

From the Pastor...

The Augsburg Confession in Article XIV states: "It is taught among us that nobody should publicly teach or preach or administer the sacraments in the church without a regular call." The Apology of the Augsburg Confession goes on to declare: "We know that the church is present among those who rightly teach the Word of God and rightly administer the sacraments." This is the Office that Christ instituted and into which the Church calls qualified men. As adult members of the Church, you have a special opportunity and responsibility to participate in this process of calling a new man to serve in your midst.


On Sunday, Oct 23, a special Voters Assembly [VA] has been called for immediately after the late service that morning for the sole purpose of voting on and calling a new associate pastor to replace Pastor Myers as he retires at the end of the calendar year. By now you have received in the mail a letter from the Call Committee with information on the pastoral candidates the committee is recommending for the congregation to call. Candidates from the entire list the Voters approved in May are still potential candidates and will be on the initial ballot. There were many good pastors on the list, but the call committee is just recommending three.

In an effort to make this meeting time as agreeable as possible for as many members as possible, a small lunch of finger food will be offered in the Fellowship Hall, where the VA will be held. Childcare will also be available.

The Call Committee deserves many thanks for their efforts over the last number of months. This was one of the largest call committees in recent memory here at Elm Grove Ev. Lutheran Church. The goal in selecting the members of the committee was to get a broad spectrum of EGL experience on the committee. That was achieved. Elm Grove Lutheran Church was well-represented. With a larger group, however, came more conversation and coordination. Special thanks are due to Mr. Mark Ewert for his work chairing this committee. He brought much needed attention to the details.

Someone else who deserves some public thanks at this time is Pastor Myers. As you know, he is retiring at the end of this calendar year. He has given 44 years of dedicated, ordained service to God and His people, many of those years right here in your midst. He has served on the foreign mission field; in high school, collegiate, and seminary classrooms; in the Air Force chaplaincy; and in the parish ministry. He has applied himself to the work you called him to do here at EGL. The most important expectation of a pastor is that he be found faithful, and that accurately characterizes his ministry here and elsewhere.

We are calling a new associate pastor to replace Pastor Myers in the Office, but we are losing many years of dedication and experience, which are impossible to quantify. While we have full confidence that God will provide what we need, this is a very good time to stop and offer our thanks to God for what He has already given the Church in the person and ministry of Pastor Myers.

"Eyes of Life" presents voice for life-issues discussion

Eyes of Lift is a new LCMS campaign to provide a positive voice in the discussion of life issues: life from conception to death – all in God's time.

"Eyes of Life is a conversation about life in a culture of death," observes Deaconess Pam Nielsen, associate executive director of LCMS Communications. "Let's see life the way our Lord see life; and let our story reflect what we see. Life."

At their website (eyesoflife.org) you will hear from a number of people who provide their perspectives – all with eyes of life:

- * Parents who were encouraged to terminate a pregnancy, yet chose life. The grateful mother explains, "We want people to see the miracles God has done for us."
- * An orphan whose biological mother chose life over abortion, who says, "God made you and wants you to have life."
- * A stroke victim who can no longer fulfill his previous vocation, yet is far from useless and who proclaims, "God must have some blessing in this."

Nielsen notes that *Eyes of Life* "is a way to speak for – rather than against — something. The lines of the life battle are full of vitriol and anger on all sides. What is needed is a positive voice for life. All life. Let's celebrate life at every stage. Let's support it. Lets' encourage it."

What is your story? How has God taught you to see with eyes of life? How has God led you to value all life? How does your Baptism give you the eyes of life? How does the cross of Jesus bring you through the valley of the shadow of death to see that the very presence of Christ is your life? How does the resurrection of Jesus shape your life as one of hope and anticipation of eternal life?

Share your story. Write a brief account. Film a video. Post on social media with the hashtag *eyesoflife* (#eyesoflife). Post on eyesoflife.org

On July 19 22,000 teens and adults were invited to share their story at the 2016 LCMS Youth Gathering in New Orleans.

Erik Lunsford, managing photojournalist with LCMS Communications, introduced the *Eyes of Life* campaign to them with a short presentation encouraging all to share their story to proclaim life as a gift from God's hands.

"I'm thankful to God for bringing us the people involved in *Eyes of Life,*" Lunsford comments on the launch of the campaign. "To hear their stories, tell their stories using pictures, and introduce their stories before a dome full of faithful youth and adults has been extraordinary. I pray we change lives through their stories as they hear the Word of God and see how He works through people in His service."

Singer songwriter Erin Bode followed Lunsford's presentation with the debut of her single, "Right from the Beginning," which she wrote as part of the *Eyes of Life* campaign.

Prescription Drug Collection Saturday, October 22, 2016 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. Brookfield Recycling Center 19700 Riverview Dr.



