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The Jesse Tree Is the Jesus Tree!

“There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit.” (Isaiah 11:1)



It is Advent—a time to reflect, pray, and worship the Christ who came, who comes, and who will come again. Imagine the world some two thousand years ago in the weeks before the birth of the Babe of Bethlehem. People were busy doing whatever it was that defined their lives at that moment. For some, it was struggling against hunger, fear, and desperation. For others, it was enjoying their wealth and ease. For yet others, it was simply dealing with the pressures of their lives. But for all, the weeks we call “Advent” were just days and nights lived in darkness.

And indeed, it is a dark world. God had created the world to live in union with Him. He had breathed life into the father of our race, Adam, a creature of dust. He had formed Eve from the side of Adam and had joined the two together and to Himself. How bright the world must have been as Eden lived in harmony with the Creator.

But darkness came. Those created and loved by God rebelled against Him, bringing a darkness that permeated all creation. Death had entered through sin, and as the children of Adam filled the world, they took with them the darkness of that dreadful day in Eden when sin and death entered the world.

It was a world of darkness cut off from the source of all light, the Creator. Yet a light was breaking into the world. A young girl carried in her virgin womb a Son. This daughter of Eve was about to give birth to the One who would be the light of the world. This infant would reverse forever the horror of humanity’s fall into sin and death and darkness. This was the miracle of miracles: our human sister Mary became, by the power of the Holy Spirit, the mother of God, the bearer of the Savior of the world.

No human eye could perceive it that night. All that could be seen was a child. Yet this child would forever destroy the darkness, for He brought life into death, and His light was to be the light of the world.

Every force of Satan would seek to put that light out. Herod would attempt to destroy Him by killing every male infant. Scribes and Pharisees would seek to silence Him as He spoke words of life. Failing to silence Him, they would seek to kill Him. Some thirty-three years after the first Christmas, the Babe of Bethlehem would be nailed to a cross. But this is what He had come to do. The Advent story, including the culminating Christmas story, is about a baby who had been born to die—yet not just to die but to be placed in the utter darkness of a tomb and on Easter morning to burst forth from the tomb. When the child of Mary rose from the grave, the light that began at Bethlehem shone so brightly that no one can put it out.

This Advent, please join us either in-person or [online](#), as we gather in the name of Jesus and consider His great story anew. The Jesse Tree is filled with symbols telling the story of Jesus from creation to His second coming. The story of the Bible, Old and New Testaments alike, is the story of Jesus. He is the Seed of Jesse’s tree. He is the Root of Jesse’s tree. He is the Life of Jesse’s tree. And He is the Firstfruit of Jesse’s tree. As the Church will sing with the angels on Christmas Day, “To God on high be glory and peace to all the earth” (LSB 383).

We will not for now. Still taking precautions seriously. ~The Advent books will be available for distribution next Sunday.

Board of Education – Laura reported for the Board of Education. ~Four families participated in the Faith Legacy blessing. ~Youth will participate in the Pontiac drive through parade on Sunday, December 5th. ~Youth will visit Trinity Lutheran in Detroit on January 30, 2021. ~Stockings will be done again this year, led by Karen Cowart. ~Sunday school will decorate ornaments for our Jesse tree. Report on file.

Board of Family & Community Outreach – Kathy VanGordon reported for the Board of Outreach. ~The socks, gloves, and hats collected on the warming tree will be given to St. Paul, Pontiac. ~The group discussed many ideas for next year. ~Next meeting will be December 5, 2020.

Board of Elders – Bill Kiley reported for the Board of Elders. ~The board received a request for Kaitlin Garvey to transfer into Faith Lutheran. ~Nominations for board members are: Tom Lombardo for President, Neil Hornbacher, Vice President, and Bill Kiley for Treasurer. Report on file.

Trustees – Steve Tino reported for the Board of Trustees. ~Steve finalized a deal with the snow removal company to clear old and new parking lot. ~Boy Scouts will be using the coffee room for their meetings. ~Lines have been marked on new parking lot. Regular driving and parking in the new lot will help pack rocks down before plowing begins. ~Mike Hannewald fixed our water softener leak. ~Fire extinguisher replaced last week. ~Bookcase glass was measured and will be done in a couple weeks.

Treasurers Report – Bill Kiley presented the October Treasurers report. ~There was discussion on funds not being used and ways to better utilize them. Chris motioned to accept the report, Karen Cowart seconded, and all approved.

