A Different Kind of Christmas

In the midst of the conflict between Israel and Hamas, I understand that Christmas will be observed differently in Bethlehem this year. Several news articles have shared the decision to cancel all public festivities in Bethlehem. It has been reported for example that for the first time since modern celebrations began, the birthplace of Jesus will not decorate the Manger Square tree.

An ambassador to the area wrote: "This year in Bethlehem, there will be no Christmas tree, choirs, lights or decorations. The 100-plus -year-old Christmas parade composed of marching bands and bagpipers from the parish scout troops has been canceled. Instead, by edict of the Patriarch and Church Heads of Jerusalem, this December will be very much like that first Christmas 2,000 years ago. No gifts, no celebrations, no fireworks or festivities-- Just a babe born on a deep winter night under a bright star."

The decision is understandable in many ways. In the face of conflict, terrorism, security concerns, and the rest, the twinkling lights and bagpipers on parade seem very far out of character with what so many are feeling in their hearts.

But for me the news from Bethlehem is a good reminder that while all of the external trappings of Christmas can be suspended or omitted entirely, the unchangeable reality of what happened there two millennia ago dare never be forgotten. When the parties are cancelled and the parades are stilled, the one part of Christmas that is absolutely essential is Jesus. Hope and salvation do not

come to us through our gift-giving and decorating but through the wonder of God coming in human flesh and blood to save us. The circumstances of the world may force the cancellation of festivities but thank God the world's circumstances did not cause God to cancel His plan to send a Savior.

Sadly, those of us living in a place of peace and prosperity can lose sight of that central truth. The story of Christ's coming can get increasingly pushed aside by all of our other activities as though Jesus was the disposable part of the celebration. But the news from Bethlehem is a sad reminder that for all of our Christmas card sentiment concerning "peace on earth," this world is still filled with much conflict. Maybe we don't even have to look to the other side of the world to see it, there may be enough conflict even in our own families to make the point clearly enough. In such a world now more than ever we are called to draw near to Christ who drew near to us. Peace on earth begins with the declaration of God's goodwill toward humanity revealed in the Child of Bethlehem.

This year's Christmas will be different in Bethlehem. Maybe it should be different in our homes as well. The ambassador said in Bethlehem the focus will be "Just a babe born on a deep winter night under a bright star." I think we would do well to center our celebration on the same thing.

May God bless you in this season of hope and joy as you fix your eyes on Christ. In Christ, Pastor Buchhorn



Annual Voters' Meeting Minutes Grace Lutheran Church November 19, 2023

Meeting was called to order by Mission Council President, Craig Evans.

Pastor Buchhorn led with an opening prayer.

There were 69 voting members, 3 college guests, and 10 children present at the meeting.

Secretary minutes from the November 13, 2022 meeting were reviewed. A motion to approve the minutes was made and seconded. The motion carried.

The nomination committee report was given listing the names of the nominees who accepted nomination and were willing to serve should they be elected. Craig called for any additional nominations to be presented. There being no additional nominations from the floor, a motion to accept the ballot as presented was made and seconded. The motion carried.

The assembly proceeded by casting their ballots. The following members were elected for 2024: Secretary-Michelle Ekberg, Treasurer-Louise Green, Elder(s) 2 Elected-Chad Janke and Chuck Potosnyak, Mission Council 2 Elected -Nick Diediker and Parker Janke.

REPORTS:

Written reports were presented from a variety of entities and officers. Please see the handout package distributed at the meeting for complete reports. Noted are points made during the meeting.

Treasurer's report: Louise Green presented the 2023 treasurer report. A motion was made and seconded to approve the treasurer's report. The motion carried.

Elder's report: The board of Elders' report was reviewed. Chuck Potosnyak highlighted the completion of the pictorial directory, and encouraged participation in the various Bible Study opportunities available to the congregation. The board of Elders along with others serves as the congregation's call committee so the associate pastor vacancy led to many additional meetings as a part of that group.

Preschool report from Rhonda Sebade: The written report was reviewed. Rhonda highlighted that a Thanksgiving program is scheduled on November 21, 2023 at 10:30 AM in the church basement with refreshments to follow. The preschool still would welcome volunteers to assist.

Lutheran High Northeast report from Julie Bose was reviewed. Craig highlighted the importance of Lutheran High fundraising events like Beef Blast which are essential for many aspects of the school.

Congregations for Concordia University, Nebraska (CCUNE) report from Sonya Tompkins was reviewed. Concordia had the largest number of incoming students in 50 years during 2023. All full-time students from CCUNE

congregation receive a \$1,150 scholarship for the 2023-24 school year. Grace presently has one of its members, Sarah Tompkins, studying to be a Lutheran school teacher at Concordia University.

Campus Ministry report by Craig Evans was reviewed. The next semester meal sign-up will be posted soon if you would like to provide a meal. Thanks were expressed to Dan and Bonnie Hansen for helping to coordinate the Sunday meals and for those who have prepared food for the meals.

