



FIFTH SUNDAY IN LENT



(3 April 2022)

Isaiah 43:16–21 Philippians 3:(4b–7) 8–14 Luke 20:9–20

God's Beloved Son Has Redeemed Us

Our life and works apart from Christ, no matter how they may glitter to the eyes of the world, are ultimately rubbish and have no righteousness. Rather, in the scandalous cross of Jesus, we find our righteousness alone "through faith in Christ" (Phil. 3:9). By such faith, we "know him and the power of his resurrection" (Phil. 3:10). For the same God who brought Israel out of Egypt has done a "new thing" for us in Christ Jesus (Is. 43:19). He has sent His beloved Son into His vineyard to be killed by sinful men and to become "the stone that the builders rejected." Yet, the One rejected by men "has become the cornerstone" of His Church (Luke 20:17). Through the waters of Holy Baptism, He provides us daily refreshment in our earthly pilgrimage, "a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Is. 43:19).

PALM SUNDAY / SUNDAY OF THE PASSION



(10 April 2022)

John 12:12–19 (Palm Sunday Procession) Deuteronomy 32:36–39 Philippians 2:5–11 Luke 22:1–23:56 *or*

Luke 23:1–56 *or* John 12:20–43

The Cross and Passion of Our Lord Are the Hour of His Glory

The King of Israel comes into His royal glory by the path of humble obedience "to the point of death, even death on a cross" (Phil. 2:8). He "goes as it has been determined" (Luke 22:22), according to the Scriptures, willingly submitting to His Father's plan for the salvation of sinners. "Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name" (Phil. 2:9). His suffering and death open the way of repentance for the forgiveness of sins because He goes to the cross bearing the sins of the world. In His resurrection, God the Father vindicates His people and has compassion on His servants (Deut. 32:36). He kills to make alive; He wounds in order to heal. In remembrance of Him, we praise God, confessing "that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Phil. 2:11).

MONDAY IN HOLY WEEK



(11 April 2022)

Isaiah 50:5–10 Hebrews 9:11–15 John 12:1–23

Our Merciful and Great High Priest Is Anointed for Our Eternal Redemption

In raising His friend Lazarus from the dead, Jesus signified His own approaching death and resurrection. For His hour had come, and His Passion was at hand. It is thus in preparation for His burial that Mary, the sister of Lazarus, "anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair" (John 12:3, 7). For He is the Christ, a "high priest of the good things that have come." who now offers "himself without blemish to God." to redeem us "by means of his own blood" (Heb. 9:11-12, 14). As the true Man, He does so with confidence that He will "not be put to shame," since His God and Father is at hand to help Him and to vindicate Him, even from death (Is. 50:7-8). He enters with His flesh and blood "into the holy places," so that "those who are called" may enter with Him into "the promised eternal inheritance" of the new covenant (Heb. 9:12, 15). The pleasing fragrance of His sacrifice fills His Church. and all those whom He raises from the dead with His Gospel are invited to recline "with him at table" (John 12:1-3).

TUESDAY IN HOLY WEEK



(12 April 2022)

Isaiah 49:1–7 1 Corinthians 1:18–25 (26–31) John 12:23–50

Christ Comes to the Hour of His Cross in Order to Bring You to the Father in Himself

The Son of God has come in the flesh, as the Servant of His God and Father, not only "to bring Jacob back to him," but also "as a light for the nations" (Is. 49:5-6). He is "honored in the eyes of the Lord," and the Father is glorified in Him, because He speaks and acts as the Father has commanded (Is. 49:3, 5; John 12:28, 49). As the light of the world, He comes to the hour of His cross, that He might "draw all people" to Himself (John 12:23, 27, 32). Those who thus believe in Him do not remain in darkness but walk in the light and follow Him through death into life, in order to be with Him where He is (John 12:26, 35, 46). Crucified and risen from the dead, Christ Jesus is your life and your salvation, "who became to us wisdom from God, righteousness and sanctification and redemption" (1 Cor. 1:30). And by the foolish preaching of His cross, which is the power and wisdom of God, you are saved through faith (1 Cor. 1:21-24).

WEDNESDAY IN HOLY WEEK



(13 April 2022)

Isaiah 62:11–63:7 Romans 5:6–11 John 13:16–38

The Son of God Is Glorified in His Self-Sacrificing Divine Love for Sinners

"God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners. Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). It is in this self-sacrificing divine love that "the Son of Man [is] glorified, and God is glorified in him" (John 13:31). Not for His benefit, but at His own expense, "according to the abundance of his steadfast love." He alone treads the winepress of His cross and Passion (Is. 63:3, 7). But "his reward is with him" for the salvation of sinners, whom He has not forsaken but sought out (ls. 62:11-12). Thus do we "rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ," since we are "reconciled to God by the death of his Son," and we are "saved by his life" (Rom. 5:10-11). As He prayed for Simon Peter against the assaults of Satan, that he should be restored after his denials and strengthen his brothers (Luke 22:31–32), so does He now send His ministers to serve and strengthen us, who recline "at table at Jesus' side" (John 13:20, 23). And as we are disciples whom Jesus loves, so does He command us to "love one another" (John 13:34-35).

HOLY (MAUNDY) THURSDAY



(14 April 2022)

Jeremiah 31:31–34 *or* Exodus 12:1–14 Hebrews 10:15–25 *or* 1 Corinthians 11:23–32 John 13:1–17, 31b–35

Let Us Love One Another, as Christ Jesus Has Loved Us

By Holy Baptism, "with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water" (Heb. 10:22), we enter the holy place with Jesus. For Jesus is our Passover Lamb who has been sacrificed for us. He reclines at table with us and feeds us with His own flesh and blood: "the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain" (Heb. 10:20). In Christ, the Lord remembers us in mercy and remembers our sin no more; He forgives us all our iniquity (Jer. 31:34; Heb. 10:17). With such love, He "loved his own who were in the world," and He even loves us "to the end" (John 13:1). As He washes us and feeds us in love, let us love one another, just as He has loved us (John 13:34).



GOOD FRIDAY

(15 April 2022)

Isaiah 52:13–53:12 Hebrews 4:14–16; 5:7–9 John 18:1–19:42 *or* John 19:17–30

Behold the Lamb of God, Who Takes Away the Sin of the World

Jesus, the Lamb of God, is led to the slaughter of His cross as the sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the world. "Despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief" (Is. 53:3), He is the righteous Servant who justifies many by His innocent suffering and death. He bears our griefs and carries our sorrows; He is wounded for our transgressions; He is crushed for our iniquities; He suffers our chastisement, so that "with his wounds we are healed" (Is. 53:4–5). As the Son of God, He fulfills the Law for us in human flesh, and so fulfills the Scriptures (John 19:7, 24). In perfect faith and faithfulness, He shares all our weaknesses and temptations, "yet without sin" (Heb. 4:15), and as our merciful High Priest, He brings us to the Father in peace.



HOLY SATURDAY

(16 April 2022)

Daniel 6:1–24 1 Peter 4:1–8 Matthew 27:57–66

We Live and Love in the Peace and Promise of the Resurrection of Christ Jesus

The disciples of Christ Jesus, like St. Joseph of Arimathea, deal in love with the body of Christ, in the sure and certain promise of the resurrection (Matt. 27:57-60). For they also remember what He said, that after three days He would rise, though His enemies conspire against Him and seek to thwart Him (Matt. 27:63). Indeed, we find a type and promise of the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ already in the prophet Daniel. For he was blameless and faithful, and "an excellent spirit was in him" (Dan. 6:3-4, 22). Although he was accused and delivered over to death, the Lord preserved his life and raised him up in righteousness, "because he had trusted in his God" (Dan. 6:23). So let us also pray and give thanks to God (Dan. 6:10), finding peace and Sabbath rest in Jesus Christ, And knowing that "the end of all things is at hand," let us be "self-controlled and sober-minded," and "keep loving one another earnestly" (1 Peter 4:7-8).

EASTER SUNRISE



(17 April 2022)

Job 19:23–27 1 Corinthians 15:51–57 John 20:1–18

Our Redeemer Lives!

