PASTOR'S PEN

Fearless Reform

Are you going to stand by and let it happen? What problem will you suffer all even death than back down?

What are the barricades that are erected to prevent a person from entering the kingdom, from salvation? The first and most important is our sin. Sin destroyed the relationship that God established in the garden and was met with His just judgment of temporal and eternal punishment. We are all sinners, conceived and born as offspring of Adam and Eve. Our sin is exposed and realized as we view our lives (thoughts, words, and deeds) in view of God's Word, specifically the Law. We have no place in the kingdom.

What then removes the barrier that is sin? This is the question that all should ask, when confronted with sin and its judgment. How can I be saved? Martin Luther studying to be a monk was taught that is it through the work of man that one can remove sin and be right with God. He was taught that our righteous deeds, our keeping the law is the answer.

Martin, though, knew the reality. He knew as he studied God's Word and the law and efforted to keep it, he fell short, as all do. So now what? His conscious was terrified. The law exposed his sin and his hopelessness.

God's Word though is not just a book of sin and law. Rather it tells of our loving and merciful God who promised to save us! Yes, to save us! God delivered on the promise in His Son Jesus. Jesus carried our sin and suffered as He was punished in our place and then died. But death could not hold Jesus, so after doing all the work required and after a three-day rest in the tomb, Jesus rose. This is the tomb of victory, the tomb that crushed Satan, removes sin, and makes us heirs of eternal life.

Martin, terrified by the law, crushed under sins' weight, was liberated by the Gospel which is Jesus crucified and risen. Martin was free, as we all are by grace through faith. What great news! But sadly, the Church did not want to hear it. They were captive to the law and man's righteousness as necessary to be saved.

Martin took a stand, even as he was on trial for heresy for his refusal recant from His writings concerning the Gospel. In January 1521, Luther was excommunicated by Pope Leo X. By mid-April, Luther found himself answering allegations of heresy at the now-famous Diet of Worms, an assembly of princes and prelates overseen by the Holy Roman Emperor, with the strong possibility that the 37-year-old excommunicate would be burned at the stake. Luther was, again, given an opportunity to save himself. All he had to do was "recant," and all would be forgiven. He responded with these now famous words, "My conscience is captive to the Word of God. Thus I cannot and will not recant, because acting against one's conscience is neither safe nor sound. Here I stand; I can do no other. God help me."

Fearless, was Martin Luther a new man because of the Gospel. However, Luther was not the first as St. Paul wrote, Philippians 1:21, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain."

This year our theme is from Luke 12:32 "Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Like Paul, Martin Luther, and the saints before us and as saints here, we live this life, "fearless." God has given us the kingdom by grace through faith. We stand firm in our faith in the assurance of this blessed hope, whether against earthly or spiritual foes!

God help us!

"But I promise..."

Have you ever heard someone say, "But you promised...."? As a parent or grandparent, it can be especially hard to hear children whine and complain that you've broken a promise; especially when you've broken a promise! Sometimes we can't avoid breaking our promises. We genuinely want to volunteer or go to the amusement park, but things happen and our plans change. We may feel terrible for breaking our promises yet we realize that there are times when we cannot do anything about it. What if our children or grandchildren visualize God as someone who can and does break *His* promises just because we break ours? How terrible! It's so important for us to have children in weekly worship, Sunday school, confirmation classes, and Youth Bible studies so they have a chance, again and again, to hear of all the times that God keeps His promises. In Sunday school, we have been learning about the promises God has made in Genesis: to make and care for His creation, to give Abraham descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky, and to give Abraham and Sarah a baby even though their bodies were nearly dead. God doesn't just make simple promises, He makes *incredible* promises that only He can fulfill! The greatest promise God made was to send His son, Jesus, to live a perfect life, to die for our sins, and to raise again. The promises don't end there! If Jesus has risen, we will arise too! Whenever we have fears and doubts, we can remember that God says to us, "But I promise to always love you." Let's thank God for His promises!

STEWARDSHIP

The 2 Most Important Components of Managing Money Well

1. Putting God First

Money is more than a medium of exchange to get the things you need or want in life. Just like everything else you possess, money is entrusted to us by God for our good and the good of others. More specifically, he assigns us money so we can carry out our responsibility and accomplish His will.

When our perspective about money changes from our money to His money, that's putting God first. When we seek his Kingdom and his righteousness as we make spending and giving decisions, we're putting God first. Every financial decision becomes a spiritual decision because we're not managing our money; we're managing God's money.

A practical way to put God first in your finances is to make a plan that honors God. Putting God first means the first category in our plan is giving. Commit to supporting God's work by returning to God the first portion. Equally important to us is giving to the poor and organizations that promote and expand the gospel message in various ways.

2. Make and Live by a Written Financial Plan

You've heard this before, but the national statistics aren't improving. Most Americans (Christians, too) live paycheck to paycheck, have little to no savings, and don't operate by a written financial plan, so I will keep revisiting this until these stats improve.

You need to have a written plan. No, it doesn't have to be complicated. But, without a plan, and one that gives you the confidence to make informed and wise decisions, you're going to keep living paycheck to paycheck, lack savings, and think that half of your expenses are emergencies when they're not.

Your financial plan should prioritize saving for the future, reducing existing debt so you can regain more of your income, and dividing the rest of your income into your family's different categories and needs like housing, food, clothing, and transportation.
