From the Pastor...

The announcement on Sunday morning, Nov 27, before the services that Pastor Peters had accepted EGL's call to be our new associate pastor was met with applause and the spontaneous singing of the Common Doxology! Truly, God has answered our prayer to give "this congregation the guidance of the Holy Spirit to choose a suitable pastor according to [His] will for the blessing of [His] church in this place."

With this answer to prayer, it's a good time to remember and reflect on why the Church has pastors in the first place. The Pastoral Office is known variously as the Office of the Holy Ministry or the Office of Public Ministry, depending on what's being emphasized. Is the emphasis on the administration of holy things, ie the Word and Sacraments, or on that which is done publicly on behalf of the baptized? In either case the Office is of Divine institution, meaning it's not the creation of the Church simply for the sake of good order. Pastor and congregation belong together.


Both titles for the Pastoral Office hint at the reason for God's institution of the Office. The pastor is not a "lord" of the Church; nor is he a cheer leader. The Pastor is called to preach, teach, and administer the sacraments. Augsburg Confession V provides a quick summary when we read: "To obtain such faith [that is reckoned as righteousness] God instituted the office of the ministry, that is, provided the Gospel and the sacraments. Through these, as through means, he gives the Holy Spirit who works faith, when and where he pleases, in those who hear the Gospel" (Tappert).

Thus, at the center of the pastor's call is using the means of grace, the Word and the Sacraments, as instruments of the Holy Spirit in creating and sustaining faith. Jesus gave the Great Commission in Matthew 28: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the

age." So, we know that the Church is built upon and sustained by the Gospel preached purely and the Sacraments rightly administered, and Christ has tied the Office to those 'tools' for the sake of the Great Commission.

This is why we call pastors to serve in our midst. The personality of a given pastor, while of some interest, is not the most important thing. The most important aspect in calling a pastor is his commitment to serve God and His people by faithfully proclaiming the Word of God at every opportunity and by administering the Sacraments according to the Gospel. The congregation responds to such pastors by "pledging our wholehearted and continuing cooperation and support in word and deed and in our prayers to God in [his] behalf." [Diploma of Vocation]

St Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 4:1, "This is how one should regard us [those in the Office], as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God." Elm Grove Evangelical Lutheran Church has been blessed through its 76 years of existence with many faithful pastors, from Tesch and Bartelt, through Egloff and Senkbeil, and down to the present day with Myers and Skovgaard. As Matthew "Doug" Peters begins his ministry in our midst in January, he does so in a chain of men God has placed here to preach and teach for the glory of God and the building up of the Church.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Elm Grove Lutheran,

I thank the Lord Jesus for each of you and I thank you for your prayers and support during these last four weeks in my consideration of the three calls I have had to Luther Memorial here in Sheboygan, Trinity in Nashville, Illinois and Elm Grove Lutheran.

Throughout this time, there have been several texts of Scripture, which have frequented my mind, influencing my thoughts and prayers in my search for determining where I may serve our Lord's Bride best. The following words from St. Paul have consumed my prayers; "Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle, set apart for the gospel of God." Rm 1:1.

This verse reveals the dominant reality and rule in which I must do all things as a servant of Christ, called to be a pastor, set aside for the gospel of God. Despite my own emotional concerns and fears, God sees fit for me to serve Him as He wills. This leaves me no room to second guess the Solemn Call He has issued through Elm Grove Lutheran. I trust in Him to provide for my family and me, wherever our Lord has called me to serve.

So my beloved brothers and sisters, the Lord has called and convicted me to go with Him to serve the saints at EGL. I have therefore accepted the Lord's call to serve Elm Grove Lutheran Church, Elm Grove Wisconsin as an associate pastor. Due to my responsibilities here, it is my tentative plan to conclude my service at Luther Memorial on December 25th, 2016. I'll discuss possible installation dates with you in the days ahead.

As we begin our life together, let us do so together trusting in the words of St. Paul in Acts 17, "He determines the times set for us and the exact places where we should live. God did this so that men would seek and find Him. . . . For in Him, we live and move and have our being."

The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you. May our Triune God bless you and love you and bless our coming together in His mission and ministry at Elm Grove Lutheran.

Women in Mission



The LWML morning group will host its Christmas Party on Wednesday, December 7th in the Bartelt Adult Activity Cen-

ter at **10:30 a.m.** Instead of a Bible study, we will have a Christmas program of singing Christmas carols, reading Bible verses, and reading a narration of the Christmas story. For our luncheon, each lady is asked to bring ½ sandwich and 6 cookies. Plan to attend. What a wonderful way to start your Christmas celebration!

The LWML evening group sent Christmas cards to wounded soldiers and veterans with inspirational notes and Bible verses written in the cards. Our hope is that these cards will brighten the lives of these soldiers and veterans and also be a witness to the real meaning of Christmas. Jesus Christ, the Son of God was born as our Savior.

The second Mission Grant of the South Wisconsin District LWML is the **Church Work Student Grant** of \$30,000. This grant will be given to full time church worker students from the South Wisconsin District who are enrolled in one of our synodical universities or seminaries. This includes pastors, teachers, deaconesses, lay ministers, and directors of Christian education. These funds are to be used towards tuition and board. Looking at the National LWML "Mites in Action," it

has been reported that another Mission Grant has been totally funded. \$72,000 was given to "Outreach in Refugee Camps in Lebanon." This is being used in correlation with the Lutheran Hour Ministries goal to reach 15,000 women and children with the message of faith and trust in God, along with food and humanitarian supplies to break the cycle of poverty for themselves and their families. The hope and prayer is that this outreach will help to change the lives of these women and children living in the Lebanon refugee camps.