Before you come: Empty your pill bottles into a plastic bag. Do not bring pill bottles to the Recycling Center. Discard your empty pill bottles at home. Remember to black out your personal infor-

mation on your pill bottles in order to protect your privacy and prevent ID theft.

For liquids and creams/sprays in original packaging, take off labels or black out your personal information before bringing them.

You can bring: Prescription (controlled and noncontrolled) medications, over the counter medications, ointments, patches, non-aerosol sprays, creams, and pet medications. Liquids/creams/sprays must be in original packaging.

Do not bring: Biohazardous material (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), needles/sharps, mercury and mercury thermometers, household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas) personal hygiene products (soaps, shampoo, perfumes, hand lotions, sunscreens, etc.), aerosol cans, chemotherapy drugs, illegal drugs, inhalers, IV bags, syringes, auto injectors/EpiPens, prefilled syringes, oxygencontaining devices, nebulizers, lancets, blood/infectious wastes.

Reduce substance abuse, prevent childhood poisonings, and help protect our environment from drug contamination.



BUILDING FAITH... ONE CHILD AT A TIME

"I HAVE NO GREATER JOY THAN TO HEAR THAT MY CHILDREN ARE WALKING IN THE TRUTH"



FROM THE PRINCIPAL: On Reformation Day we celebrate the gift of God to the Church through His servant Martin Luther. Luther reminded us of our freedom from the Law in the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Jesus told the self-satisfied religious leaders of His School time, "Everyone who sins is a slave to sin" You see, they thought, "I've got it made." They believed that their birth automatically made them free. In the 16th century many religious people felt much the same way. Birth and religious vocation gave a false sense of freedom. Is it possible for us as church members with good records to make the same mistake - "I've got it made"? We joyfully realize that the Son makes us free. Jesus Christ took on the slavery of the Law and died to atone for the world's sin. God declares the world righteous for Jesus' sake. "So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." (John 8:36) Luther discovered that freedom through faith in Christ, and the gates of Heaven opened to him. We rejoice in our movement from slavery to freedom and live in that freedom.

Childcare

- Our average attendance numbers are rising. We presently have 12 infants enrolled, 19 enrolled in childcare which includes before and after school care.
- We are looking forward to having some new families joining us.
- The EGL Ladies Service League purchased a new refrigerator for the childcare. The childcare staff greatly appreciates the donation.
- I am very appreciative of my staff this year. I have a great team of ladies who are dedicated in working toward the success of our program and work extremely well together. Much is being done this year in the area of music, art, Bible stories,

letters and counting, etc.

• The childcare made a profit in the amount of \$32,000 in the last fiscal year.

- Our present enrollment is 100, last year we were at 95. We lost 18 students (10 graduates, 5 moved, 1 to public kindergarten, 2 to public middle school) and we gained 23 students.
- 67% of our enrollment are members of Elm Grove Lutheran church and 33% are non-member of our church.
- Our students participated in the Feed My Starving Children servant event at Brookfield Lutheran on Friday, September 23. This Christian non-profit organization works to package life-saving meals that will be delivered to children all over the world. This was our eighth year of participation. Last year, EGL packed 115 boxes of meals, which was enough to serve one hot meal daily to 68 children for one year.
- · We are currently doing our annual Fall Fund Raiser, "Race for Education." Last year we raised over \$13,000 for the school. New laptop computers were purchased for the teachers.
- A gate has been installed outside of the gym doors which is closed during the school day to keep traffic from entering the parking lot as children are out at various times throughout the day.
- New bleachers in the gym have recently been installed and team sport chairs purchased. Thank you to the Golf Outing/auction Committee for their leadership in providing funds for these recent pro-
- The faculty will be attending the Lutheran Education Association Convocation in Grand Rapids, Michigan on October 13 - 15. The theme for the Convocation is Grow. Based on 2 Peter 3:18, "But grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be glory both now and forever!"

CHOICE PROGRAM:

This year we received 70 applications, 47 were submitted to DPI, 9 decided to attend another location, 1 was ineligible, so our current number is 37. (26 students are returning students, 11 are new students (2 existing) Elm Grove Lutheran is a participant in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program and the Wisconsin Parent Choice Program.



Can you imagine going to a church that doesn't have a roof? In Africa, congregations are able to build the four walls of their churches using existing materials—locally sourced mud and bricks. However, the tin shingles needed to actually build a roof on the church structure are often financially out of the reach of the congregation.

This project will fund the shingles, tools, and materials needed to complete church roofs in Africa.

How will your gifts be used?

- One piece of high-quality tin sheet costs on average \$15.
- Tools for a roof (hammer, saw, and machete/axe) cost \$25.
- Nails for a roof cost \$30.
- Trusses (the wooden structures supporting a roof) cost \$100.
