From the Pastor:

Greetings, in the name of the God who comes to us where we are and as we are, born a helpless child in a dangerous world.

We are using Matthew's Gospel this year, which tells of the magi visiting from the east, and the terrible event their visit with Herod triggered.

Today's world has tragedies that are also incomprehensible, but we also have many joys and advantages hardly imagined just a few years ago.

We have so much, and our ELCA has a program through which we can share of our bounty with people around the world who have much less. It begins by listening to people in those communities, people who identify needs, priorities, and solutions that can provide the largest impact.

We've ordered an ornament (paperboard) pack with several options, so if you'd like, you can "purchase" the ornament, and then give the ornament to the person in whose name you give this gift to someone across the world who will be able to use it well.

Ornaments vary in cost from \$10 to \$150, but the Good Gifts program offers larger options as well. Gifts for which we have ornaments range from farm animals or honeybees to school supplies, a microloan for a small

business, and even sanitation equipment. Additional gifts available are as extensive as a water well (\$2500) or as simple as a fruit tree seedling (\$10).

The items provided are geared toward the place in which they will be given, so we aren't sending things that will die because they don't fit the environment. Each gift also includes whatever education might be needed to ensure the ability to use it well.

More information on the gifts available (list on page 6) to be given through this program can be found in the catalog at the rear of our worship space, or online ELCA.org/goodgifts For the ornaments, make your check out to Concordia Lutheran and put your information in the chart on the board in the rear of the worship space. If there is no ornament for what you want to give, you can still make your check out to Concordia and fill in the information on the chart. The week after Christmas we will send one check for all the moneys received on one order form with the totals of all the kinds of gifts purchased (and you can avoid being added to another mailing list... ©) Of course, you can also make your gift directly online (at the underlined address in the center column).

Whatever gifts we can give



are good news to the person who receives them.

The good news for us is that we are gifted with God's mercy without being charged a fee. We are able to gather for worship without needing to purchase a ticket. The congregations of Superior will not, however, be able to continue indefinitely as we have in the past. The costs of maintaining our worship spaces and staffing continue to increase and our stewardship is challenged.

Maybe that's why the magi offered gifts in honor of the birth of Jesus. They knew that hardships arise as a matter of course, and we deal with them because we must. We give in various ways because Jesus keeps on giving love and inspiration to us. Blessings!

PARISH NURSING NOTES

It's hard to believe we're already entering Advent and the Christmas season! As a child, I remember how right after Thanksgiving, we would pour over catalogs (Sears & Roebuck and Montgomery Wards) trying to choose what to put on our Christmas lists. We would start off wanting almost everything on each page, but gradually as we studied each item, we decided on the 5-6 items we really wanted. I guess most children go through a similar routine.

I also remember, as an adult, asking my parents for suggestions of things they might like as a Christmas gift. Very often their reply would be, "We already have everything we need or want." And now, as I have reached that stage of life, I have come to share that feeling. It seems that as we mature (NOT age!), we come to an attitude of appreciation and gratitude rather than of want. And what better time to express gratitude than at Christmas when we celebrate receiving the greatest gift of all – the birth of Jesus who died for our sins.

How many other gifts have we been given that we take for granted. We say "thank you" several times a day without even thinking about it – to a waitress bringing your food, to a cashier handing you a receipt. But how often do we express real gratitude for the truly important things we have been given. At a workshop I attended several years ago, we were asked to write down 5 things we were grateful for in the past week. It took a moment to start thinking of the first one or two things – and then, as they started flooding in, I found I couldn't write fast enough! The first

things were generic – family, health, home. Then they started getting specific – the workman who "just happened" to be at our house during the October snow storm, and offered to clear the driveway of the big tree that fell across it so Dick wouldn't have to worry about it after his back surgery. And proceeded to not only remove the tree, but also cut it up into fireplace lengths and bring them to the wood shed! And my heart that kept beating regularly through Dick's recovery and his Dad's recent hospitalization. And that's just the beginning!

As I would walk on the roads out around our house, I would often find myself singing under my breath, "This is the day that the Lord has made...let us rejoice and be glad in it." And I put in my own words for all the things I am grateful for – "These are my feet that the Lord has made... this is my heart...these are the trees...this is the sun...and on and on. As I go on, I keep finding more and more things to be thankful for, and it makes the walk much more enjoyable.

Practicing gratitude is also beneficial to our health. And it doesn't cost a thing! Research has shown that it can make you happier and healthier, both emotionally and physically. Thankful people tend to take better care of themselves, exercising regularly, eating a healthy diet, and seeking regular medical care. It also builds positive feelings. One large study suggests that the positive physical attributes linked to expressing gratitude may actually help prevent heart disease. It found that people who regularly express gratitude tend to: get more and better sleep at night; have fewer headaches, nausea, pain, and other physical symptoms of illness; experience less stress; have greater resistance to illness; have a greater sense of well-being; and view life as pleasurable, interesting, and exciting.

