Everyone knows the standard colors for Christmas are red and green. The red holly berries, the green Christmas tree. The red poinsettia on tables and the green roping on the stairways.

These are joyous vibrant colors that remind us of the joy and life that the birth of the Christ child at Christmas brings. Through God's gift of his only beloved Son, we have received- as the Gospel writer John likes to say- ""from his fullness we have all received grace upon grace." (John1:16)

"Grace upon grace" is great way to rephrase all that is right with our culture during this Christmas season. The red and green decorations seem to lift people's spirits during a time when light is fading and temperatures dropping. We tend to see more "Christmas cheer" lighting up our lives despite the crisp air and shortened daylight. Folks overall tend to be sharing generously with those less fortunate; whether its volunteering at a soup kitchen, donating to a jar at a check out counter, or dropping off warm clothes for homeless shelters. It seems apparent at this joyous time that most everyone is trying their best to bring light and love to the people around them. Sure there are those few "Grinches" and "Scrooges" but in general I'd say most people truly are trying to make it "The Most Wonderful Time of the Year!"

But there is another color for this time of year "Blue." I was reminded of this when I received a caring letter from the hospice organization that cared for my dad in his last days this past spring. They hadn't forgotten about me or my family's loss and wanted to give me permission to know a "Blue Christmas" is an appropriate décor for me this year.

I appreciated the sentiments and wondered what it would be like to not have his wisdom, wit, and healthy appetite around for the holidays this year? I had to admit considering his absence and that of several other departed love ones- who made Christmas past so special, I wondered if this year's colors could be anything other than blue?

In the midst of that "blueness" I realized that for liturgical Christians much of December is spent in the "blueness" of Advent. The four Sundays preceding

Christmas are the season of Advent. The choice of blue as its theme color is not simply a "gender reveal" preparation for the Holy Child. It has much more to do with the fact that blue is both a somber and hopeful color.

Blue is a color symbolizing both sea and sky. The blue of the sea gives us the idea of depth as well as struggle, serenity as well as storm. Is it any wonder "singing the blues" is our term for music that deals with the struggles in life?

The blue of the sky gives us the sense of uplifting, inspiring, potential, and hopeful. As in something we aspire to or hope for. Perhaps that's part of what's meant when we use the phrase "true blue." Something true blue can be trusted, relied upon, be a basis for hope. Or when we say "nothing but blue skyies" meaning we're looking forward with hope and anticipation to what's to come.

Dealing with the loss of a loved one can make our Christmas seem extremely blue and out of step with society's joyous festive red and green décor. But as liturgical Christians we can find solace in the blueness of Advent. It acknowledges and reflects our sorrow, struggle, and storms in life. And yet it also encourages us to look ahead with hope. Just as those faithful long ago in the midst of their blues looked ahead with hope to the blue sky days when a Messiah would come, (and Christ did— after all he's the reason for the season).

We modern Christians who often find ourselves in the midst of our blues, can look forward to the day when the Messiah will come again— to put all things right, to establish his Kingdom of Peace and Love and Grace; And he will., for we know his promises to be "true blue."

On the following page I've included the caring advice from the Hospice of the Valley letter I received. If you or someone you know is finding themselves in more of the "blue décor" of Christmas than the world's festive red and green. I encourage you to read and share this.



# WHAT WE NEED DURING GRIEF

#### TIME

You need time alone and time HOSPICE with others whom you trust and who will listen when you need to talk. It may take

months or sometimes years to feel and understand the feelings that go along with loss.

#### CARING

Try to allow yourself to accept the expressions of caring from others even though they may be uneasy and awkward. Helping a friend or relative suffering a similar loss may bring a feeling of closeness with that person.

#### **SECURITY**

Try to reduce or find help for financial or other stresses in your life. Allow yourself to be close to those you trust. Getting back into a routine helps but do things at your own pace.

#### PERMISSION TO BACKSLIDE

Sometimes, after a period of feeling good, we find ourselves returning back to the old feelings of extreme sadness, despair, or anger. This is the nature of grief; emotions go up and down, and it may happen over and over for some time. This happens because, as humans, we cannot take in the pain and make sense of our loss all at once. Therefore, we let it in a little at a time.

#### HOPE

You may find hope and comfort from those who have experienced a similar loss. Knowing what helped them, realizing that they have recovered, and that time does help, may give you hope. Know that sometime in the future your grief will be less raw and painful.

#### **SMALL PLEASURE**

Do not underestimate the healing effects of small pleasures. Sunsets, a walk in the woods, a favorite food — all are small steps toward regaining your pleasure in life.

#### **GOALS**

For a while, it will seem that much of life is without meaning. At times like these, small goals are helpful. Something to look forward to, like playing tennis with a friend next week, a movie tomorrow night, or a trip next month, helps you get through today. Living one day at a time is the rule of thumb. At first, don't be surprised if your enjoyment of these things isn't the same — this is normal. As time passes, you may want to work on longer-range goals to give some structure and direction to your life. If you are having trouble getting started guidance or counseling can be helpful.

# CONGREGATIONAL MEETING RESULTS:

On Sunday, November 21, following the worship service GLC held its annual fall congregational meeting. Thanks to

everyone in attendance, we had more than enough for our quorum. President **Ed Schaefer** began the meeting by thanking everyone for supporting our congregation and began with the first item of business which was reading the past congregational meeting minutes. The minutes were approved. The next item of business was voting on the proposed 2022 budget. President Schaefer went over line items that had the most change from the previous years explaining the council's reasons for making these changes.

Jennifer Schaefer along with the committee working on a second worship service made a presentation regarding the need for a second service and then proposed amending the budget to include an additional \$20,000 to provide the seed money to bring about this project. There was much discussion and then the vote was called.

Since the vote was by ballot the meeting moved on to the proposal for changing the worship times to allow for a second service on Sunday morning. After some brief comments this was also called to a vote. Since it was also by ballot the meeting moved on to the next item of business electing council members.

President Schaefer explained that four council members were completing their terms. Evan Schaefer agreed to serve for another two year term. While **Joanie Brooks, Chris Kondas, and Charlotte Fishback** were not running for another term for various reasons.

Nominations were accepted from the floor and after several minutes **Ann Myers, Madeline Hiner, and Angie Bowman** agreed to be candidates to serve on council. After the ballots were counted it was announced: the budget passed as amended, the proposed worship time change passed, and the three council candidates were elected. Meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer. Next Congregational meeting is set for **Sunday January 16, 2022** immediately following worship.

#### **POINSETTIA ORDERS:**



or stop into the office and pick up a form.

Speaking of Christmas Poinsettia's <u>did you know</u> as a symbol of Christmas, the Christmas Poinsettia is a completely American development. It was brought to the USA in 1836 by the U.S.'s first Minister to Mexico, Dr. Joel R. Poinsett, and was thus named after him. As it grew in the wild, the poinsettia was a wild, small weed. However, cultivation has produced the lovely flamboyant flower we know today.

Since we encourage you to take your sponsored poinsettia home following Christmas Eve worship we thought it might be helpful to share some "care and upkeep" advice. Poinsettias are sensitive, they drop leaves easily if caught in a breeze (like walking out to the car) so make sure they're covered before transporting. This sensitivity continues at home when they are left in a place with a warm or cool draft or in a room that is too cold or too hot. Water the soil thoroughly when necessary and avoid drafts. Be sure to remove or loosen the foil wrap around your pot to insure that the soil drains properly. With proper attention a poinsettia can bring the joy of Christmas all year round.
