# From the Pastor:

We start the month of November with a celebration of the resurrection. We call it "All Saints Day." We generally observe this holiday on the first Sunday in November, because it is often difficult for people to gather for worship on days other than Sunday, so this year, we'll celebrate on November 6.

It can be difficult, sometimes. to celebrate this day, because our hearts may be heavy with loss, even as we are pointed toward the resurrection, and the celebration of the new life awaiting us. As we celebrate, we read the names of those in the congregation who died since the previous reading the year before. Our reading is not perfect, as mistakes may be made, so we also include a prayer referencing "all our departed friends and relatives," giving thanks for the ways they have helped us to experience God's grace and mercy in this life.

We focus on their sainthood, as we believe there is no more sin in the resurrection. Those of us who live yet on this side of the resurrection remain yet subject to temptation and vulnerable to behaving in ways that cause suffering either in our own lives or the lives of others.

However, if this day is truly one on which *all* saints are recognized, then we ought also to

realize that we, too, as forgiven children of God, are granted that title. It's not that we are immune from sinning, or from the consequent suffering from our sins in this life. It's more that we are given a way to follow, a way that turns from practices that harm and toward expressions of God's love in community.

Advertisements are currently being broadcast for those who spent significant time at a specific military camp, because it has been discovered that the water people used at that camp was apparently contaminated, and may have led to many maladies. Contaminants are often not obvious, and slowly build within a person's system, causing problems much later that can be difficult to trace.

The world in which we live also has a kind of contamination, even though this world was declared "very good" at the time of its creation. As we live, we are in some ways encouraged to strive to put ourselves above those around us, and to view others as competition. This can be helpful as it encourages each of us to improve ourselves, but it can also be detrimental if we look down upon those we see as different. When we do that, when we view others with disdain, we are deviating from the life to which we are called as



followers of Jesus Christ. We are guilty of sin in the same way as the elders in the story of the woman caught in adultery (John 8:1-11). In that story, Jesus takes some time to respond, as they test whether he will uphold the law that prescribed her death by stoning. Finally, he declares that the one without sin should be the first to cast a stone. Not one of them could do it. Instead, every single one of them went away; not one is left to condemn her. Jesus does not condemn her, either, but advises that she not sin again—as if we could actually live without sin this side of the grave!

We are called to love as God loves, to love without judgment. We will fail, often, but Jesus will not condemn us. Instead, we are forgiven, made saints, and instructed to go out and love.

#### **PARISH NURSING NOTES**

As our families get older, and we along with them, most of us will become acquainted with dementia of some form or another. The one we think of most often is probably Alzheimer's Disease, but there are many other forms as well. The primary symptom is loss of cognitive function, and while memory loss is common, it is not the only criteria for diagnosis. Certain criteria must be met. Two of mental functions must be impaired, including memory, language skills, visual perception, or ability to focus and pay attention. The loss of function must be severe enough that the individual cannot do normal everyday tasks. Some cannot control emotions, may have personality changes, hallucinations, or delusions (a strong belief without any proof, such as someone stealing from them), and the symptoms develop slowly over time.

Usually this means that a caregiver becomes a necessity, whether this is a spouse, another family member, or one hired from outside the family. It may eventually require moving out of the family home to senior housing, assisted living, or a nursing home. But it also requires understanding and assistance on the part of the community, especially during the time the individual is living at home, senior housing, or assisted living. The individual will certainly be out in the community, deserving of respect and understanding in all interactions. I remember when my dad (who had Alzheimer's) got out of the house without my mother's knowledge one day. It was a nice fall day, and he wanted to go for a walk, but he got

lost and didn't know where he was. It was only 2 blocks from their apartment, but it didn't look familiar to him. Luckily, a woman thought he looked lost and confused, so asked him if he needed help. When he couldn't clearly explain what the problem was, she invited him to sit on the front steps with her, and have a cup of coffee, thinking someone would come looking for him – and that's where he was when I found him. By that time he had calmed down enough to tell her his name, and was visiting with his "friend."

In another instance, a female resident of an assisted living facility liked to go to a nearby café for coffee, and often was there with her daughter, but sometimes she went there on her own. On a few of these occasions, she forgot what her favorite order was, and to bring her purse along. The waitress recognized her, brought her favorite coffee, and kept a note of the tab. She also made sure she went in the right direction to get home, and she let the daughter know about it. So they set up an account for her, and the daughter would pay it monthly. We all have heard the saying, "It takes a community to raise a child." It also takes a community to support its elders or those with physical or mental disabilities.

"We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28). Help us all to remember that we are a part of those "all things" that can work together for the good of all, and that we can ALL work together for the good of ALL in our community.

# Sunday, November 6, All Saints Sunday

Abide with us, reign in us, and make this world into a fit habitation for your divine majesty, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. # Sunday, November 27, 1st Sunday of Advent

The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promises of God.

**Prayer of the Day**. Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come. By your merciful protection save us from the threatening dangers of our sins, and enlighten our walk in the way of your salvation, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen
