From Pastor Michelle

It's March of 2021. They say that hope springs eternal, but today we are living in a season of lament. This entire month is within the season of Lent, as we ponder the journey of Jesus toward the cross of his crucifixion, and we might wonder what life today has to do with his suffering some two centuries ago.

Is the suffering of people today comparable to that of Jesus? Is the darkness that marks our lives in any way similar to the darkness of the days when people travelled mostly by foot, and only the most wealthy had access to carriages or wagons?

I read an article recently about a man who'd committed a crime spree (with a bunch of friends) that resulted in the deaths of two people when he was 15 years old. Eisenhower was president at the time, and he and his friends received life without the sentences possibility of parole. In more recent years, this kind of sentence has been considered inappropriate for juveniles. this man Yet was not interested in parole. If he was to be "out," he wanted to be able to cross state lines in order to visit his surviving sibling, who is ailing (He himself is remarkably healthy!)

In February of 2021, Joe Ligon became a free man, living in a home that cares for elderly people (he's 83), and hoping to do some work similar to what he was good at in prison, pushing a broom. I'm hoping that things go well for him.

I'm sure that some among us may say that there is no room for mercy when murder is involved, and that all who participate should be locked up for life, or executed. I'm not arguing that issue today. Instead, I want to speak of hope, particularly hope when there seems to be none.

Good Friday will be in April, but in April I will likely be focusing on Easter, so we'll address Good Friday with our Lenten focus this month.

Imagine what it was like for the disciples, for those who followed Jesus and benefited at his side from his teachings, his miracles, and his healings. The one in whom they'd come to hope as the solution to all their sufferings, the one they'd believe would to overthrow the foreign powers that ruled over Israel, had died of government execution. He had not overthrown Rome. He had not come down from the cross. He had not called down heaven a host of from powerful warriors to wield death and destruction over his enemies. Instead, he had died,



and his body lay in a borrowed tomb, without even the proper preparations for burial.

Could they hope? Could they see any promise? Could they remember the words of resurrection Jesus had spoken so often to ears that seemed deaf to anything other than their own expectations?

Joe Ligon continued to hope for freedom, even when he believed it beyond reach.

Did the disciples hope, or had they moved on to despair?

Today, I pray that any despair gives way to hope, for God does not abandon us, even when Jesus lay in the tomb; even when people who should have had longer lives continue to die. Let your life be lifted with the hope that is ours in a savior who is not overcome, even by death.

PARISH NURSING NOTES...

This month we're looking at, and experiencing, Lent. And people often focus on what food they have "given up" for Lent. And that is fine. But there are other considerations too. Lent is a particularly good time to remind ourselves that our bodies and spirits are intimately connected. And our bodies need more than food to flourish. They also need some exercise. And one good way to exercise is walking. So Lent is a good time to involve walking as well.

Some of the spiritual benefits are time for prayer, has been marveling in the body God created, giving thanks calculated for the world God created, sharing time with a companion walker, a sense of stewardship for gourneys God's gift of life. It is a time to get away from the demands of our daily routines, and to reflect and pray, and be near to God.

A walking program has physical benefits while also drawing us closer to God by adding an intentional reflective element. Stepping away (literally) from the demands of our daily routines to walk, reflect, and pray reminds us that God created us and wants to be near to us.

I love walking outside, in nature, in the beauty of God's creation. But walking outside in winter, especially in our part of the country, tends to

make me focus more on the cold temperature and the ice on the ground. But walking can be done indoors as well. And that is one of the benefits of living at New Perspectives. There are many carpeted hallways, on three floors, with railings on each side, to safely walk in comfort—without having to bundle up in coats and boots and scarves! And you always meet others to stop and exchange a few words with, and meet new people.

I recommend starting with a brief prayer, and then starting on your way. Along the way, you can continue to offer short prayers, of thankfulness and gratitude, or asking for guidance. We always stop at the end of each hall to look out the windows, and marvel at the beauty and activity we see. It's not the beautiful trees and river we would see at our house. But it is always interesting.

Walking was a main form of transportation during Biblical times, and the Bible is full of stories of the journeys. It has been



calculated that Jesus walked the equivalent of the circumference of the world based only on the journeys that are recorded in the Bible. That doesn't include all the miles He put on as a child growing up, or around the town in His adult years. We don't even come close to that!

Sacrificing a food you enjoy can help you feel connected to God during Lent. But so can a walk filled with spiritual reflections. Try it! Follow what is meaningful and works for you! "In God we live and move and have our being." (Acts 17:28).

Worship Aids for the Coming Weeks

Sunday, March 7, 2021 Third Sunday in Lent

The third covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the central one of Israel's history: the gift of the law to those God freed from slavery. The commandments begin with the statement that because God alone has freed us from the powers that oppressed us, we are to let nothing else claim first place in our lives. When Jesus throws the merchants out of the temple, he is defending the worship of God alone and rejecting the ways commerce and profit-making can become our gods. The Ten Commandments are essential to our baptismal call: centered first in God's liberating love, we strive to live out justice and mercy in our communities and the world.

Prayer of the Day: Holy God, through your Son you have called us to live faithfully and act courageously. Keep us steadfast in your covenant of grace, and teach us the wisdom that comes only through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Sunday, March 14, 2021 Fourth Sunday in Lent

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

Prayer of the Day: O God, rich in mercy, by the humiliation of your Son you lifted up this fallen world and rescued us from the hopelessness of death. Lead us into your light, that all our deeds may reflect your love, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world

Prayer of the Day O God, with steadfast love you draw us to yourself, and in mercy you receive our prayers. Strengthen us to bring forth the fruits of the Spirit, that through life and death we may live in your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Sunday, March 28, 2021 Palm/Passion Sunday

This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

Prayer of the Day Everlasting God, in your endless love for the human race you sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take on our nature and to suffer death on the cross. In your mercy enable us to share in his obedience to your will and in the glorious victory of his resurrection, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen






