From the Pastor:

2022 is beginning, and I know many people who are ready to celebrate! It's not the annual New Year's Eve party that has them in anxious anticipation...it's the hope that things that have gone so wrong for so long will resolve so that we can look toward a future rather than continuing in a present marked by antagonism.

And what is this antagonism? A household in my neighborhood started flying a flag a few months back that many deem as racist. Other neighbors began to counter that display with other kinds of flags. Then someone in the same household displayed a countering banner, and the first (apparently) became offended. The breach seems now to be unmendable.

I'm thinking we need to find a way to communicate again with one another, find ways not only to speak our minds, but to listen as well. And when we listen, there is a possibility that we might begin to see things differently.

At our Annual Meeting this year, we had planned to bring up the opportunity of discussing ways that we might work together with the other ELCA congregations in Superior, as three had been in discussions of a possible consolidation, which

would involve each of them closing to open and form a new congregation gathering the gifts of each into a more sustainable whole. The discussions seemed to be going well, until they weren't... That's just one example of the difficulties in communicating well.

Should we talk politics? Should we bring up personal rights and community responsibilities? Should we ask whether we trust one another to act in good faith, or whether we expect one another to cheat in order to get our own way? Do we see conspiracies in everything that doesn't turn out the way we wanted?

I mentioned in my message on Christmas Eve that over a million people had planned to be traveling this Christmas (the number should have been over 100 million), but that something like a 1000 flights had been cancelled because of infections of those scheduled to work those flights. Another 1000 were cancelled the day of this writing. Things certainly didn't turn out according to plan for tens of thousands of people.

And we fight about it. We blame one another for not doing enough, or for doing the wrong thing (or wrong many things).



We sue people for requiring masks or vaccinations... Why are we fighting?

I was thinking that we should all ask that question, "Why are we fighting?" We should plaster that question everywhere, and see if anyone can come up with an answer that's better than, "Because I care about my own more than I care about you."

Jesus doesn't tell us to love our neighbors less than we love ourselves, but to love others just as much as we love ourselves. So we suffer inconveniences while trying to protect the person whose immune system is compromised by chemo (just one example).

Why are we fighting? Maybe it's because we don't love one another as much as we are called to do... Pastor Michelle



PARISH NURSING NOTES

The New Year is a good time to take a look at your life, and determine what you need to change or improve. And a look at your health is a good place to start. Focus on your daily habits and really think about all the things you do, or don't do, that can keep you healthy and functioning. Several years ago I wrote about "The 10 Commandments of Life." These were written in 1928 by George W. Calver, who was the first appointed doctor for the U.S. Congress at a time when senators and representatives were dying at a rate of 20 a year.

- Eat Wisely
- Drink plentifully (of water)
- Eliminate thoroughly
- Bathe cleanly
- Exercise rationally
- Accept inevitables (don't worry)
- Play enthusiastically
- Relax completely
- Sleep sufficiently
- Check up occasionally

And then added a P.S.: "Give 5% of your time to keeping well, and you wont' have to give 100% of your time getting over being sick."

If you added, "Give thanks to God daily," I think that would be a very detailed way of explaining

1 Corinthians 6:9-20: "Or do you not know you're your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own. For you were bought at a p rice therefore, **glorify God in your body**."

Changing old habits or creating new ones is hard, but making healthier choices will improve your life by preventing heart disease, diabetes, and even some cancers. Choosing healthier foods and lowing excess weight will also impact the physical problems you have from the added stress that weight adds to your joints. Change your dietary choices add movement and exercise to your day, and ask God for the strength to follow through on your plan.

Besides improving your physical health, you can improve your mental and spiritual health. What are your interests? What are your Godgiven gifts? Explore your community organizations and your church opportunities to volunteer and share. Good health is more than eating right and exercising. It is sharing the love of Jesus Christ by sharing your time and talents. Giving of yourself, benefits the recipient as well as you. It improves your mental health by focusing on others rather than yourself, and grows your spiritual life as you demonstrate your faith. It also keeps you from thinking what you want to eat next, and providing some exercise!

While care of our bodies is important and should be done out of thankfulness to God a lean and toned body is never our ultimate goal – but rather to "glorify God in your body."

Sunday, January 30, Fourth Sunday after Ephiphany

The glory of God is often revealed when and where it is least expected. God uses our lips to declare that glory, inexperienced and hesitant though they may be. God uses our love to demonstrate that glory and so urges us to exercise it. God uses Jesus of Nazareth, water and the word, bread and wine, to reveal God's glory where and when God chooses. Take heed, lest the glory of God slip through our midst unnoticed.

Prayer of the Day Almighty and ever-living God, increase in us the gifts of faith, hope, and love; and that we may obtain what you promise, make us love what you command, through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen


