Summer has turned to fall. As the heat waves begin to dissipate and the school calendars begin to set more of the community agenda, we give thanks to our Lord for the blessings of these past months while and anticipating the joys of the next.

I thank the Lord of the Church that the congregation was well served by Pastor Ben Schumacher and Seminarian Michael Wilke while I was in Germany. As the [convention](#) for the Missouri District concluded in on June 14, 22 Christians including Karen Boorum, David and Anita Mathews, Brian and Martha Strong, Heidi, Lydia, Eden, and me, embarked on our 14 day [tour](#) to see cities, towns, monasteries, churches, homes, castles, schools streets and rivers all connected to the Life of Martin Luther and the enfolding changes in world history related to the Renaissance and Reformation of Western Christendom. Many highlights could be recounted, each one of us certainly could share different ones, Heidi received permission to play the organ in the Castle Church at Wittenberg where Luther often preached and is now entombed waiting for the resurrection of the body. The tour concluded in Berlin, and I travelled on with my family to [Wolfenbüttel](#), Germany.

On our third full day of travel, Karen fell from the top step of the rear exit of the tour bus and was transported to Ludwigsburg Hospital and admitted to the [Neurology Clinic](#). She lived another 20 days until her passing on July 6. I was certainly glad to share a few hours with her, Karen’s daughter Tonya, and Mary Jones’ daughter Dawn on the Friday before she passed. Her loss remain a very present grief with us for days to come.

The remainder of July provided time for constructive research at the [Herzog August Bibliothek](#). To summarize, Matthias Flacius of Croatia, a student of Luther and Melancthon, produced 3200 handwritten pages of Bible Commentary – Old and New Testament – in the final 10 years of his life. These original manuscripts are the subject of my Doctoral dissertation. I was able to survey and evaluate the materials – determining a selection of sections immediately useful for the dissertation assignment, and preparing for the prospect of bringing these materials from Latin to English readers. To begin with though, the dissertation is simply to provide an account of Flacius’ method and process for bringing the meaning of the biblical text to light for his readers.

For all those 7 weeks I was away, I thank Seminarian Michael Wilke for investing his summer here with you. He has returned to his studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

Since returning from Germany July 28, we prepared for and conducted Karen's Memorial Service on Saturday, August 13. Followed by our first First Communion Retreat (August 15-19), initiating the process for our young people who desire to participate in the Lord's Supper to prepare for communion participation. Please keep these families in your prayers as we partner with them to bring up their children in the way they should go. The Adkins, Anderson, Bartz, Boerner, and Clark families all participated to begin the journey. On Monday, we surveyed highlights of the Old Testament. On Tuesday we surveyed highlights of the New Testament. On Wednesday, we introduced Luther's Small Catechism and its presentation of the 10 commandments, the Apostles' Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. On Thursday we discussed Baptism and the Lord's Supper. On Friday we concluded with an orientation to the Lutheran Service Book-Hymnal, the Divine services, the prayer services, the resources for individual and family devotions, the hymns, and the Church Year. Thank you to Lee Phinney as well for providing us a tour through the Altar Guild's work in preparation for the Lord's Supper.

The last full week of August (22-26) was Orientation Week at Concordia Seminary with our New Deaconess Intern Mission Planter-Kim Bradford. Days of welcome, policies and procedures, campus tours, fellowship time with her fellow deaconess students from all over the country, risk management, curriculum review, opportunities to meet professors, leaders from our Seminary and President Harrison at the International Center. She had her first class session, received her internship assignment with us, and was recognized with her beginning classmates in the open worship service on Friday. I was in mentor/coach training in conjunction with the other administrative and procedural orientations. We saw Michael Wilke a few times as he began his orientation into the Doctoral Studies program.

Turning toward what lies ahead, September and the new fall program : New Programs Starts:

- Mothers of Preschoolers will meet twice a month to provide a Christian social and education support network for new mothers into their children's early school years. Experienced moms are invited to serve as mentors to younger moms, especially as so many of them are away from family for the first time when they come to Fort Leonard Wood.
- The Gospel According to Matthew meets on zoom as an opportunity to share life with new and renewing Christians around the Ozarks. Pastor Perling and Deaconess Intern Kim Bradford co lead this study to introduce people to Jesus and to one another.
- Paul's Letter to the Galatians taught by Pastor Ben Schumacher provides insight into Paul's ministry, his confession of radical grace given by our Lord through the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus the Messiah and the Freedom to walk by and live in the Spirit, enjoying His benefits.
- Faith Skills: See through the Scriptures provides an overview of the recurring themes throughout the Bible from our Lord's original plan, it's restoration in the Kingdom of Christ, and it's consummation under His Reign and Rule. A great way to begin reading and understand the Bible for yourself. Work the Word!
- Ruth: God's Word for Today – Ruth was cut-off from hope because of death, but the Lord opened a way for her to renew her hope and life again, to be redeemed herself, and grafted into the line of promise leading to Jesus. Love hopes all things, believes all things.
- The Annotated Luther – The years between the 95 theses (1517) and the Diet of Worms (1521) were some of Luther's most prolific. In these writings we see him beginning to grasp the good news of Jesus Christ and all its ramifications.
- Fundamentals of Greek Grammar will introduce you to Biblical Greek so that you can experience it in High Definition and Surround Sound.

