Songs of Advent

I know it seems about a month premature to talk about Advent and Christmas, but I bring it up because I'm especially looking forward to it this year and I want to give you some advance notice. My brother pastors from neighboring LCMS churches and I are going to participate in a midweek preaching "round-robin." That means for the three Wednesday midweek services the pastors will rotate pulpits and preach on the same theme in the participating congregations, hopefully giving us all opportunity to hear wisdom and insight from Lord's Word through a fresh voice and possibly even a perspective of unity as our congregations participate in devotional life together.

The theme we've chosen is The Songs of Advent. Each pastor will be sharing a seasonal hymn and pondering it's scriptural inspiration among the congregations of our circuit. One song we will all hear is called the Phos Hilaron; it's part of the order of service called *Evening Prayer*. Originally written in Koine Greek, the Phos Hilaron is the earliest known Christian hymn in use today, apart from the scriptures themselves. It can be translated as joyous or gladsome light and was often sung by the church while the candles of the assembly were lit.

One of our sister congregations has adopted that candle lighting practice throughout Advent and we'd like to consider its use in our joint observances. The church gathers in relative darkness, the hand-held candles are lit, and the hymn of gladsome light is sung as we anticipate not just light in the room, but joyously expect Christ who is the light and life of the world!

I know that much of the musical elements of *Evening Prayer* are unfamiliar to us and that unfamiliarity can breed scorn, so I'm humbly asking that we remain charitable and at very least listen to the words and prayers that connect us to our most ancient heritage.

If you'd like a preview you can listen to <u>a congregational recording</u> or view the <u>service</u> <u>from the hymnal</u>.

As we approach the darkest time of year the church will move into the season of Advent. In those few weeks, which as a child, seemed to drag on forever, we can experience everything from somber penitence and reflection, frenetic activity and busyness, joyful celebration, anxious expectation, and patient hope as the "hopes and fears of all the years are met" in the one who is coming to be the light of the world.

I'm really looking forward to experiencing advent with you and the congregations of our circuit as we walk in the Lord's way together. -Pastor Moyer

This is what was shared at church in October by the Elder speaker. We thought you would enjoy reading it.

Is proportional giving related to what you have or what you used to have?

Writing to Christians at Corinth, the Apostle Paul gave this instruction: "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper.... In other words, on Sunday — the Lord's Day, the first day of the week — they would make a first fruits decision: setting aside a portion before it was consumed throughout the week. And the amount: be it money, or skill, or availability of time, was to be in direct proportion to our income. If God allowed them to earn a lot, then they should give accordingly, in direct proportion to what was earned. If God allows them to earn only a little, then they would only be expected to give accordingly.

Now for many this doesn't sit quite right. If we are the ones who did the work to earn the money, for example, what gives God the right to say that we should give it back to Him? After all, it was our "sweat equity" that produced the effort for which we received payment! What did God have to do with it?

It depends if you acknowledge that God owns everything and that he entrusts much of it to your stewardship. According to Psalm 24:1, the entire world is His and everything in it. As has been shared in previous months, God has never relinquished His title deed to the world. He owns it all. What we have that we think is "ours" is actually His. But this arrangement is always for our benefit. In whose hands would you rather your worries and troubles be? Yours or God's? In whose hands would you rather your wealth, health, and days be entrusted? God has merely portioned money and material possessions to us during our lifetime. Part of our role as managers and stewards is to give back to Him what He has entrusted to us. And that "giving back" is to be in direct proportion to the amount He has provided for us.

So, the more God blesses us with wealth, or unique skill and ability the more we are able to give to Him and to His ministry here at Faith Lutheran Church. The more we have, the more we are to realize the Source of our earnings and the need to give as God has prospered us.

As you consider your offering to the Lord this morning, and as you consider your giving in the coming months, why not covenant with God to enter into "proportional giving"? Why not give in direct relationship to how He provides for you? You never know where that might lead. . . .

Living Faith Stewardship Campaign Applying Biblical Teachings

The Steinway piano has been the instrument of choice by masters of the keyboard for many years. Pianists such as Rubinstein, Cliburn, Horowitz, Rachmaninoff, and Liszt knew that a skillfully crafted instrument such as the Steinway produces a rich, wonderful sound.

Steinway pianos are built today the same way they were when Henry Steinway started the company in 1845. Two hundred craftsmen and 12,000 parts are required to produce one of these instruments. Most crucial is the rim-bending process where 18 layers of maple are bent around an iron press to create the shape of a Steinway grand. Five coats of lacquer are applied and hand-rubbed to give the piano its outer glow. Each key is tested 10,000 times to ensure quality and durability.

In a similar manner, Christians — followers of Jesus Christ — are being "handcrafted." We are pressed, formed and shaped to make us more and more like Him. We are polished until we "glow." We are tested in the laboratory of human experience to ensure quality and durability.

One of the ways in which we are made in Christ's image concerns our giving. 1 John 3:17 (why not take time to look it up in your Bible?) says that we demonstrate God's love when we see our brother in need and give to meet that need. In fact, the Lord Jesus said that we are to love our neighbor just as we love ourselves, and the illustration He provided was that of the Good Samaritan.

Yes, we are to give to the Lord's work here at Faith Lutheran Church. Yes, we are to place a priority in our lives on supporting this ministry financially. But let's not limit ourselves and our service for Christ to the walls of our church. Instead, let's be alert to opportunities to demonstrate God's love to fellow-travelers on the road of life. When we do that, we are demonstrating to ourselves and to all who observe that we have been "handcrafted" in the likeness of the Lord Jesus Christ.

When Advent begins on November 28 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again. "Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."

Stephen Ministry



In ice hockey, the skater without the puck is just as dangerous as the skater with the puck. Like soccer, basketball or water pollo played with balls, unless the puck carrier is in a position to shoot on net, and possibly score, they look for the "open" teammate to whom they can pass the puck. The more "open" the teammate, the greater the chance that skater can score. Successful defense in hockey is anticipating who the puck carrier is going to choose to receive the pass. For the defender a two-on-one develops. The defender must keep their eye on both the puck carrier and the most likely pass receiver in their area. Some consider the two-on-one the most critical aspect of hockey defense. The greatest success occurs when each of the players for the team without the puck selects their own two-on-one offensive pairing, which will lead to the successful recapture of the puck. This is a highly dynamic process as the players are always changing who their two-on-one is, depending on who has the puck.

The two-on-one approach to decision making is a handy way to manage the large number of everyday tasks we face, first to decide which decision takes the higher priority, then evaluate one option against another, one at a time. For example: when the garbage disposal breaks down, can it be fixed, or must it be replaced (two-on-one)? An unexpected auto repair bill – how do we pay for that – self-perform vs. put on the charge account. All three of the kids need to be in different places at the same time – call grandma or a parent of the child's teammate, which leads to the next two on one, Jeff's mom or Sally's dad?

Throw into this mix overwhelming life events: disease, divorce, loss of a job, bodily injury. The burdened individual can't find the obvious two-on-one – it's a hundred to one. Their life is so turned upside down with the landslide of troubles coming so quickly they don't feel they can take the moment needed to patiently evaluate the situation and make a thoughtful decision. They need help. Who knows they need help? How can help be provided if no one is aware of the situation? Often the overwhelmed become more-so because the situation just continues day after day.

There are many members of our congregation who are in this position. Stephen Ministers are trained to listen to people overwhelmed by their burdens. We know the need is out there and probably larger than we actually do know. The need is great and the workers few. Is Stephen Ministry for you? Don't just hit reply on the email, call, text, or wait until you see the individual. Don't be afraid to question or ask around or just ask the person who supposedly made the request if this is legitimate. The fact that these scams work shows how willing we are to care for one another. How sad that others will turn goodwill to selfish gain.

There's all manner of people online who try to turn the tables on would-be scammers, often with hilarious results. My favorite (owing to my extreme hatred of glitter) has to be Mark Rober, who for the past three years has designed and improved bait-packages meant to be stolen from porches that release glitter, glue, and foul odors upon being opened by the thieves, while tracking and recording the whole thing.
