From Pastor Michelle

Our first outdoor in-person worship event (that actually happened) this year occurred on August 23. The day was overcast and started out a bit misty, but by ten o'clock, 21 people were gathered (well-spaced) on the lawn.

As you can see elsewhere in this newsletter, we'll be doing this again on September 20 and on October 4 (maybe with jackets!). We'll also programs begin to have limited gathering opportunities through the inside our worship space. The first of these is planned for September 27.

So far (I'm writing on August 24), we've not been hit terribly hard by the virus here in Douglas County. Though cases have been rising, none (as of yet) have resulted in death. Few have even required hospitalization. This is good, and it is tempting for us to relax, to return to what was normal before the appearance of this virus. After all, were we not already behaving well, to avoid infection? Were we not already washing our hands, if not as thoroughly, at least regularly?

Our council includes people who work in emergency response, education, manufacturing, the legal system, service, and delivery. Most members are in contact with people regularly, and encourage us to follow good practices. Some would rather keep the building shut for the foreseeable future out of an abundance of caution. Some believe we are being too cautious. Yet, the consensus as we have gathered is to move cautiously forward out of an abundance of love for the people of God here at Concordia and in the surrounding community.

One of the problems I see in the general response to this pandemic is in our choice of language. We speak of **Social Distancing.** I understand that this is meant that we maintain our distance from one another when gathering socially, but I believe a better term would be

Physical Distancing.

It is good for us to maintain social contacts while physically distancing from one another. Some do this with online programs through the Internet. Some are faithfully calling one another on the phone. Some



are calling on the phone those they didn't call previously, just to say hello and ask how things are going.

Some are also cautiously visiting with a limited group of people who are also cautious in those with whom they come into contact. The other day, I saw a list called "Advice from 1918" which was titled, "Do's and Don't's for Influenza Prevention." In parentheses was "Douglas Island." (I don't have any further information on its origin, not even whether it comes from health advisers...) Much of the advice was very similar to that which we receive today. It began with "Wear a mask." Further down it advised us not to neglect our mask. I'm unsure whether that meant to keep it clean or just keep it handy! However, the final piece of advice was unexpected, and in all caps:

DON'T WORRY.

In addition to Jesus' cautions against worry, I remind you of Paul's letter to the Philippians, in which he says, "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." (4:6) Blessings! *Pastor Michelle*



Parish Nursing Notes.....

Several years ago, I wrote a newsletter article that seems to fit in well with our current situation in this country. It was based on a phrase that a pastor used at a synod assembly that I attended. The phrase was, "well-to-do." But he did not use it to refer to financial status. Instead he added two words to it, making it, "well-to-do God's work." And it strikes me that this is a good time for us to re-visit that phrase.

In our church, it is currently closed for gathering together, and we are searching for a new secretary. The only place we socialize is on Facebook! And nationally we are dealing with "social Isolation" as a result of the Covid-19 virus, and social unrest and violence on a large scale. But God still has lots of work for us to do—perhaps more than ever! And we are all called to help in whatever way we can. Romans 12:6 reminds us we all have different gifts, and every time we use them we are doing God's work In many different ways.

Staying well enough to do God's work not only helps others, it has many benefits for us as well. It helps us to:

- avoid lifestyle-related illness
- feel better in mind and body
- role-model healthy behaviors for our children
- age with strength and dignity
- decrease overall health costs

- be better stewards of gifts given by God
- endure hardships with resilience and grace
- have a healthier relationship with God
- be a more effective participant in the congregation, work place, and world.

Being "well" doesn't just refer to our physical wellbeing. It also includes our emotional, social, intellectual, vocational, and spiritual well-being. If one area is out of balance, the others are affected as well. And working on any one of these can help restore

balance in all of them.



As summer ends, we can work on our physical wellness. We have easier access to fresh fruits and vegetables from our own gardens and local Farmer's Markets. And we can get outside (with masks) for exercise and fresh air. Our usual reunions and gatherings with relatives and friends may be limited to virtual ones—but we can still do that! And with vacation time, or being cut back on work hours, we can develop our intellectual or vocational wellness. We have time to read, or develop new skills for the vocational part. In our part of the country, we can often develop a spirit of thankfulness—for the few days of warmth (without the humidity), the sun, and time for relaxation. But very often we get so distracted with all these things, that we forget the spiritual part, and our relationship with God.