In Adam, all die because all sin. The children of that first gardener have been driven out of Paradise and return to the dust whence they were taken. But now another Gardener has come, who has made His bed in the dust of the earth, and in His resurrection He has opened paradise for all the children of Adam. For "death is swallowed up in victory" (1 Cor. 15:54), and God "gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 15:57). So we each confess that "my Redeemer lives" and "in my flesh I shall see God" (Job 19:25, 26). As He has called us out of darkness into light and wiped away our tears, we behold Him now by faith and recognize His voice in the Gospel. We enter His tomb by the death of Holy Baptism, and we also share His resurrection. For as surely as He has risen, so we also one day "must rise from the dead" (John 20:9).



EASTER DAY

(17 April 2022)

Isaiah 65:17–25 1 Corinthians 15:19–26 Luke 24:1–12

Christ's Resurrection Is the Firstfruits of the New Creation

The Lord has promised to "create new heavens and a new earth" (Is. 65:17), in which His people shall abide in peace and joy. That new creation has begun in the bodily resurrection of Christ Jesus. All the baptized belong to that new creation. Reborn of water and the Holy Spirit, they are "the offspring of the blessed of the LORD" (Is. 65:23). The Lord rejoices and is glad in them; He hears and answers their prayers. For "if in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied" (1 Cor. 15:19). But Christ Jesus has been raised, "the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep" (1 Cor. 15:20). We may be "perplexed about this" (Luke 24:4), perhaps even frightened and brought to our knees, because it seems like an "idle tale" (Luke 24:11). But faith clings to the Word of Christ and finds His resurrected body — not in the tomb, but in His Holy Supper.



SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

(24 April 2022)

Acts 5:12–20 (21–32) Revelation 1:4–18 John 20:19–31

That You May Believe and Have Life in His Name

On the Lord's Day, St. John the apostle was given a revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ, the incarnate Son of God, the Alpha and Omega, the First and the Last. He is the Living One, "the firstborn of the dead" (Rev. 1:5). He died for all people, and behold, He is alive forevermore! Therefore, He has "the keys of Death and Hades" (Rev. 1:18). For His death atoned for sin and conquered death, and in His resurrection He opened the kingdom of heaven to us. The "sharp two-edged sword" of His mouth (Rev. 1:16) calls you to "believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God," that by such faith "you may have life in his name" (John 20:31). To that end, He sends His ministers of the Word, as the Father sent Him, "to give repentance to Israel and forgiveness of sins" (Acts 5:31).

So find or call Karen Boorom (573-774-0465) to reserve a place for you at the dinner table.




LWML CONVENTION IS DRAWING NEAR!!!

New Testament Letters

Those who study Crossways learn what if means to walk through life in the presence of Jesus the Messiah as their forgiving Savior and Servant-Lord. Many experience what the two disciples experienced on the way to Emmaus, Luke 24.32. Their hears are set on fire, and their lives are transformed!

The course equips people to grapple with the mind, manner, ministry, and mission of Jesus the Messiah, and to reflect Him in all they think, say and do. After all, Jesus does not call us to put Him *first* – but only. Christianity is not the most important *part* of life. It has to do with *all* of life.

Above all else, the goal is to help people understand the *grand finale* of the biblical narrative: the final rescue of God's people from the Real Enemy – the demonic – through the ministry of Jesus the Messiah. 

He Is Risen! And Now...

One of the most glorious sections in all of Scripture is found in 1 Corinthians 15 where we find the words of the apostle Paul as he expounds on Christ's crucifixion, resurrection, and subsequent appearances to His disciples. He

writes about the implications of those events that, just as we all died in Adam, so in Christ we are all made alive and that, just as Christ has a new glorified body, so shall we put off the perishable and be raised with an imperishable body. What a glorious passage! This is what Easter means to us!

Without taking a breath, Paul then continues, "Now about the collection..." To our minds these two themes don't fit

together. Certainly, thoughts about the collection don't belong in an Easter message, do they? Paul thinks they do, and why not? First, how do we respond to such a great gift as our salvation? Since God has poured out on us the treasures of His grace, will we not want to make a tangible expression of thanksgiving? Second, with a dying world around us, will we not want to expedite the mission of the Church to spread the Gospel message? "Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labor in the Lord is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58).

In the Palm of His Hand

Our Father, Who loves us so much, sent His own beloved Son to this earth to be born to a young mother and her carpenter husband. This Child, Who was and is King, was born in a stable, surrounded by animals, not servants. Shortly after His birth, His parents were forced to flee to escape the wrath of a jealous king who, in an effort to eliminate all competition, killed all male children under the age of two. But the Heavenly Father held His Son in the palm of His hand. No harm came to Him until the appointed time.

