PASTOR SEABAUGH'S MESSAGE

The Suffering Shepherd

The season of Lent is a time for us to remember why Jesus came to this world. Why Jesus took on flesh and blood to be as we are, yet without sin. Why Jesus would leave His heavenly home to live among us.

Something's wrong! When you hear that statement, you immediately want to know what's wrong. Because, when something is wrong, the way that things should be aren't they way that they should be. It could be the strange noise coming from the refrigerator, the puddle underneath your car, or the bump that is found on your body. Whatever the something is, it needs to be looked at, it needs to be dealt with. Sometimes, you might have the expertise to solve the problem yourself, and sometimes you must find someone to help fix what is wrong.

Jesus is our suffering shepherd. This is not how we want to picture Jesus. Last month, was a lot more palatable to talk about Jesus as our loving Shepherd, and yet the two go hand, love and suffering, all because something's wrong.

This was the realization that Eve and Adam had in the garden when the disobeyed God and ate. Something so wrong that they realized they were naked, and they tried to hide themselves from God. Something so wrong, that they now knew that they had sinned. Something so wrong that now God's judgment would come to pass, if you eat, you will die. Something was most definitely wrong.

God is judge, but also the problem solver. Yes, sin was committed, and the Judge rightly condemned them and all people to die because of sin, but God had the answer the only answer for this problem. He would send for the Savior. He would send for the One, the One and only who could remove sin and save us from an eternity of suffering and pain. Who was the One, the problem solver, none other than His Son, the great Shepherd of the sheep, Jesus. As Peter writes, "22He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. 23When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly. 24He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed. 25For you were straying like sheep but have now returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.

Our Shepherd is the One who did suffer in our place. He loved the world that much that He laid down His life for us! He knew He alone could correct the wrong that we had done. Lent is a time when we look to our Shepherd, the suffering Shepherd, and we in silent awe marvel as His compassion for us!

The Lord is our Shepherd!

DPM ARTICLE

As we journey through this Lenten season, we prepare for the celebration of our Lord on Easter Day. Lent is a time for prayerful and penitent reflection. It is a time focused on the sufferings and death of our Lord Jesus Christ. One hymn that we sing at the beginning of Lent is “O Lord, throughout These Forty Days.”

O Lord, throughout these forty days
 You prayed and kept the fast;
 Inspire repentance for our sin,
 And free us from our past. (LSB 418 v.1)

The hymn writer, Claudia Hernaman, parallels the forty days of Lent with the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness in prayer and fasting. For Christians in previous centuries, the 40 days of Lent included going without regular meals for a period of time. That custom is still observed in various parts of Christendom today. For us Christians, Lent is a parallel experience to what Jesus experienced. To keep the fast like Jesus did, we can follow in the footsteps of Jesus in the wilderness, finding blessing and spiritual benefit in purposeful self-denial during Lent.

Taking time for silent personal reflection and prayer through individual and family devotions has a special meaning in Lent. Verse 1 of “Jesus I will Ponder Now” (LSB 440) calls for an extra measure of devotion and prayer.

Jesus, I will ponder now on Your holy passion;
 With Your Spirit me endow for such meditation.
 Grant that I in love and faith may the image cherish
 Of Your suffering, pain, and death that I may not perish.

As we keep the focus of Lent, it becomes a more meaningful season. On top of that, we anticipate with joy the Easter season. For Christ is risen! He died and rose for you and me. “We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him” (Romans 6:9).

Be with us through this season, Lord,
 And all our earthly days,
 That when the final Easter dawns,
 We join in heaven’s praise. (LSB 418 v.4)





Joyful noise



Use your voice and this hand-crafted percussion instrument to make joyful noises to the Lord.

3. Tape the spoons to the egg. Also wrap tape around the spoons from top to bottom to make a shaker handle.
4. Decorate your shaker and use it as you sing praises to God.
5. Experiment with sounds by filling other eggs with coins, rice, and so on.


