Pastor's Message

Lutheran Christians in the Dominican Republic

In recent years I've learned there is growth of Lutheran congregations in Latin America. Churches are forming in Guatemala, Honduras, Panama, Bolivia, Venezuela, Cuba, the Dominican Republic (DR), and other countries.

Due to the increasing interest, and the need for theological education of their pastors and teachers, a seminary was built in the city of Santiago in the DR. I visited there March 8-10 to meet their pastors, see a few congregations, and consider if ours might partner with them in evangelism and planting churches.



Concordia the Reformer Seminary trains pastors, teachers, and deaconesses. Since 2017 they served students from 14 countries, graduating 99 deaconesses and 12 pastors.



Our Saturday was mostly meeting pastors, missionaries, and deaconesses who are serving around Santiago. They speak in Spanish, while we listen through earpieces to the translator speaking in English.



Pastor Idjon Fritz led our opening worship using the Order of Matins from the Spanish Lutheran Service Book. Our singing was accompanied by guitar, keyboard, and flute.



Our forum was attended by ten people: five from an LCMS church in Oconomowoc, WI, three from an LCMS church in Beverly Hills, MI, and two of us from St. Matthew. These forums are held twice a year at the seminary.



Our crew of ten all stayed in one hotel. The rooms were small (bedroom size), but we had normal beds, normal bathrooms, and normal food. We were taken from place to place on a minibus by a local driver named Rowdy.



The Dominican Republic government asked if they could share the church site with the Lutheran congregation in Lisey. The DR then built school classrooms on the property. The church's pastor, Rev. Yban Navarro, serves as School Chaplain during the week and meets local families.



This is a new congregation building in the city of Lisey. The church door is open (much needed for air circulation!) for our Sunday worship service. We sang liturgy and hymns in Spanish, including "God's Own Child, I'll Gladly Say It."



This is the back porch of a home right next to the Lisey church. The economic status in the DR is higher than in neighboring country Haiti, and there is growing support for education, but most communities would generally be considered poor.

Deaconess Sarah Longmire and I attended the Spring FORO at Santiago in the Dominican Republic. Why is it called a FORO in all capital letters? That is the name they give their "get acquainted" forums here.

The education portion is held at the Seminary which was built in 2017. But this site is not just the confessional Lutheran seminary, whose classrooms and professor offices occupy the second floor... the lower level classrooms are used for a Lutheran school during the week for 60 students from Preschool age to third grade... and the school chapel serves as a sanctuary for the Palmar Arriba Lutheran Church led on Sundays by Rev. Fritz... and they have built a home for six children with disabilities on the seminary site... and on the hillside they built a dormitory where single seminary students and missionaries can live.

Each church in Santiago is using the basic tools we use—*Lutheran Service Book* for worship, Luther's *Small Catechism*, and the Bible—yet each congregation has a unique outreach depending on where they are. One church holds meetings after school on a baseball field, another holds monthly family events with food and devotions, while another offers home visits by the pastor (for the fathers) and deaconess (for the mothers). They bring Christ through their care.



This is the Lutheran Good Shepherd home. Many parents are unsure how to care for their children with disabilities, so they often are placed in government facilities. Our Lutheran churches are trying to provide an alternative with this home, providing personal care, teaching, and giving responsibilities to the six young men and women who live here. We got to meet them at the FORO.



Here is a small tobacco farm on a home property across the road from the Good Shepherd home. The country is known for its tobacco industry, and Dominican cigars are are a coveted commodity. Many Caribbean nations are known for their export of cigars, coffee, vanilla, and rum. These nations usually operate tourist areas which hide the poverty in which most residents live.



While growing up in the 1970's, I learned that two nations sharing the same island were very poor: Haiti and the Dominican Republic. Being in grade school, I really didn't understand the situation beyond seeing pictures.

The island historically named "Hispaniola" was first colonized by Spain. The western third was ceded to France in 1697 and eventually the people declared their independence in 1804, becoming the nation of Haiti. Those who lived in the eastern half continued under Spanish influence, eventually declaring their independence from Spain in 1821. While Haiti struggles, the DR has become the fastest-growing economy in Latin America since 1992.

