From the Pastor:

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, the resurrected!

As many of you know, the wearing of masks has become optional for worship here at Concordia. You may also have noticed that I am continuing to wear a mask except during the actual leading of the worship service, when I am several feet away from the people of the congregation. My first thought was to explain why I am doing so. Then it occurred to me that if I explain why I am wearing a mask, it might give people the idea that they can question why others are wearing masks either for worship or in the general community.

It's really none of our business. We don't need to know whether a person is protecting self or others...

Early on in this pandemic, a woman posted a story on one of the local Facebook pages about another woman sneering at her for wearing a mask in the grocery store. She said she told the woman she'd woken up with a high fever, coughing, and chills (and then she proceeded to cough). The woman started to run away, so she chased her. The woman tripped and fell, and she grabbed her leg and started pulling (exactly as she was pulling the legs of the readers). It was all a joke...

Many people see the whole issue as one of freedom, railing against the government mandate that ruled we must wear them. Many also suffer discomfort in their use. Some have decided to make it a religious issue, stating that wearing a mask indicates a lack of faith in Jesus.

Please don't believe that!
There are greater things to
concern us than whether or not
you see a mask on my face (or on
the faces of others)!

One of the issues that faces us is what we as a congregation are doing for the community in which we are placed. How are we reaching out in this neighborhood? Do we know our neighbors, and in what ways can we get to know them better?

In the past, we've participated in the "National Night Out" event that occurs each August. I'm wondering if that kind of thing could happen more often, if the people of the congregation might gather on the lawn for party-like events that invite the neighborhood in on some kind of more frequent basis.

This kind of thing would require a kind of commitment that comes from more than just the council and the staff, however. It takes more than just a committee or group. It takes a kind of communal faith that believes interacting with the



neighborhood is part of Jesus' call to us as disciples. Do we have that kind of faith? Do we believe that Jesus calls us to love the neighbors who live nearby? Or would we rather take issue with the fact that our pastor is still wearing a mask before and after worship?

Of course there are a variety of ways to proclaim the love of God in Christ Jesus in this neighborhood, beyond parties on the lawn! What ideas do you have? What ways can you help those ideas to blossom and produce fruit? How are you following God's call to love God, self, and neighbor, and how can you share your methods that they may multiply in community?

Let us consider our call to love our neighbors as ourselves, and let us always love God with everything we are. In Jesus' name. Pastor Michelle



PARISH NURSING NOTES

Have you ever thought about what you would look like without bones? You would look kind of like a big blob with no particular structure, and no way to move about in a purposeful manner. Bones give our body its erect structure. It's filled out with muscle and flesh (and of course, fat!). But the basic form is from our bone structure. Now that's something to be grateful for!

Bone is living, growing tissue made of collagen, a protein that provides a soft framework, and calcium phosphate, a mineral that adds strength and hardens the framework. This combination makes bone strong and flexible enough to withstand stress. Throughout life, old bone is constantly removed (resorption) and new bone is added to the skeleton. During childhood and teenage years, new bones Is added faster than old bone is removed. As a result. bones become larger, heavier, and denser. Isn't that miraculous! Around age 30 bone resorption slowly begins to exceed bone formation. If bone removal occurs to quickly, and replacement occurs too slowly, osteoporosis develops. You are more likely to develop osteoporosis if you did not reach your maximum peak bone mass during your bonebuilding years.

Women are more likely than men to develop osteoporosis. Generally they have smaller, thinner bones than men, and women can lose bone tissue rapidly in the first 4-8 years after menopause when there is a sharp decline in estrogen production. Although men do not undergo the equivalent of menopause, production of testosterone may decrease with age, and this can also lead to the development of osteoporosis.

One way to show gratitude for what we have been given is to take good care of the gift. And that includes our bones. There are many ways to take care of our bones and help prevent the development of osteoporosis. The first thing everyone thinks of are calcium supplements. But an adequate supply of calcium over a lifetime is required. The body's demand for calcium is greatest during childhood and adolescence when the skeleton is growing rapidly. Greater amounts are also needed during pregnancy and breast feeding and by postmenopausal women and older men. As you age, your body becomes less efficient at absorbing calcium and other nutrients. Older adults are also more likely to have chronic medical problems and to use medications that may impair calcium absorption. Adequate Vitamin D is also required for absorption of calcium.

There are many good food sources of calcium including low-fat dairy products (milk, yogurt, cheese, ice cream), dark green, leafy vegetables (broccoli, bok choy, spinach), sardines and salmon and almonds. In addition, many foods are fortified with calcium, such as orange juice, cereals, and breads.

Other preventive measures include exercise. Like muscle, bone responds to exercise by becoming stronger. Weight-bearing exercise (such as walking, hiking, jogging, climbing stairs, weight training, tennis, and dancing) is the best for your bones because it forces you to work against gravity. At least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week is recommended, but it can be broken up into shorter segments of 5-10 minutes. Smoking is also bad for your bones as well as your heart and lungs. And those who drink heavily are more prone to bone loss and fracture, because of both poor nutrition and increased risk of falling. Fall prevention measures, while important for everyone, are of particular importance for men and women with osteoporosis.

We may not be able to bring dead, dry bones back to life as in the Bible, but we sure can work on keeping them from drying out in the first place!