None of these events came as a surprise to the Father. He was aware of the conditions in the world. He chose humble people to be His Son's parents. He knew what would happen on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Nothing that occurred was beyond His control. He held His Son in the palm of His hand.

That beloved Son is our Good Shepherd, and no less watchful is His care for us. He comes to us and gives us faith so that we, His sheep, can recognize His voice. Jesus' own words tell us this is true: "My sheep listen to My voice; I know them, and they follow Me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of My hand" (John 10:27-28).

Therefore, we have nothing to fear! Family problems, loss of job, uncertainty of the future – we are secure in His hand, for He will allow no one to separate us from Him. He holds us in the palm of His hand.

Carry Your Own Load

When things are going well and we achieve some success, it is easy to forget that it is God Who gives us our gifts and soon we are using them for our own glory, rather than His.

Whether God gives us many talents or few, we are accountable to God for what we do with them. The Apostle Paul wrote, "So then, each of us will give an account of himself to God" (Romans 14:12).

"For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive what is due him for the things done in the body, whether good or evil" (2 Corinthians 5:10).

In the Parable of the Talents found in Matthew 25, Jesus spoke about being accountable. Jesus said that a man going on a journey entrusted three servants with different amounts of talents (money). Upon his return, he found that two of the servants had demonstrated their faithfulness by prudently investing their talents. When the master heard they had doubled the amount they had been given, he praised them and gave them even greater responsibility. The one servant who did nothing with his talent received the master's wrath.

Our Savior came to earth with a job to do. He held Himself accountable to carry out His task even though it caused Him extreme anguish (Luke 22:44).


Joyfully (Hebrews 12:2), willingly He went to the cross for us, faithfully fulfilling His purpose of saving sinners.

We, too, will be held accountable for the blessings which God entrusts to us. Through faith, God can strengthen and equip us so we can hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:21).

Cook's Corner



Salami Mozzarella Calzone

Ingredients

- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
- 1/4 pound shredded reduced-fat mozzarella cheese
- Extra-virgin olive oil, for brushing
- 1 13.8-ounce tube refrigerated pizza dough
- 1/4-pound deli-sliced salami, cut into thin strips
- 1 1/2 cups giardiniera (pickled mixed vegetables), drained
- 1/4-pound sliced provolone cheese

Directions

- 1. Place a baking sheet upside down in the oven and preheat to 400 degrees F. Beat the eggs, parsley and lemon zest in a small bowl. Pour half of the egg mixture into a medium bowl and stir in the mozzarella. Reserve the remaining egg mixture for brushing on the crust.
- 2. Turn another baking sheet upside down; line with parchment paper and brush with olive oil. Unroll the dough on the parchment paper and pat into a 9-by-12-inch rectangle. Spread the mozzarella mixture over one half of the dough, leaving a 1-inch border along the edge. Top with the salami, followed by the pickled vegetables and provolone. Fold the other half of the dough over to cover the filling. Crimp and roll the edges to seal, then pierce the top of the dough in a few places with a knife.
- 3. Slide the calzone with the parchment paper onto the hot baking sheet; bake 15 minutes. Remove from the oven and brush with the remaining egg mixture, then continue to bake until the crust is golden, 5 to 10 more minutes. Let rest 5 minutes, then cut into wedges.



The One in Despair Still Trusts God

"He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he desires him. For he said, 'I am the Son of God." And the robbers who were crucified with him also reviled him in the same way. Now from the sixth hour there was darkness over all the land until the ninth hour. And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Matthew 27:43-46

During his travels in the 1860s that would be documented in his book Roughing It, Mark Twain visited Mono Lake, a saltwater basin, just a few miles from Yosemite National Park. Twain called it, "lifeless, treeless, hideous desert... the loneliest place on earth."

Though there are crowds looking on, as Jesus hangs upon the cross it is the loneliest place on the earth. The crowds simply cruelly cast their insults upon Him. The religious leaders mock Him with their biting words. His disciples have abandoned Him, save one. And His mother stands there, unable to leave His side, but also unable to bear the sight or His pain. This mother who cradled Him in her arms cannot lift a hand to help Him. And while Jesus looks upon her and speaks out of love and concern for her, her presence can bring Him no comfort. There is no relief here. Here on the cross, Jesus hangs alone. It is the loneliest place on earth.

But what makes it the loneliest place on the earth is not so much the absence of loved ones, but the absence of God the Father to act. King David once pondered, "Where can I go from your Spirit? Where shall I flee from your presence? If I ascend to heaven, you are there! If I make my bed in Sheol, you are there!" But here on the cross, the Father abandons the Son. Jesus cries out, "My God, my God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" In the great mystery that is the doctrine of God, the Father forsakes the Son and abandons Him on the cross. Jesus is in absolute despair. This is a place where no one has ever been before – a place where God the Father refuses to be mighty to save. God the Father looks on to the despair of His Son and He does not intervene. He does not come to His aid, yet.

The crowds love hearing Jesus cry out. That's the reason for which they came! He trusts God! Let God rescue Him! But there would be no rescue. Just like we thought! See! We told you. He trusts in God and look where it got Him. He suffered and died. He was abandoned by God.

The crowds were right, in a sense. And that's the irony. But in Jesus crying out in despair, He quotes another of David's psalms, this time 22. My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? These are hopeless words. These are words of one who recognizes that no deliverance will come. These are the words of the defeated and dying man. At least that is what the crowds think. But Jesus is One on whose lips the Words of the Lord are always found. Even when He when He cries out in anguish and defeat, it is a cry of faith – for Yahweh is still My God and only one who believes the Word speaks the Word at a time such as this. Yes, Jesus is forsaken by God the Father at this moment. But that doesn't mean that there is no rescue, just not here at the cross. But it is coming.


In His Pentecost sermon, Peter explained God's plan so beautifully as He quoted once again from David's psalms. In quoting Psalm 16, Peter explained that God did not abandon Jesus' soul to grave or let His holy one see corruption. Oh yes, Jesus cried out in despair. It was a cry of utter anguish. It was a cry of pain and suffering that are unimaginable. But it was still a cry of faith from the One who trusted God. For Jesus didn't just commend His living body on the cross to His Father in heaven, He even commends His cold, lifeless corpse to the Father. God the Father doesn't abandon His beloved Son to the grave, but raises Him to life on the third day.

Prayer – O God, whose glory it is always to have mercy, be gracious to all who have gone astray from Your ways and bring them again with penitent hearts and steadfast faith to embrace and hold fast the unchangeable truth of Your Word; who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod celebrates its birthday on April 26.

Founded in 1847

The roots of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod trace back to 1847, when Saxon and other German immigrants established a new church body in America, seeking the freedom to practice and follow confessional Lutheranism.

Initial members, which included 12 pastors representing 14 congregations from Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan, New York and Ohio, signed the church body's constitution on April 26, 1847, at First Saint Paul Lutheran Church in Chicago, Ill.

Originally named The German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States, the name was shortened to The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in 1947 on the occasion of our 100th anniversary. The First President



The Rev. Dr. C.F.W. Walther (Oct. 25, 1811 – May 7, 1887) served as the first president of the church body. As a young pastor, Walther joined the Saxon Germans who immigrated to the United States in 1839, and, at only 27 years old, he was the leader of the group that settled in Perry County, Mo. Dr. Walther played a key role in the founding of the LCMS in 1847, and he served as the church body's first

president, holding office from 1847 to 1850 and again from 1864 to 1878.

Walther presided over the young Synod, leading its growth through the years of the great migration of German immigrants. He served as president of Concordia Seminary from 1850 to 1887, and he was editor of Der Lutheraner, a leading magazine of the day that reached Confessional Lutherans across the country. Today, Walther is revered as the leading Lutheran theologian of his time, and he's fondly known as the "Father of the Missouri Synod."

Amid war in Ukraine, the church's mission remains

On Thursday, Feb. 24, Russia launched an early morning invasion of Ukraine. As the conflict enters its second month, the people of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) continue to pray for those affected and seek opportunities to help.

