From the Pastor:

Greetings in the name of Jesus, the anointed one of God.

February is considered by many to be the month of love. What does that mean for us as Christian people, as those who have been called by the Holy Spirit to believe in the triune God made known to us most especially in Jesus Christ? Let's see if we can pose an answer to that question, through taking a somewhat roundabout route to get there!

I believe most of us (if not all of us) have heard the quote from Rene Descartes in his Discourse on Method looking for an unalterable foundation. The quote is this:

I think, therefore I am. It is a good base from which to build, but where does one go from there?

One might consider: I am, therefore... what? Carrying this just a bit further: I am of Christ, therefore... what?

What is our particular calling as people of Christ? In this, we do have the base of all that is expected with Jesus' answer to the question posed him in the gospels concerning which is the greatest law. His answer was two-fold, and quite simple: Love God with all that you are, and love your neighbor as yourself.

One of the gospels encourages us to explore this

further, with another question posed to Jesus: Who is my neighbor? Jesus then tells the parable of the Good Samaritan, and the one who is neighbor in the story is the one least likely to be described as neighbor by any considering themselves to be a faithful Jew: the Samaritan!

Why were the Samaritan people considered by the Jews to be those undeserving of love?

Perhaps over-simplifying the answer to that is to say that Jews and Samaritans hated each other because each saw the other as having been unfaithful. Markers of the unfaithfulness each saw in the other side were probably as varied as the ways we judge others to have been unfaithful the ways we see them to be sinners.

At times, judgements are cast not because of actions, but due to race, and sometimes due to ethnicity... I have heard stories of Norwegians looking down their noses at others who were from "the wrong parts of Norway." (That translates to other countries as well...)

How do we move past history like that? Does this history help to explain why there are five different ELCA congregations in Superior? (There were more...)

The council has been exploring options of working together with these other ELCA congregations, and this issue was



raised also at our annual meeting. However, this kind of exploration cannot be done by council alone. If you are interested in working with a group to explore this on behalf of Concordia, please contact the church office or one of our council members. We need to look further (and closer) than just the other ELCA congregations, however, if we are truly to love our neighbor as ourselves. What expectations are good and necessary for community building? How does "stranger danger" affect our ability to be welcoming and loving of our neighbors?

In this "Month of Love" let us find ways to love those we are least likely to consider to be our neighbors—as Jesus encourages!

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see." (Hebrews 11:1)

How "hardy" is your faith? Do you just go to church on Sunday mornings, or do you really **exercise** your faith? Do you pray only in times of crisis, or do you talk with God on a regular basis? When you pray, do you ask for things you want, or for "God's will" to be done? What do you do with your faith? Do you help others in need and pray for them? And what difference does it make?

Many studies are providing evidence that health of the spirit can indeed make a difference in the health of the body. Research found that people with more religious involvement were 30% more likely to live longer that those who were less involved. In a study of patients who had undergone open-heart surgery, those we reported they drew strength and comfort from religion had only a third the risk of dying within 6 months of surgery as those who didn't. And Religious people may be more health to start with! In another study of 4000 people over age 65, people who attended services at least once a week – or frequently prayed, or studied the Bible at least once a day – had lower blood pressures than those who weren't as religiously active.

Why is this? There are several theories. Religious people often have healthier lifestyles and thus are better protected against chronic diseases. They are more likely to treat their

bodies as temples and thus care for them and comply with prescribed treatments. Religious people generally have lower stress levels resulting from a greater sense of well-being, higher life satisfaction, lower anxiety, and better coping ability. Organized religion increases one's social circle, providing emotional support, strong friendships and a sense of purpose. And a religious tradition can help people handle the unexpected upsets that life often brings. Religious beliefs help you understand and interpret negative life situations. They help you to cope, get on with life, and grow with the experience. "We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt but never in despair; there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend; and though badly hurt at many times, we are never destroyed." (II Corinthians 4:8-9)

So how hardy is <u>your</u> faith? Assess it by answering these questions:

How would you describe your **overall health**?

How does your **faith help you care for your body**, influence your thinking, and affect your relationships?

Are you generally able to **trust God** to provide for your needs, or are you more often in an anxious state?

Are you able to see **change as an opportunity** and not primarily as a loss?

Can you recall a time in which difficulties increase your awareness of Christ's presence in your life?

What support do you gain from other Christians in everyday life?

On a regular basis, what activities do you do to **nourish your faith and relationship with God**?


