# From the Pastor:

Grace to you and peace.
February is a beautiful month, even though it always seems to me to be the coldest month of the year! This month we honor those who have served in the presidential office of the USA. This month many celebrate amorous love. Almost always, Transfiguration Sunday is in February, and almost as often, so is Ash Wednesday. This year, Ash Wednesday is on the last Wednesday in the month: February 22.

As I was working to determine the theme for our Lenten series this year, I ran across a new series that is woven around a hymn that is a favorite of many, "Amazing Grace." That series claimed this to be the perfect time to do this, because it was the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the writing of its words. However, that writing must be a year old, because the words were written in 1772!

After studying the sample from that series, I also realized that that series' format would be difficult to weave into our setting. Instead, we're going to use the hymn as an anchor for each one of our Wednesday gatherings, along with a Scripture Reading and a dramatic monologue based on particular characters of the Bible.

On Ash Wednesday we'll

hear from the **paralytic** who was let down through the roof to see Jesus, and on March 1 **Peter's mother-in-law** will speak to us.

March 8 will bring Mary
Magdalene, followed by
Thomas on March 15. That last
two Wednesdays in Lent will
bring Martha and her brother
Lazarus, respectively.

Each of these people from our Bibles will speak of the amazing grace they received from their encounters with Jesus, and encourage us as well to recognize God's amazing grace in our lives.

Before the Lenten season begins, we will offer an opportunity for the people to learn a bit more about what inspired John Newton's writing of "Amazing Grace," and how William Wilberforce was inspired to work to end the slave trade in Britain. On Transfiguration Sunday, February 19, we will show a movie in the fellowship hall downstairs after worship. Our video license does not allow us to publish the name of that movie, but you can ask one of the staff if you want to know what it will be. (It is PG, not particularly child friendly, but we can open the youth room for the day if needed, and if we obtain a responsible volunteer.)

February before Lent begins on its last day! February is the shortest month of our year, and the one that varies every four years to account for the bit of asynchronization of our earth's daily rotation and its yearly revolution around the sun. That's one of the things I like about it. It's unique, and it uses its uniqueness to take care of all the rest that doesn't fit!

Each one of us is also unique, though we are not required to fix whatever goes wrong around us. We can, however, use our uniqueness to gift the world around us in various ways. Our gifts can multiply with similar gifts of others, and complement differing gifts of others to create something of grace and beauty.

May your gifts be multiplied and complemented to grace all those whose lives you touch. In Jesus' name. Pastor Michelle



#### **PARISH NURSING NOTES**

February is American Heart Month, and February 5<sup>th</sup> is "Red Dress Sunday." Do you know that in Douglas County 13.9% of the population has heart problems, while in the state as a whole only 4.9% do? And in Douglas County the stroke rate is 4.5% compared to 2.2% in the state as a whole. Other than the fact that it is located in your chest, slightly to the left of the midline, what do you know about your heart and how it functions?

### DO YOU KNOW.....

Your heart has the ability to initiate impulses causing it to contract an average of 72 times every minute, 60 minutes every hour, 24 hours every day (waking and sleeping), 365 days every year, every year of your life for as long as you live. And how many years that is, depends largely on how well you take care of your heart! And calculating the number of contractions is more math than I want to attempt! What other electrical system do you know of that will work that well for that length of time?!

Not only that, but it will also pump harder or faster depending on the need, based on activity, altitude, temperature, body conditions, or emotions. The blood vessels will also expand or contract to enhance or decrease the blood flow depending on those factors. You don't have to think about it, or decide what or when it should make those adjustments – it

happens automatically. How many pumps do you know of that will work that well for that long?

In addition, it has to coordinate four chambers and four sets of valves to keep the blood flowing in the right direction, at the right rate of flow. You know what it is like to coordinate an event for even a short time span. How would you like having to, consciously, control that activity for that length of time?

God was a masterful engineer when He created us in His image. He created us to live a certain time span. So some functioning changes occur as we age. But He also gave us the freedom of choice. And the choices we make can speed up or accentuate those natural changes.

How can we show gratitude for, and take care of our heart? Proverbs 4:23 says, "Guard your heart above all else, for it determines the course of your life." The greatest threats to our heart health--cigarette smoking, high blood cholesterol levels, hypertension, obesity, lack of exercise—result from our life style choices.

If our hearts could talk, they would say;

"I love to exercise! Take me out for at least 30 minutes of physical activity most days of the week." Regular exercise keeps your heart strong so that it can pump more blood with less effort.

"I work best on a healthy diet." Foods such as fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and the avoidance of saturated and trans fats, help protect against heart disease.

"Smoking makes me sick!" Smoking damages the blood vessels and heart tissue, increases blood pressure, and decreases the capacity for exercise.

"When you are overweight, I suffer." Excess body weight makes the heart work harder to pump blood, which can cause the heart tissue to thicken and become stiff.

"I need regular check-ups!" Get your cholesterol and blood pressure checked regularly. (First Sunday of every month in my office!)

Proverbs 14:30 says, "A peaceful heart gives life to
the body." Help keep your heart peaceful, and show
gratitude to God, by taking good care of it.



# Sunday, February 19, Transfiguration of our Lord

Today's festival is a bridge between the Advent-Christmas-Epiphany cycle that comes to a close today and the Lent-Easter cycle that begins in several days. On a high mountain Jesus is revealed as God's beloved Son, echoing the words at his baptism. This vision of glory sustains us as Jesus faces his impending death in Jerusalem. We turn this week to Ash Wednesday and our yearly baptismal journey from Lent to Easter. Some churches put aside the alleluia at the conclusion of today's liturgy. This word of joy will be omitted during the penitential season of Lent and will be sung again at Easter.

**Prayer of the Day:** O God, in the transfiguration of your Son you confirmed the mysteries of the faith by the witness of Moses and Elijah, and in the voice from the bright cloud declaring Jesus your beloved Son, you foreshadowed our adoption as your children. Make us heirs with Christ of your glory, and bring us to enjoy its fullness, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

# Sunday, February 26, First Sunday in Lent

Today's gospel tells of Jesus' temptation in the desert. His forty-day fast becomes the basis of our Lenten pilgrimage. In the early church Lent was a time of intense preparation for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This catechetical focus on the meaning of faith is at the heart of our Lenten journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Hungry for God's mercy, we receive the bread of life to nourish us for the days ahead.

**Prayer of the Day**. Lord God, our strength, the struggle between good and evil rages within and around us, and the devil and all the forces that defy you tempt us with empty promises. Keep us steadfast in your word, and when we fall, raise us again and restore us through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen


