*	Describe how the father of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-32) treated his son when he came home. What does this story teach us about the way God hears our prayers?
*	We pray to God, "Our Father who art in Heaven," which is just another way of saying that God is "in power" over all creation. When you pray today, what will you ask of this all-powerful, all-loving God?
RAY	Pray together for someone or something that is making your life difficult. Begin your prayer with the words "Our Father" or "God of power"
LESS	Say this Bible memory verse outloud to your parent or faith mentor: "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are." - 1 John 3:1