Music Ministry – Jacque and Lisa Moyer are selecting music for Sunday school and Christmas services. ~The choir is not meeting at this point. Discussions continue regarding proper social distancing precautions.

Voting Members Reinstated – Karen Cowart motioned that Tom and Nancy Lombardo be reinstated as voting members, Jacque seconded, all approved. ~Laura Hornbacher motioned to accept Kaitlin Garvey as a member of Faith Lutheran by affirmation of faith. Tom Tesolin, seconded and all approved.

Old Business – Mike Stanley reported that next Friday they will start running wire and install equipment for a new sound system. Brian Zaremba is donating much of the equipment. Dean motioned for an additional \$2,500 to cover costs. Steve Tino seconded, all approved. ~In preparation for Christmas services it has been decided that coat racks will not be used, the elders and ushers will seat the congregation and dismiss them out of services to maintain social distancing in seating, arrival and departure.

New Business – Karen Cowart announced that the Wednesday women's bible study will be cancelled until further notice. ~The church will stay open with in person services with precautions in place. Video services will still be offered. ~No one has contacted Chris Buckthorpe about Advent dinners for the last two Advent services. ~Tom Buckthorpe motioned to start planning the building of a pavilion. After discussion and clarification, it was decided to bring to voters for a final review with the plans and budget to complete project. Laura Hornbacher seconded.

**This is what was shared at church in November by the Elder speaker.
We thought you would enjoy reading it.**

A gentleman known as “Chaplain McCabe” was seeking to raise a million dollars for missions. In his quest, he often struggled with discouragement and disappointment as he encountered what he perceived to be “tight-fisted Christians” who refused to give to God. One day, while going through the mail, he came across a tattered note from a young boy. Written in a boyish scrawl and liberally punctuated with blots, the letter read: “I’m sure you’re going to get a million dollars for missions. And I’m going to help you get it, too. So, here’s a nickel towards it. It’s all I’ve got right now, but if you need any more, just call on me.”

Church leaders can often feel the same discouragement and disappointment as we ask for help or share opportunities to serve in the church or provide other services, such as periodic cleaning, setting up for Christmas, etc. And this year our congregation has a huge challenge, perhaps as potentially unattainable as Chaplain McCabe’s goal to raise a million dollars – ***having people willing to serve as officers and board members.***

In his letter to the Colossians, the Apostle Paul wrote, “Since, then, you have been raised with Christ, set your hearts on things above, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God.” In other words, since you have already received the victory of Christ, set your hearts on the higher challenge of the Gospel and live a ***Living Faith***. In this light, extreme caution must be taken whenever a story or an analogy is used in the development of a servant or stewardship lifestyle, much like what is trying to be accomplished here through these monthly readings. The calling must always remain the higher challenge of the Gospel and must not be lowered to the challenge of human wisdom.

In the case of McCabe’s story, there was an appeal to guilt in the description of “tight-fisted or selfish Christians who refuse to give or to serve.” Yet, before God the Father, we are guiltless. Yes, we often fail to do what pleases God, but through daily contrition and repentance, we are forgiven by the atoning work of Jesus Christ. To be guilty before God is to have a heart of stone, and a heart of stone cannot give or serve willingly.

This story was reportedly told to “challenge people.” But where is the challenge pointing? Is it to the higher challenge of the Gospel or to our own efforts and failures? If a moving story is told on its own accord each week which causes people to change their behavior or attitude, then what about next week? Soon, it may become a matter of topping last week’s dissertation with an even deeper emotional appeal which is accompanied by reduced results, potential stone hearts.

But the higher challenge of the Gospel is about more. The challenge of the Gospel does not point us to our failures for not having been cheerful givers, trustworthy stewards, or tithers of our time. The Gospel shows us Jesus who provides all his time, talent and treasure for the sake of His people. It presents to us the mercy, riches of grace, and love of Christ poured out on us and simply asks that we set our hearts and minds on those things and respond accordingly. Forgiven in Jesus, we are a Gospel-led people ***who are equipped to do what God desires.***

Using stories and examples are not wrong, but they can prove to be problematic theologically. Care must be taken when using stories or their characters as examples. Remember, the Gospel is always the higher challenge, not man’s wisdom. We must always remember that we give willingly, more importantly, that we serve willingly, from the heart, not out of guilt or compulsion, but by a Living Faith in victory, for our hearts are set on things above, on the higher challenge of the Gospel.

Applying Biblical Teachings

“Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God” (2 Cor. 9:10-11).

The Apostle Paul, in his second letter to the Corinthians, wants his readers to understand that having been justified and pronounced not guilty on all counts of sin, we are free to grow in the grace of giving, that is, to grow in generosity. The Apostle also states his conviction that no one is the poorer for being generous. He points to God’s promise that God is able to give in abundance and to provide what is needed for the task at hand.

The Apostle makes the point that God will make the offering a blessing for the cheerful giver. It is God who provides the seed, and it is God who provides the giver with money and wealth as the means to give. It is God who blesses the seed so that it brings forth a bountiful harvest. In a similar way, our gifts of money bring glory and honor to God and produce thanksgiving because of what He has done for us through Jesus Christ. And it is God who strengthens us in our lives of sanctification so that we may grow in this grace of cheerful giving.

God gives us the means to give so that He may be glorified and be given thanks! Would God cause believers who have given for His glory and who are abounding in thanksgiving to then be penniless? The Apostle puts to rest this senseless question as he states God’s promise: “You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion” (2 Cor. 9:11).

You see, God has already provided the seed, that is, He has made the financial provision for us to be able to give. He is our source. With what He provides, all believers can afford to be generous in meeting the needs which God has set before them.

That which is given as an act of love towards God, brought about by His grace in Christ, will be blessed, even though on the surface, to our eyes and to our pocketbooks, it may not always seem to be. But, trusting in God, we take Him at His Word that we are a people who are being enriched in every respect, both spiritual and temporal, for the purpose of generosity.

We hold the seed which God has provided in our hands. How we use it is up to us. “Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly, or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver” (2 Cor. 9:6-7)

Be a signer on all asset accounts of the congregation, as well as any ancillary accounts by other organizations within Faith Lutheran Church.

Social Franchising VS a Multi-site model:

Our Board will be meeting with representatives from The Michigan District LCMS to discuss what model of organizational structure will best enable The Luke Project 52 Clinic to expand our efforts to “save babies, change lives, and help churches build community” beyond our pilot project (now 4 years old) to serve not just SE Michigan but potentially state wide, nationally, and even internationally. We encourage your prayers for guidance in this process.





Blame: Who's to blame? Apparently, everyone wants to know because the news media spends vast resources to determine blame and tell us what they've found out. Who's to blame for all the pain, sorrow, anger, hatred? For seasoned Christians we know to blame Adam. The public won't buy that. Vast over-simplification. We could blame God. After all, he was the one who decided the punishment mankind should endure as a result of original sin. Toil, labor, harsh living, surrounded by sin. Blame God. Blame God? Are you nuts? You can't blame God! You know what? Sure you can. AND - He can take it. Talk to him. Ask him why. Ask him to explain. Pray, pray unceasingly. The more you talk to him and study his word, the more certain you will know that despite all the pain of this world, God loves us. He sent His Son. He can take our anger. He understands. He can take our frustration. Read Isaiah 46:3-4.

People overwhelmed by their need to find blame often create blockades between themselves and friends and family. We naturally feel the need to defend God. Guess what – he can defend himself. Stephen Ministry provides distinct tools to trained “care givers” to listen to people so hurting that their need to blame has chased away their support group. Hundreds of Stephen Ministers in the Metro Detroit area provide distinctively Christian Caring to serve people who blame God for the evil around them. As you pray for understanding in dealing with the need to cast blame and for strength to forgive, pray also for those Stephen Ministers, for our Stephen Ministry Program at Faith and for those who are contemplating becoming a Stephen Minister.

Fear not!

On that first Christmas night, the angel said to the shepherds: “Do not be afraid” (Luke 2:10). What is there to fear from a baby? A baby is powerless, with no guile, no anger and no judgment, only needing from us without fearing we will not provide: simply trusting, and content to be resting in our arms. This is how God came. This is Christmas. This one child, and for a time, perhaps too brief, our fears are taken over by our love for this child, and he is able to change our hearts. ...

In Jesus, we are free to live life as fully and as joyfully as we will allow ourselves. For it is only we who hold ourselves back. God does not. For God has forgiven us in this baby and will not restrain us from living with sheer abandon, trusting in this gentle and gracious God, who keeps telling us: “Do not be afraid.”