The Memorial Committee report from KimBerly Hansen was reviewed. KimBerly highlighted the process by which decisions on memorial projects are made. A major project during 2023 was the kitchen appliance upgrade.

The Endowment Committee report from Craig Evans was reviewed. A brief explanation of the mission projects supported in 2023 was given along with the list of recommended 2024 grant recipients. The missionaries/entities recommended for a gift of \$5,000 each in this distribution include: Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool of Winnebago, Lutheran Hour Ministry, Alaska Missions for Christ, Rev. Daniel Conrad-Missionary to the Dominican Republic, Siouxland Hispanic Ministry, Rev. Brian & Keah Payne-Missionaries to Tanzania, Mainstreet Living-television ministry, Tuition assistance for Seminarian Riley Hlavac. A summary of the work presently being done by many of these recipients was included in the handout set.

The written circuit forum report and LCEF report were reviewed without further comment.

Written reports from auxiliary groups were reviewed.

During the Grace Lutheran Ladies Aid and LWML report from Ellen Heinemann mentioned the group does make Greeting cards including Christmas cards available for sale in the basement by the Sunday School office.

The Grace Altar Guild report included a mention that the group has coordinated a project to remake the Christmon Tree ornaments.

In addition to the written report the Kitchen Sisters expressed gratitude to those who helped supply food or who came to help serve when funeral meals are served.

The written Call Committee report from Chuck Potosnyak was reviewed which explained the call process for a Parish Assistant which led to the congregation extended a call to DCE Brian Pike from Lafayette, Indiana. The congregation was informed the day of the meeting that after prayerful consideration, Mr. Pike decided to decline the congregation's call. Given that decision, a discussion was held on the future direction for the Parish Assistant Call Process. We are also entering the time for completing applications to our colleges or seminaries if it is the congregation's desire to seek a candidate via one of these routes. Since calling an ordained minister from the field, a candidate for ordination completing their seminary training, a vicar, a commissioned minister from the field, a candidate for commissioning or a DCE intern each involves a different search process, the call committee felt it was desirable to see the direction the congregation preferred the call committee to focus on.

A straw poll was distributed to the voters concerning various possible ways to fill our called worker vacancy. The voters were asked to rank their preference from most to least desirable. The top preference was to pursue a candidate for ordination (a graduating seminary student). The call committee will now focus its efforts on this path forward.

The Congregation Chairman written report from Craig Evans was reviewed. He highlighted his gratitude to those that help behind the scenes to help make Grace run smoothly. Appreciation was also expressed to the outgoing Mission Council members for all of their help and contributions this past year. Craig also thanked Pastor Lilienkamp for his willingness to serve part time since his return from Alaska and to Pastor Buchhorn for his leadership.

Pastor Emeritus Lilienkamp added to his written report an expression of his prayer to finish his time of doing active ministry 'well'. He spoke of his mentor's and how they lived their final chapter's 'well'.

In addition to his written **Senior Pastor** report, Pastor Buchhorn thanked the many volunteers who helped on the variety of projects that the congregation was able to complete during the year including the donors who helped fund them. He offered a special word of thanks to Pastor Lilienkamp for his continuing service in our congregation on a part time basis since September. He also expressed gratitude to those serving on our congregation's call committee for their input and time given to the many extra meetings required..

The proposed budget for 2024 was presented and reviewed. The proposed budget anticipated total expenses for 2024 of \$489,294 which was an increase of approximately \$17,000 from 2023's budget. A motion to approve the proposed 2024 budget was made and seconded. The motion carried.

A Preschool Landscaping Proposal was discussed. As a part of a sprinkler system expansion in front of the preschool an old driveway was removed. A question concerning whether to retain the Main Street curb cut in front of the building by reinstalling a portion of the driveway or to eliminate the curb cut with solid curbing was presented to the voters. After discussion the voters were asked to choose between the two proposals. Option A which involves replacing the curb is to create a uniform grass area between the street and the sidewalk across the entirety of the church's property in front of the preschool received the majority of votes and will be followed up by the Mission Council. A preliminary bid for this work was \$2,700.

A motion was made and seconded to approve these grants from the Endowment Fund to the missionaries/entities recommended by the Endowment Grant Committee. The missionaries/entities recommended for a gift of \$5,000 each in this distribution include: Jesus Our Savior Lutheran Preschool of Winnebago, Lutheran Hour Ministry, Alaska Missions for Christ, Rev. Daniel Conrad-Missionary to the Dominican Republic, Siouxland Hispanic Ministry, Rev. Brian & Keah Payne-Missionaries to Tanzania, Mainstreet Living-television ministry, Tuition assistance for Seminarian Riley Hlavac. The motion was approved.

A motion was made, seconded and passed to adjourn the meeting.

The meeting concluded with the Lord's Prayer.