Returning this Fall with New Leadership

- Ladies of Faith and Ladies Aid will use bible study resources by women for women to find joy in Jesus
- Men's Club: Ephesians invites us to put on the whole armor of God. Having studied the summary pieces Paul offers in chapter 6, we'll digest the whole book knowing that he writes this for us to be thoroughly Equipped, ready and resilient for action.



Ladies of Faith


Tuesday Evenings 6:30pm

Christ Jesus Has Paid the Cost of Discipleship for You

A disciple of Jesus Christ will “bear his own cross” (Luke 14:27) and follow the Lord through death into life. Discipleship is costly because it crucifies the old man with “all that he has” (Luke 14:33), in order to raise up the new man in Christ. The disciple disavows “his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life” (Luke 14:26), in deference to Christ. That way of the cross is impossible, except that Christ Jesus has already paid the cost. His cross is set before you as “life and good, death and evil” (Deut. 30:15). Taking up His cross is to “choose life, that you and your offspring may live, loving the LORD your God, obeying his voice and holding fast to him” (Deut. 30:19–20). To live that life in Christ is also to bear His cross in love, “that your goodness might not be by compulsion but of your own accord” (Philemon 14).

Jesus Christ Is the Great Shepherd of His Sheep

“The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners” (1 Tim. 1:15). As He had mercy on Paul, in order to “display his perfect patience” (1 Tim. 1:16), so also does He seek out His sheep “from all places where they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness” (Ezek. 34:12). To deliver His flock, He “will seek the lost, ... bring back the strayed, ... bind up the injured, and ... strengthen the weak” (Ezek. 34:16), and “they shall no longer be a

prey” (Ezek. 34:22). He sets over them one great Good Shepherd, the Son of David, who “shall feed them and be their shepherd” (Ezek. 34:23). For Christ Jesus is the one man who, “having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them,” would “leave the ninety-nine in the open country, and go after the one that is lost, until he finds it” (Luke 15:4). When He finds the lost one and brings it home rejoicing, “the angels of God” and all the company of heaven rejoice with Him, with great joy (Luke 15:7, 10).

The Lord Is Rich in His Grace and Mercy

Because God, our Savior, “desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth” (1 Tim. 2:4), He urges “that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people” (1 Tim. 2:1). Christians should so pray “without anger or quarreling,” but “adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control” (1 Tim. 2:8, 9). For the Lord does not forget “the poor of the land” (Amos 8:4). He remembers them according to the foolishness of the cross. “For what is exalted among men is an abomination in the sight of God” (Luke 16:15). Though we try to justify ourselves “before men,” God knows our sinful hearts and calls us to repentance (Luke 16:15). Though we are “not strong enough to dig,” and we are “ashamed to beg” (Luke 16:3), He justifies us by His grace and welcomes us into His “eternal dwellings” (Luke 16:9). More shrewd than even “the sons of this world” (Luke 16:8), He requires His stewards of the Gospel to bestow forgiveness freely.

Our Help Is Not in Worldly Riches

“The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham’s side,” and “the rich man also died and was buried” (Luke 16:22). The poor man Lazarus, who knew many bad things on earth, began to be comforted forever, whereas the rich man, after a lifetime of good things, began to be *“in anguish”* (Luke 16:25). Therefore, *“woe to those who are at ease in Zion”* (Amos 6:1), for *“the revelry of those who stretch themselves out shall pass away”* (Amos 6:7). The wealthy are urged *“not to be haughty, nor to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches,”* but *“to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share”* (1 Tim. 6:17–18). Covetous desire for what God has not given is idolatry and *“a root of all kinds of evils”* (1 Tim. 6:10). Contentment belongs to faith, by which the Christian has *“great gain”* in godliness (1 Tim. 6:6).



Congregational Singing and the Body of Christ

“Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it,” Paul writes in his first Letter to the Corinthians (1 Corinthians 12:27).

