Carrying on her father's legacy of bringing people together in solidarity, Cedella Marley stays close to the origin songs' message as she encourages children to take ownership of their convictions and stand up for themselves and others. An energetic read aloud that promises to pump up young dissenters and peacemakers.

Layla's Happiness by Maria Hadessa Ekere Tallie.

Happiness leaps at Layla from the color purple, from the succulence of fresh plums, from the constellations of the night sky, from the mischievous delight of slurping spaghetti without a fork. It unspools from her lips as she hums while feeding the chickens at the community garden and names all the trees and greets the neighbors at the farmers' market where she sells the vegetable she has grown from seeds. It pours forth from the poetry her mother reads to her under a makeshift tent and from the tales her father tells her of his own childhood in the South.

With her new backpack and light-up shoes, Faizah knows the first day of school is going to be special. It's the start of a brand-new year, and best of all, it's her older sister Asiya's first day of hijab--made of a fabric of beautiful blue, like the ocean waving to the sky.