A coup and an invasion

The LCMS has been working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine (ELCU), an emerging partner church, for the last four years. The Rev. Serge Maschewski, bishop of the ELCU, studied in the Russian Project at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, in the 1990s. He led the congregations of the ELCU out of the Deutsche Evangelisch-Lutherische Kirche der Ukraine (DELKU) — which is affiliated with the German state church, the Evangelische Kirche in Deutschland (EKD) — when the EKD ordered the Ukrainian church to accept women's ordination and the LGBTQ agenda. In the last two years the EKD, in cooperation with others, carried out a coup against the ELCU, taking over the ELCU headquarters in Odesa, Ukraine, and seizing its bank accounts. Maschewski, his wife and their two sons were removed from the building by force and thrown into the street.

The Rev. James A. Krikava, associate executive director of the LCMS Office of International Mission, notes that the coup against the ELCU happened before Vladimir Putin's invasion of Ukraine. Before the coup, an LCMS missionary couple was teaching English in Odesa and Dnipro. Theological seminars for pastors were being held monthly, and <u>another missionary family was preparing to deploy to Ukraine to help carry out this work</u>. But for health reasons the couple had to leave the field, and when violence broke out against the church, the family had to be diverted to Romania. They are now assisting with the relief effort there.

Meanwhile, the LCMS still had one missionary family working in Russia, even after the assault on Ukraine began. The Rev. Jerry Lawson had been teaching at the Bible Institute of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ingria in Russia, an LCMS partner church. Lawson, his wife and their two children were living and serving in St. Petersburg, far from the fighting, and Krikava was checking on them daily.

As the war in Ukraine intensified, however, the notice came that all Americans should leave Russia. This turned out to be a challenge, as flights from Western countries were being banned from entering Russian airspace. To leave by air, the Lawsons would have had to fly to Turkey or a Middle Eastern country in order to get back into Europe.

Ultimately, the Finnish consulate in St. Petersburg offered to take them on a bus of diplomats traveling from St. Petersburg to Helsinki. The border passing was not easy, as in addition to the Russian border guards, there were many Russian army personnel, heavily armed, thoroughly searching all baggage.

"God be praised," said Krikava, "that the Lawsons made it safely out of Russia. Once they arrived in Helsinki, they were met by pastors and friends from our partner church, the Evangelical Lutheran Mission Diocese of Finland. They traveled to Riga, Latvia, where for the time being Pastor Lawson can continue to teach his theology courses in the Russian Bible Institute, as well as assist with the [Lutheran Livonian Project] in Riga."

'Tears of relief'

Elsewhere in Europe, other LCMS missionaries are also ministering to refugees. The Rev. Dr. Christian Tiews, LCMS missionary to Germany, is providing pastoral care to several fleeing Ukrainian families. He recently met one of the families, a mother and her teenage daughter, at the train station in Hamburg (the husband/father had stayed behind to help defend his country). Tiews said that he wasn't sure how to identify the women, so he held up a homemade blue and yellow sign with their names.

"As the Lord would have it," Tiews said, "[they] disembarked right in front of me ... with tears of relief running down their faces after five days on the road." Tiews said that he helped the women find their host and accompanied them to the host's vehicle.

"When we got there, I asked ... whether they would mind if we had a prayer of thanks for their safe arrival," Tiews continued. The host looked "skeptical," saying, "Praying is not really my thing."

But the Ukrainians agreed, and Tiews prayed with the group, noting that after the prayer, the Ukrainians made the sign of the cross. The next day, Tiews said the women's host called to let him know they were doing well. Before hanging up, she added, "Thank you for praying last night. I'm not really into all of that religion stuff, but somehow praying to God felt good. It gave me peace."

'Miraculous' outpouring

Krikava said the situation in Ukraine remains "grave" and is "getting more tense each day." Asked what the church's role is at times such as this, he replied, "It is the same role as always, except under extreme conditions: bringing God's people His gifts of Word and Sacrament. I talk to people in Ukraine every day via video. They are starting to look ragged. Their fear is more noticeable. Still, their faces express the depth of their conviction and faith. They remain resolute and relatively calm. It is hard to imagine all they are going through."

Of the Synod's missionaries in Eurasia, Krikava said they "deserve an A+. First there was COVID, then persecution — not only in Ukraine, but against our partner church in Finland — and now this war, which is affecting so many. Up to 6 million refugees are predicted. But our missionaries are doing well. Our partner churches in the area are also helping, and the outpouring of prayers and gifts from the people of the LCMS has been miraculous."
