Start Your Morning Off The Right Way!

In last month's newsletter I wrote to you about ending your day in prayer. And this past Sunday we focused on the Lord's Prayer. Jesus taught His disciples (all of us that have been called to serve Him through the Holy Spirit.) the perfect Prayer. This month let's talk about the beginning of your day.

For many Christians, starting a good habit like daily prayer may feel hard to do. Sometimes we may not even know where to start. (And that's even Jesus' disciples asked Him to teach them how to pray!) We know the Lord's Prayer (always a great prayer to say at any time and any place), but we may not know other prayers. And for some, making up our own prayers can be intimidating.

But not only did Martin Luther teach us how to pray as we end our day (Luther's Evening Prayer), but he also suggested a way to begin the day. His morning prayer is as follows:

I thank You, my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, Your dear Son, that You have kept me this night from all harm and danger; and I pray that You would keep me this day also from sin and every evil, that all my doings and life may please You. For into Your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let Your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen. (Small Catechism, pg. 30)

Even though I learned this prayer when I was around ten-years old, it is still one of my favorite prayers to help me begin my day. This prayer helps us focus the new day on Christ who has called us, and continues to guide us every day.

First off, the Morning Prayer reminds us that even when we are asleep, the Lord is watching over us and protecting us. We survived the night because our bodies are a gift from God who continues to sustain us each and every day of our life. What a great way to start our day by recognizing all we have is truly a gift from God.

Secondly, in this prayer we ask that God would keep us from "sin and every evil" during this upcoming day. What a wonderful prayer for us to ask from our God who is so gracious in forgiving us when we do sin (John 2:1).

And finally, we end with one of the most powerful phrases. We commend to God "our body and soul, and all things." It is very powerful for us to admit that we are commending our lives to God. To "commend" strikes an image of us literally falling into the arms of our Savior in complete trust knowing that He and He alone can, and will, preserve us from all adversities in this life.

Believe it or not, prayer is the most important and powerful habit you can do. Through prayer, God will not only protect and watch over you, but He will also guide your steps throughout the day (look at Psalms 32:8 and Proverbs 3:5-6 as example of this).

Summer is a great way to get back into a regular and consistent prayer life. Beginning a habit of prayer does not have to be overwhelming. Just take a few seconds every morning and pray the Lord's Prayer followed by the Morning Prayer. Commit to prayer for one week. By the end of the week, you will probably have it memorized! The Lord longs to hear from you. He longs to answer your prayers and guide you in your walk with Him. There truly is no greater way than to start your day with prayer!

Go and Bear Fruit

Fruit trees are one of the many wonders of God's creation. To see the beauty of the tree and its fruit, to enjoy its taste, and to realize that it all came from a tiny seed is beyond our comprehension. An apple seed is planted in the ground, and, with water and sun as nourishment, miraculously a seedling surfaces that develops into a fruit tree. After a period of time, the apple tree fulfills its mission by bearing apples.

We, as Christians, are like that apple tree. We, too, have been fed and nourished by God so we can bear fruit. "You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide..." (John 15:16). Jesus tells us "I am the Vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in Me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:5). The life and power of any plant is found in its vine. The vine uses the branches to produce its fruit. The branch is simply a growth of the vine, produced by it and appointed to bear fruit. The branch exists only because the vine makes it possible.

Fruit characterizes the life of the Christian steward. When we stay connected to Jesus, we are told that we "will bear much fruit." Christ has given us the task of ministering to the needs of others and spreading the Gospel. As we stay connected to Him through His Word and Sacraments, we discover God's perfect will for us, and we are empowered to please Him by bearing fruit (Colossians 1:9-10). God has created us to bear fruit (Ephesians 2:10), but only through Christ is it possible for us to do so.

"If we live by the Spirit," Paul exhorted, "let us also keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking one another, envying one another" (Galatians 5:25-26). As children of God, we have this fruit because His Spirit lives in us, not as a result of our own efforts. We do cease to bear fruit when we give in to our sinful natures, becoming, in Paul's words, "Conceited, provoking one another." We are to "Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness" (Ephesians 5:11a), but are to "Walk as children of light (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), and try to discern what is pleasing to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:8b-10).

Go and bear fruit!