So, this summer take stock of your "wellness" status, and of all the gifts you have been given. Decide what areas need more focus, and what gifts you have been given to share. Then come back ready and "well-to-do God's work" in our church and community.

Our First Pandemic Opportunity for In-Person Worship

(Inside the building)
Sunday, September 27, 2020

On Sunday, September 27, we will have an opportunity for a limited number of households to gather for worship inside our worship space at Concordia.

The elevator will be available. One household unit (for example, a married couple) in the elevator at a time.

Those who do not need the elevator are asked to enter by the main doors on the far west side, and to leave (one household at a time) through the hall by the pastor's office and out the tower door.

Seating will be according to the attached floor map of the worship space. Each household would sit in the area of a purple dot. (The worship space will also have indicators where seating is available.)

Masks will be required, and will be available at the entrances.

Offering boxes will be placed near the entrance and near the exit.


Singing will be limited, and verbal responses will be allowed.

We are exploring how Holy Communion might be made available at this worship service.

If you plan to come, you must call ahead and let us know. Priority (at this first service) will be given to those members who are unable to join us online. However, if you are able to join us online and want to come, please call. We do not (at this time) have a reliable estimate of how many will wish to be in the building.

If you are sick (even if it's just a cold), do not gather in person for worship.

Hand sanitizer will be available.



Attendees will be trusted to practice proper care in use of restrooms (if needed).

Attendance will be recorded (process yet to be determined) in the event of the need for contact tracing. (If someone has been at worship who soon after tests positive, we need to know who to contact.)

If all goes well, and if the community does not experience a large rise in cases, we expect to be able to continue this practice beginning the second Sunday in October for the near future. (Worship on the first Sunday in October is scheduled to be outdoors.)

14th Sunday after Pentecost

Conflict is a part of relationships and life in community. Jesus' words in today's gospel are often used in situations having to do with church discipline. The prophet Ezekiel tells of warning the wicked to turn from their ways, and Paul reminds us that love is the fulfilling of the law. We gather in the name of Christ, assured that he is present among us with gifts of peace and reconciliation.

Prayer of the Day: Glorious God, your generosity waters the world with goodness, and you cover creation with abundance. Awaken in us a hunger for the food that satisfies both body and spirit, and with this food fill all the starving world; through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

In today's second reading Paul questions why we judge one another, since we all stand before the judgment of God. Yet we do sin against one another, and Jesus' challenge that we forgive seventy-seven times reveals God's boundless mercy. When we hear the words of forgiveness in worship and sign ourselves with the cross, we are renewed in baptism

Prayer of the Day: O Lord God, merciful judge, you are the inexhaustible fountain of forgiveness. Replace our hearts of stone with hearts that love and adore you, that we may delight in doing your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen**.

16th Sunday after Pentecost

Matthew narrates one of Jesus' controversial parables in which Jesus says that the reign of God is like that of a landowner who pays his workers the same wage no matter what time of day they began to work. When God changes God's mind about punishing Nineveh for their evil ways, Jonah is angry. Yet God is gracious and merciful, abounding in steadfast love. In baptism we receive the grace of God that is freely given to all. As Martin Luther wrote, in the presence of God's mercy we are all beggars.

Prayer of the Day: Almighty and eternal God, you show perpetual lovingkindness to us your servants. Because we cannot rely on our own abilities, grant us your merciful judgment, and train us to embody the generosity of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. **Amen.**

Jesus' parable about two sons who don't do what they say reveals surprises in the reign of God. In the reading from Ezekiel the people claim the ways of the Lord are unfair, while God offers repentance and new life. Paul urges us to look to Christ as a model of humility, putting the interests of others above our own. Nourished by the broken bread and shared cup, we offer our lives for the sake of our needy world.

Prayer of the Day: God of love, giver of life, you know our frailties and failings. Give us your grace to overcome them, keep us from those things that harm us, and guide us in the way of salvation, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord **Amen**.