Sponsored by the young women of the LWML of our South Wisconsin District is the Winter Getaway at the Wintergreen Resort and Conference Center in Wisconsin Dells on January 27 and 28, 2017. This is a time to relax, renew, and reconnect with our LWML Sisters in Christ. Be inspired with a Bible study led by the Senior Pastoral Counselor, Rev. Dale Blanchard. Do you know how the SCRIP card program works?

SCRIP cards are gift cards that <u>are bought at face value</u>. The Scrip distributer pays EGL a rebate for every card sold. These rebates vary from 1.5% to 15% with most of them being around 3%-9%.

You can give the cards as gifts, but also know that <u>you can shop</u> with SCRIP for yourself. You can buy your gas and groceries using SCRIP cards. Every time you shop for food or fill your tank, you are giving to EGL.

Do you go to local restaurants? Whether you're eating on-the-go or casual dining, there are many eating places to choose from. There are even a few fine dining establishments offered in the SCRIP program.

Card values vary from \$10 (usually for onthe-go food places) and \$25-\$100 and even higher for retailers and restaurants. Will you be **shopping** at Target or Walmart (for example) **for Christmas**? We have these cards available every Sunday (first come-first serve basis) There are <u>many</u> other <u>department stores</u> and <u>specialty stores</u> to choose from on the order form, too, such as Toys R Us, home improvement stores, sporting goods stores...and many, many more.

All your shopping dollars could be giving a payback to Elm Grove Lutheran. We have a variety of "cash and carry" cards available at the SCRIP table on Sunday mornings.

If the "cash and carry" box doesn't have cards for where you shop, order forms are available. Orders are sent on Monday and the cards come to EGL by Wednesday. They can be picked up at the table the next week, from the office on Thursday or given to your child to bring home if you have a student at EGL. Just let us know how you want to have them "delivered".

Create an account at shopwithscrip.com and become one of our SCRIP "families". You can then get a report of your rebates given to EGL to use for your tax deduction purposes. After creating an account, you can also shop on-line and either order cards and pay with your check at the SCRIP table or pay on-line with your credit card. (Depending on your credit card reward program you might be able to get your credit card reward and give a rebate to EGL!)

Make sure to designate Elm Grove Lutheran as the one to receive the rebates. Our access code is AEE648179715. Many of the cards can be reloaded on -line, too.



This logo takes many elements from Luther's seal, which is the most easily recognized symbol for Lutheranism. It was common in Luther's day for people to create a seal or coat of arms for their families, and that seal told the world what the family cared about or did for a living. It's no surprise, then, that Luther's seal was all about Jesus! At the center of Luther's seal, and at the center of the Reformation 2017 logo, is a red heart in the middle of a white rose. (The heart and rose together are commonly referred to as Luther's rose.) As Luther explained in one of his writings, "The heart in the middle of white rose shows that faith gives joy, comfort, and peace. It immediately sets [the believer] into the midst of a white, joyful rose, not like the peace and joy the world offers. That is why the rose should be white, not red. White is the color of the spirits and all angels." At the center of that rose is Jesus Christ and Him crucified. Jesus is the center and Rock of our faith. He has been since He came to Earth in the flesh, and He still is today. The word "still" bears witness to the ever and ongoing relevance of this one, saving truth for sinners. At last summer's Synod Convention held in Milwaukee, Resolution 3-15 was adopted by voice vote. What it recommends is a good way to remember the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation, which is still all about Jesus! Whereas, The 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther will be observed in 2017; and

Whereas, It is most appropriate that members of the LCMS join in the celebration of that anniversary, and that this celebration include the study of the writings contained in the Book of Concord of 1580 (i.e., the Lutheran Confessions); therefore be it

Resolved, That resources be prepared under the auspices of the Office of the President in collaboration with the Commission on Theology and Church Relations and Concordia Publishing House for the study of the Lutheran Confessions; and be it further

Resolved, That every congregation of the Synod be encouraged to hold regular, ongoing studies of all writings contained within the Book of Concord of 1580 and to encourage all of their members to attend those studies regularly.

LWML—Soup Jars



BUILDING FAITH... ONE CHILD AT A TIME

FROM THE PRINCIPAL: Mark 1:4 says, "And so John came, baptizing in the desert region and preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins."

Judea, first century. Excitement in the air. A new stirring of life and hope. A rugged wilderness man appearing to proclaim that Jesus, the Messiah will come.

We, in the middle of a difficult world, pause to remember the beginning of the Gospel about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. We look ahead to Christmas in its true meaning: Jesus has come as the Babe in Bethlehem, the Man from Galilee, and the Lamb of Calvary. He has come for us.

John's message starts with repentance. Great crowds came to hear John as the excitement grew. John, a stern preacher, exposed their sins, broke through their façade of self-righteousness and religiosity. Confessing their sins, they repented and humbled themselves in a Jordan River baptism. Forgiven, they awaited the appearance of "the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world."

Christmas often provides a superficial joy of the tinsel, glitter, and wrapping paper. We sometimes come to Christ wearing masks, desiring sin and heaven, too. John's message pierces the façade, sweeps away the superficial, and penetrates our hearts. Confessing, we humbly turn to the cross of Jesus for forgiveness and live daily in the humbling but joy-giving waters of our baptism. There is true excitement in the air, new life and hope, from the forerunner's message of repentance. Jesus has come for us!!


