second Sundays of the month may not be able to happen within our public gatherings for even longer, because we cannot eat or drink without removing the masks which can help to protect others from what we exhale when breathing. (Because of this, we are including again in this newsletter the liturgical order for practicing the sacrament at home, with bread and wine (or juice or water).



We are not resisting gathering out of fear of this virus, because we know that "whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's" (Romans 14:8). We know that there have been few cases in the immediate area. We do not, however, wish to be the source of further suffering for people in our community.

Please continue to share God's love with your neighbors (near and far) by speaking with them on the phone or by other means available in today's world. Please remember that God does not leave us orphaned in a wild world. Please know that you are loved, that God walks with us through all adversity, even through a world-wide pandemic.

God is with you always, as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Parish Nursing Notes.....

While we are still trying to protect ourselves from the Covid-19 Virus, and being conscious of its symptoms, we also have to be aware of a usual annual problem in our area. I'm talking about the wood ticks that are now making their presence known. While they are not as wide spread as the corona virus, and not as fatal, they do still cause some illnesses that can be problematic.

There are three main species of ticks that cause problems in our area. The blacklegged tick (formerly known as the deer tick) is the one most likely to cause problems around here. But the American dog tick (also known as the wood tick) and the lone star tick are also found. They emerge at different times of the year, but to be safe, we can plan on it being "tick season" from the tine the snow melts through the end of summer.

There are several illnesses that can be passed along to humans through a tick bite. We are probably most aware of Lyme Disease, which is the most prevalent one in our area. But you have likely heard of other illnesses that have occurred here as well, including Anaplasmosis, Ehrlichiosis, Babesiosis, and Powassan illness. Some ticks may be infected with three, or even four of the diseases listed. Some symptoms that may occur if you have been bitten and infected with one of these include a red rash around the bite, fever, chills, or muscle and joint aches. If you know you have been bitten

by a tick, and experience any of these symptoms it is a good idea to consult a doctor. You should also see a doctor if you find a blacklegged tick attached to your body that is engorged with blood. This would indicate it has been attached to the site for more than the one-to-two day period, and a short course of antibiotics may be recommended.

As we are now into our spring season, it is a good idea to keep ticks at the forefront oy your mind whenever you spend time outdoors. Ticks like wooded, grassy, and brushy areas, and are most likely found on the forest floor, or near the ground. They can't fly and land on you, you have to come into contact with them.

Experts recommend using a good tick repellent containing DEET. Or, even better, a repellent containing permethrin, which can be sprayed on cloth-



ing. It's always a good idea to wear long pants, and tuck your pants into your

socks, too. And it is imperative to always do a good "tick check" after being outdoors. Ticks are very tiny and can be very difficult to see. In the nymph stage they may be only the size of a poppy seed. They must be attached to your body for one to two days to transmit disease, so early detection is the key. If you find a tick, remove it promptly. Grab it as close to your skin as possible, using either a tweezer or your fingers.

"Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom." (James 3:13) God has granted us wisdom. Let us use it in caring for ourselves and in caring for others.



Sunday, June 7, 2020

The Holy Trinity

Though the word *trinity* is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.

Prayer of the Day: God of heaven and earth, before the foundation of the universe and the beginning of time you are the triune God: Author of creation, eternal Word of salvation, life-giving Spirit of wisdom. Guide us to all truth by your Spirit, that we may proclaim all that Christ has revealed and rejoice in the glory he shares with us. Glory and praise to you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever. **Amen.**

Genesis 1:1--2:4a, The creation of the heavens and the earth Psalm 8, How majestic is your name in all the earth! 2 Corinthians 13:11-13, Paul's farewell to the church at Corinth Matthew 28:16-20, Living in the community of the Trinity

Sunday, June 14, 2020

2nd Sunday after Pentecost

Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

Prayer of the Day: God of compassion, you have opened the way for us and brought us to yourself. Pour your love into our hearts, that, overflowing with joy, we may freely share the blessings of your realm and faithfully proclaim the good news of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen**.

3rd Sunday after Pentecost

God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads. Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.

Prayer of the Day: Teach us, good Lord God, to serve you as you deserve, to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to labor and not to ask for reward, except that of knowing that we do your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

4th Sunday after Pentecost

The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. In today's gospel, Christ promises that the disciple who gives a cup of cold water to the little ones serves Christ himself. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

Prayer of the Day: O God, you direct our lives by your grace, and your words of justice and mercy reshape the world. Mold us into a people who welcome your word and serve one another, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen**.

Readings

Jeremiah 28:5-9, The test of a true prophet Psalm 89:1-4, 15-18, Your love, O Lord, forever will I sing. Romans 6:12-23, No longer under law but under grace Matthew 10:40-42, Welcome Christ in those he sends.

An option for Communion in your household

A NOTE ABOUT HOLY COMMUNION

The church is anywhere people gather in Jesus' name. When we cannot meet in a church building, God continues to be present in the creative and intentional ways we gather for worship, even when we are limited to gathering in spirit because we live alone.

Holy Communion is a special meal we celebrate when we worship. The bread and wine are mysteriously the real presence of Jesus Christ, and we trust that Jesus is really with us in this meal. When we cannot gather for this meal in a church building together, it is acceptable either to:


- + 1.) Fast from Holy Communion until you can worship with others in your church building, OR
- + 2.) Celebrate Holy Communion in your home.

CREATING AN ALTAR TABLE AT HOME

+ Prepare your table for the meal – Gather some kind of bread and wine, grape juice, or water (knowing that Jesus can turn water into wine).

WORSHIP

- If possible, participate in a worship service provided on television, the radio, or the Internet +
- + If the service includes communion, participate with the leadership.
- + If the service does not include communion, use this order to have communion after it is completed.



Include Confession (likely was part of the service, and is part of the Lord's Prayer). You may have a prayer of confession of your own, and remember God's promise of forgiveness.

+ Speak the WORDS OF INSTITUTION +

(Holding the bread) In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, given for you Do this for the remembrance of me."

(Holding the cup) Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Pray the Lord's Prayer: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen

Eat the bread and drink the wine, juice, or water as works best for everyone who is present, declaring that the bread is the body of Christ, given for each one, and that the cup is the blood of Christ, shed for each one.

Speak the blessing: The body and blood of Jesus Christ strengthen us and give us peace. Amen.