You can start by telling God daily what you are particularly grateful for that day. I am thankful to be a part of Concordia, a beautiful building with a rich history of hardworking, faithful members. I am grateful for all of you – your friendship and support, and allowing me to be a part of your lives.

Christmas Day is Sunday, so we will gather for worship on Christmas Day at 10:00, our regular worship time.



"From Worry to Wonder" A Christmas Message from Bishop Laurie

On June 19, 2020 our granddaughter was born. She was born three months into the pandemic. Her parents were worried. Her grandparents were worried. It is challenging enough to be pregnant and give birth in the best of times but to give birth in the middle of a worldwide pandemic is an even greater worry. We worried about the unknown dangers this virus might present to the mother, the unborn baby, and the new born baby. Our worries kept us up at night. Our worries were relieved when she was finally born, perfect in every way. Our worry gave way to wonder-filled joy. Worry transformed to wonder as we looked back to see how God was holding and carrying them through the unavoidable worry. Our worry transformed to gratitude and wonder watching for what God would be up to next in her tiny life.

It's December 2022. We prepare to celebrate the birth our Lord Jesus. This Advent we come with our fears and worries too. We are living in the midst of challenging times in our country. The very foundation of our nation seems less stable. We each come with our own personal set of worries and fears about our families, health, finances, work, safety, the future...What is it that keeps you up at night? What are you worried about today?

Folks across our church are experiencing doubts and uneasiness about the future of their church. Does it keep you up at night? What are the threats to your church's future? How can the conversation move from fear and worry to wonder? As the miracle of Christ's birth is celebrated this season, we can move from worry to wonder. We wonder what God is up to now in this day and age. Together we wonder what God's will is for the future of our church. Together we wonder; how can we use the abundance and blessings, (what we do have and opportunities in front of us), to make a difference in Jesus' name.

Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. Luke 2:8-10a

Shepherds living in the fields watched over their sheep to keep them safe. There were dangers that kept the shepherds up at night and plenty of things for the shepherd's to worry about in the cold night like wild animals, predators, thieves, & bad weather. There was so much to worry about, but one night an angel of the Lord, all shiny and bright appeared and transformed their fears and worldly worry to divine wonder.

To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" Luke 2:11-14

Friends, you are precious, beloved, baptized children of God. We know that the antidote to worry is to trust in God.

During this Advent, Christmas and Epiphany season I pray that your worries will be transformed to wonder at what God is doing and promises to do in your lives and in our churches. May the miracle of Christ's birth transform your worries to wonder! I am grateful for your partnership in ministry.

Prayer of the Day: Stir up the wills of all who look to you, Lord God, and strengthen our faith in your coming, that, transformed by grace, we may walk in your way; through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Sunday, December 18, Fourth Sunday of Advent

Today Isaiah prophesies that a young woman will bear a son and name him Emmanuel. The gospel is Matthew's account of the annunciation and birth of the one named Emmanuel, Godwith-us. During these final days of Advent we pray, "O come, O come, Emmanuel," a beloved hymn based on the O Antiphons, ancient prayers appointed for the seven days preceding Christmas. On this final Sunday of Advent we prepare to celebrate the birth of the one born to save us from the power of sin and death.

Prayer of the Day (for December 18): Stir up your power, Lord Christ, and come. With your abundant grace and might, free us from the sin that hinders our faith, that eagerly we may receive your promises, for you live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

In winter's deepest night, we welcome the light of the Christ child. Isaiah declares that the light of the long-promised king will illumine the world and bring endless peace and justice. Paul reminds us that the grace of God through Jesus Christ brings salvation to all people. The angels declare that Jesus' birth is good and joyful news for everyone, including lowly shepherds. Filled with the light that shines in our lives, we go forth to share the light of Christ with the whole world.

Prayer of the Day. Almighty God, you made this holy night shine with the brightness of the true Light. Grant that here on earth we may walk in the light of Jesus' presence and in the last day wake to the brightness of his glory; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Today we celebrate the incarnate Word, God becoming flesh to live among us in the person of Jesus Christ then and now. Emboldened by the good news of Christ's birth, along with the shepherds, Mary and Joseph, and all witnesses to the light of Christ, we declare to the world that we have indeed seen and been transformed by the arrival of "the salvation of our God." O come, let us adore!

Prayer of the Day. All-powerful and unseen God, the coming of your light into our world has brightened weary hearts with peace. Call us out of darkness, and empower us to proclaim the birth of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen


