"The Little Lutheran"



Did you know that Greenford Lutheran was a church founded on thanksgiving? Records show the organizational charter (and probably first official worship service in the newly constructed wood sided church) was signed on Thursday, November 25, 1841. Rather unusual for a "first service" and organizational charter signing to take place on a Thursday rather than a Sunday morning. Perhaps it was because the pastor, Rev. J. H. Hoffman served other start up congregations in the area and couldn't be there on a Sunday morn due to other commitments. I suspect the most likely explanation was a "new thing" was occurring in rural America at the time. More churches were celebrating Thanksgiving as a regular part

of their church year. In 1789 President George Washington had declared a day of thanksgiving for the nation (Thurs. Nov. 26, 1789). However, Washington's decree didn't carry the weight of a governmental requirement, but rather a beloved leader's recommendation. In his proclamation The President felt the necessity for such a day sprung from the Almighty's care of Americans prior to the Revolution, assistance to them in achieving independence, and help in establishing the constitutional government. Due to the nature of communications in those days not all citizens knew of the request and certainly not many heeded the recommendation. But as time passed more Christian worshipping communities across this every expanding nation saw not only the good advice of a beloved leader, but the spiritual sensibility of specifically setting aside a day to "Give thanks to the Lord for He is good."

Considering that "Thanksgiving" wasn't a national holiday, until Abraham Lincoln signed it into being in 1863, Greenford was some twenty years ahead of its time. That's humorous because a lot of people like to chide GLC for being in the "Greenford Bubble" and being 20 years behind the times! I like to argue that's not always the case with GLC. I've found many instances in GLC's history where the congregation was willing to be part of positive current trend. I suspect the first service being a Thanksgiving service was picking up on a trend in Christian communities to encourage successful farmers and businessmen to not forgot God's providence in the blessings they enjoyed. Did you know in the 1880's GLC minutes show the purchase of hymnal racks and hymnals. That's what churches were doing to make it easier to participate in worship and enjoy many of the "new songs" (Battle Hymn of the Republic, Away in a Manger, What a Friend We Have in Jesus to name a few). In the 1960's a sound system was installed and a line run to a speaker to a nearby house where a member who was paralyzed by polio lived. This enabled her to listen to the worship service. So COVID isn't the first time we broadcast our services! Shortly after the fellowship hall's new addition in the early 90's GLC used the new kitchen to host fellowship dinners for seniors. It died out after Meals on Wheels and such became available in the county but up until then it was ahead of its time filling a need. I don't' have enough space to list all the ways GLC has been innovative and taking risks in making ministry in God's name happen. I'm just thankful that it has been doing so for nearly 180 years!

So now we come to a congregational gathering close to Thanksgiving where we'll vote not only on leadership and finances for the upcoming year but possible changes in worship as well. Is God inviting us to be innovative again? I think so. Is God calling us to let go of traditional worship? I definitively don't think so. When that Greenford group gathered so many years ago on Thanksgiving eve to establish a new congregation I know they weren't giving up Sunday morning gatherings. Instead they were acknowledging and taking advantage of a good thing in their community—a movement on focusing on giving thanks to God. Hopefully this additional service isn't a replacement of old tried and true ways but rather an addition that acknowledges and takes advantage of a way to make Christ known to our community. I picture it as similar to other things in GLC's history like putting hymnals and hymn racks in the sanctuary in the 1880's or running a speaker wire from the newly installed sound system to a house bound neighbor to join in worship. Whatever your thoughts on the subject at least let us agree to gather this Nov thankful for those who "fought the good fight" before us and handed on such a rich legacy of God's love.


