From the Pastor

I saw a picture of her sitting on a park bench. She was by herself, and as I read the article, I learned why. The vaccine, of which she had received both doses, was failing to produce antibodies in her system. It may be because of the medications she needs for an organ transplant she'd received in the past. Her doctor advises her to act as if she has not been vaccinated.

On June 6, we will again be opening our doors for people to gather for worship without prior reservations. We will be spacing by temporarily removing several of the pew cushions, and instructing worshipers to sit only where there are cushions, and not to share a cushion with someone they don't already interact with regularly outside our worship space. We are still working out the logistics for distribution of communion elements, but will hopefully find something that works well for everyone that comes through our doors!

We are still requiring worshipers to wear masks during worship except while consuming the communion elements. We act out of care for people like the woman whose story I shared above,

and with recognition that our ninety-some-year-old space does not have sufficient air circulation to be safely unmasked when gatherings last more than five minutes.

Details for how we will gather are included on the last two pages inside the back cover of this newsletter. There are thirty-plus spaces for various-sized households, though some of them are in spaces of reduced visibility. We have an expanded bulletin that includes the confession and the readings so that all can not always viewed in the same participate even if they cannot see the projection.

As we regather, we are hoping to open ourselves to additional people from the neighborhood and community. We will share God's love with our neighbors, and we believe God will love us through those neighbors as well. Jesus tells us that when we love one another our joy will be full.

We are open to hearing your ideas of ways that we can safely and joyously gather. We'd like to hear your hopes for the future, both within the congregation and personally. How has this time of pandemic restrictions changed how you see the world, changed your priorities for interaction with others, changed what you see as vital and good?



What is vital and good is way by different people. This time of pandemic has also been marked with political upheaval, and arguments between parties that we could barely imagine happening when things were more "normal."

Yet we can wonder about "normal" the same way Pilate wondered about "truth." Normal today is different than it was one year ago, so let us consider instead how best to love one another as Jesus loves us today. What will that kind of love look like for those neighbors who now call this community home? What does it look like for us? Let's find out together, as we move forward as Concordia Lutheran in Superior!

June is National Men's Health Month. Living in New Perspectives, and especially now that the cafeteria is open, I have noticed that there are many more female than male residents. And most of the females are widows! And I have noticed in our church that there are many more widows than widowers.

Statistics show that men live sicker, and die younger than women. According to the Mayo Clinic site, the greatest threats to men's health are heart disease, cancer, unintentional injuries, chronic lower respiratory disease, and stroke. But a few lifestyle changes can significantly lower the risk of these common killers. And while men tend to pay great attention to the "health" of their car, they don't pay the same amount of attention to the health of their body. Women are much more likely to visit the doctor for annual examinations and preventive services than men.

Taking care of your health is not selfish or weak. Give your family the gift of your health and a longer life! Start by looking at your lifestyle and health habits, and make better choices:

Don't smoke
Eat a healthy diet, choosing fruits,
vegetables, whole grains, and lean
sources of protein
Maintain a healthy weight



Arrangements will be made for a health care professional to bring a vaccination to your home.

Worship Aids for the Coming Weeks

Sunday, June 6, 2nd Sunday after Pentecost

A house divided against itself cannot stand. Jesus makes this observation in light of charges that he is possessed. He is possessed, not by a demon, but by the Holy Spirit. We who have received the Holy Spirit through baptism have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection and knit together in the body of Christ. Those with whom we sing and pray this day are Jesus' family. With them we go forth in peace to do the will of God.

Prayer of the Day: All-powerful God, in Jesus Christ you turned death into life and defeat into victory. Increase our faith and trust in him, that we may triumph over all evil in the strength of the same Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen

Sunday, June 13, 3rd Sunday after Pentecost

The mustard seed becomes a great shrub that shelters the birds, recalling ancient images of the tree of life. We'd expect a cedar or a sequoia, but Jesus finds the power of God better imaged in a tiny, no-account seed. It's not the way we expect divine activity to look. Yet the tree of life is here, in the cross around which we gather, the tree into which we are grafted through baptism, the true vine that nourishes us with its fruit in the cup we share. It may not appear all that impressive, but while nobody's looking it grows with a power beyond our understanding.

Prayer of the Day: O God, you are the tree of life, offering shelter to all the world. Graft us into yourself and nurture our growth, that we may bear your truth and love to those in need, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen

Sunday, June 20, 4th Sunday after Pentecost

Now is the acceptable time; now is the day of salvation! Now we are in the storm, the boat almost swamped; but Jesus is here now, and when we call him, he will calm the storm. Even the wind and waves listen to him as they would to their creator. We also listen to him and are called to believe in the power of God's word in him, a power greater than all that we fear.

Prayer of the Day O God of creation, eternal majesty, you preside over land and sea, sunshine and storm. By your strength pilot us, by your power preserve us, by your wisdom instruct us, and by your hand protect us, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen

Sunday, June 27th, 5th Sunday after Pentecost

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleanness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.

Prayer of the Day Almighty and merciful God, we implore you to hear the prayers of your people. Be our strong defense against all harm and danger, that we may live and grow in faith and hope, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen



Organ Repairs and Upgrades Complete!

As many already know, we reached our fundraising goal for the organ repairs and upgrades last year. Work continued throughout the winter as originally planned, and we submitted our final payment to the M.P. Christian Organ Company on March 11, 2021. The contract that was signed in February 2019 following the annual meeting has been fulfilled! This is quite an achievement, especially considering the challenges of the coronavirus pandemic with which we have dealt for over a year now. Resounding thanks to all who contributed to the Organ Fund! Your support was essential in seeing this project to completion.

One of the most exciting (to an organist) and noticeable (to a listener) repairs was the restoration of all pipes in the Swell division (the secondary keyboard), including the upper octave! It has been a significant number of years since this portion of the organ was usable. In addition, the entire organ was upgraded to direct electric action. In short, this means there is less distance for the air to travel through the pipe chests and a lower probability of leaky pipes. Shortly after the project was completed, we experienced a few ciphers (leaky pipes) due to the settling in of the new direct electric components. However, this was anticipated and is not concerning; once everything settles in, we expect to have a much more stable organ for years to come. Our regular spring tuning of the organ will occur as soon as the weather is more consistent, since changes in temperature and humidity also affect the performance of the organ, and any final touch-ups will be completed at that time.

The pictures below show the interior of the Swell division following the completion of the repairs. The first image shows the pipes which are once again fully-functioning. The second image shows the size of the diode matrix boards, behind the white dust cover panel, which were installed as part of the upgrade to direct electric action.



for the organ! Our organists are re-familiarizing themselves with the instrument and trying new things every week.

Coming Back to the Building!

With the availability of vaccines for most of the people of our community, we will (as of June 6) now be inviting people into the building for worship without reservations! Seating will be limited to the areas marked on the map. (facing page)

Masks are still required!

We want all our members and our neighbors to be able to be here as safely as possible.

Some are not yet eligible for vaccinations.

Some are immunocompromised.

Sanctuary air circulation is minimal.

We wish to express unity with (and care for) those who cannot be vaccinated.

Long pew cushions are 9 feet, room for 5-7 people.

Cushions in the extensions under the side balconies are 6.5 feet, room for 4-5 people. Cushions in the side aisles are six feet, room for 3-4 people.

One household per cushion.

Household may include those with whom you spend extended periods of time unmasked outside this worship space even if they don't live with you.


Concordia Lutheran Council and Membership