I've now seen both sides of the island as a visitor. I went to Saint Marc in Haiti from 2013 to 2017 to provide theological education (teaching the Small Catechism and basic Christian doctrine) to pastors and teachers there. Due to violence in Haiti since 2018, I've been unable to return. Now I have visited the Dominican Republic for the first time, and have discovered there is real resonance with Lutheran Christian outreach among the people.

What did I take away from attending this forum? I met a dozen missionaries and pastors who serve people day after day in similar ways that I serve you here at St. Matthew. They lead worship and teach the community about Jesus Christ, opening the Scriptures with them. They interact every day with those who live nearby, listening and helping.

I learned that they are careful to remain confessional Lutherans who hold true to the Bible, study the *Book of Concord*, and use doctrinally pure materials in worship and teaching. I was so blessed to be in worship and hear the seminarians lead us through Spanish Matins from their *Lutheran Service Book*. Their sermons—spoken in Spanish and translated in real time in English—were spot on and meaningful, with both Law and Gospel.

I learned about specific ministries and projects our congregation might be able to support when we have mission funds available, or when we consider missionary support in an annual budget. It was good to see good news! We have a group of nine St. Matthew members going on a service mission trip in July, so more of us will see the DR in person. We have new friends in Christ (*amigos de Cristo*) to pray for.


How is your Spanish? You might be able to guess what the banner at left says:

- (1) \$100,000 for "Set Apart to Serve"—an LCMS initiative to form and recruit full-time church workers.

Notes from Deaconess

As March zooms by, I feel as though spring has somehow caught me by surprise. It seems as though my past planning included phrases like, 'when we get to spring, or 'once spring hits,' and I would say something that I wanted to figure out or finalize. It seems as though I have been treating 'spring' as an unused closet where I can store all my 'not–needed-now' thoughts or ideas. I'll get to those eventually...

And yet, spring has come. I look at my coming weeks and months with a deep breath: there is a lot planned! Perhaps you have these same thoughts and feelings...the end of school is coming, trips are being planned, work events are scheduled or deadlines are looming. The 'unused closet door' has been opened, and now a lot of expectations or actions seem to be tumbling out.

It is in these moments, when we struggle to not be overwhelmed or anxious, where it feels as though an easy thing to cut out (to save time, of course), is time in God's Word, in prayer, or by skipping church. And yet, I would encourage you to ignore that line of thinking and be even more intentional in reading God's Word, speaking to Him, and being in His House.

When we feel at our busiest, we often find ourselves wrestling with the First Commandment, even if we don't admit it: *I* need to finish this. *I* am handling this. *I* am in control. And yet, life is a gift and our relationships with others are gifts - all from God, the Gift Giver. Our needs are met in a loving and all-knowing God who spared not even His perfect Son in order to reconcile us with Him. In our moments of chaos and busy, God invites us to rest and receive.

Perhaps the busyness has already taken hold of your time and schedule and it seems overwhelming to start - how can I add one more thing, even an important thing like time in God's Word? Here are some things that I have found helpful and edifying, even in the midst of busy:

The Bible - have God's Word open on a table in your home: read a verse or two as you go about your day; commit to reading a verse a day at breakfast, read a chapter after dinner, etc.

Bible apps - many of these will even read the Bible aloud to you (car rides, while cooking, caring for an infant in the middle of the night, etc.)

Lutheran podcasts - Higher Things, Lutheran Hour Ministries, KFUO...these are just some examples of Lutheran resources that will give you God's Word through electronic means (through daily devotional emails, podcasts that can be listened to, sermons, etc.).

Other Lutheran devotional books: Pastor Otto speaks about Bo Giertz' book (To Live with Christ) which has daily devotions. The Treasury of Daily Prayer has daily Scripture readings. Pastor Matt Richard has written a book, Minute Messages, which has short devotions for the church seasons.

In short, *I would invite you to consider adding devotion and prayer time to the busyness of spring*. Remember that God is in control, His love and mercy are new for you every morning, your identity is in your Baptism, and it is in Him that you will have lasting peace and assurance.