Paul is speaking of spiritual gifts and how each member of the Church is given a specific gift important to the Body of Christ. He emphasizes that each part of the body is essential despite its potential wish to be another part of the body. For example, if every ear wished to be an eye and “the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing?” (1 Corinthians 12:17). We are given gifts from God to contribute to the Body of Christ.

Members of One Body



In a way, this reminds me of congregational singing. Of course, it can apply to voice parts—if every Tenor wished to be a Bass, we would lack the

beautiful harmonies of four-part singing. But it also applies to singing in general. Individual voices within a congregation must all join together to produce a beautiful sound.

Just like every voice part in a choir, every singing member of a congregation matters. The sounds of dozens of voices raised together carry forth those strong Lutheran melodies we love so much. Just like a body, each member contributes something to this one sound.

Your voice is important. It allows you to uniquely contribute to the sound of your congregation.

In this way, we act as the hand or eye or ear of the body. These are not the body itself, but they are all essential parts of the body. So it is with our voices. You do not sing to gain prominence as a soloist within the context of congregational singing, but you contribute your unique voice as part of the larger body.

In Service to Others Rather Than Ourselves

Our whole lives are meant to follow Christ’s example of service to others rather than to ourselves. As a member of one body, we use our specific gifts in service to our brothers and sisters and not in order to gain recognition or praise. It is much the same with singing.

When we sing as one group, it is good practice to blend your voice within that group, not strive to stick out with a louder or more powerful voice than others. When we sing as a congregation, we use our voices in the service of others. We join our voices together to create a sound that is greater than our individual voice, despite the fact that it is made up of individual voices. When we join our voices together, we are humbly allowing the congregation to take precedence over our own desires.

In this understanding of congregational singing, we find that hymns and liturgy are important as they lend themselves to group singing. We can sing hymns and liturgy as one congregation—as one Body of Christ. Instead of one or a few soloists leading every song in their own unique style, our hymns are written so that everyone may join together in one voice. This emphasizes our unity. An emphasis on congregational singing does not eliminate every solo or choral piece, but the singing of Lutheran hymns and liturgy ensures that the majority of our music is sung together as a single body of Christ.

Take this as an encouragement and a charge that you need to sing on Sunday morning! Your voice is an important contribution to the Body of Christ.



Concordia Seminary's Online Deaconess Studies program prepares women to share the Gospel through works of mercy, spiritual care and teaching the Christian faith in congregations, hospitals, nursing homes, social service organizations and foreign missions.



The four-year distance education program leads to certification as a commissioned deaconess in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS).

The integrated curriculum includes 16 master's-level courses offered one at a time in a live, online format. Students are required to participate in three activities on campus: orientation at the beginning of the program, and formation seminars midway and again near the end of the program.

Students serve as interns in their location of service upon entering the program and beginning course work. Online deaconess students are advised by and supervised by Ministerial Formation. At the end of the program, students are eligible to receive deaconess certification and placement as a deaconess in the LCMS.

Lutheran Schools Making Disciples for Life

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age. Matthew 28:19-20

The imperative of the Great Commission is not “Go,” but “Make disciples.” Our Lord calls us to carry out this making of disciples by baptizing and teaching. This teaching is ultimately a lifetime of catechesis that happens from the font to the tomb. While homes and churches are critical components in this work, even before the Synod was formed, Lutheran schools have been a primary means through which disciples have been made.

The fifth objective of Synod is to “Aid congregations to develop processes of thorough Christian education and nurture and to establish agencies of Christian education such as elementary and secondary schools and to support synodical colleges, universities, and seminaries.” We are thankful and blessed to operate more than 1,700 early childhood centers, 800 elementary schools, nearly 100 high schools, 7 university campuses, and two seminaries. In the Missouri District, we have 108 schools (early childhood centers, elementary schools, and high schools).

The reason we continue to operate Lutheran schools is that they are places not only of learning, but in the task of making disciples. Lutheran schools offer something distinctly different from the public schools in teaching a Christian world and helping children to understand who they are as men and women created in God’s image and ones for whom Christ died. We provide schools and teachers who do not attack the Christian faith of children and families, but are committed to helping them grow in Christ.

As another school-year begins, please pray for our Lutheran schools, that they would be faithful to God’s Word and good stewards of the resources entrusted to them. As noted a couple weeks ago, we also invite you to pray for more young people would be led to prepare for service to the Lord as Lutheran school teachers.

Prayer - O God, source of all abiding knowledge, through Word and Spirit You both enlighten the minds and sanctify the lives of those whom You draw to Your service. Look with favor on the schools, colleges and universities of the Church so that they may be seedbeds for those who study and learn as they are nurtured and grow in their relationship with You. Encourage through Your Spirit both students and faculties to apply themselves with ready diligence to their tasks and faithfully fulfill their service according to Your will; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.
