At the start of every year one invariably sees lists of the TOP 10 or TOP 100 of the previous year regarding this, that, or the other. Perhaps it was the top selling books, the top 100 country artists, the top 10 most popular toys, or top 10 most popular tweets. As you glance down through the list you might resonate with some of the artists, songs, books, movies, or tweets that made the list. Perhaps you see some that you wonder, "who would care enough to add them to the list?" You might totally disagree with others or honestly have no clue who or what that entry is!

In general I find these lists fun to glance through. They give me a sense of what was going on during the year within our media, music, and culture. It's informative

to see what other people value or pay attention to and compare that to the things I pay attention to or value. As a Christian I'm always amazed at how many folks lavish attention on trivial matters and pay no attention to matters of eternal significance, like their soul. So I was glad to see a Top 100 Bible passages put together by Biblegateway.com (I've included their top 25 on the newsletter insert). However, it was discomforting to see an accompanying list by Barna Research about how often people read the Bible today compared to just a few years ago. It's scary! (see newsletter insert)

God's Word is something we should pay attention to and value every year, every day. But how many of us have God's Word on our phones as an APP to spend time with when we've got down time? Instead we have a our favorite games or social media to scroll through during our 'free time." I know I think of those down times as "me time." But what if we were to share a little of our me time with what I call "Thee Time"?

This past year I've been doing that and I've found myself blessed. Not because life has been easy: My dad died unexpectedly in Feb., Deb's mom's health is failing, COVID has hit our extended family. But despite all that, the majority of the year I've felt peaceful. I attribute that to being in God's Word and daily centering myself not on social media or national news or even mindless gaming but God. That daily dose and regular diet of God's Word is what keeps me purpose filled and peace full.

If you're wondering how you might move God's Word into your Top Ten this year, its not as hard as you think. Do you have a phone that keeps appointments and beeps, buzzes, or chimes when its time for that appointment? Consider simply setting it to go off once or twice a day just as a reminder to stop, breath in, breath out, recite your favorite bible passage (pick one from the Top 100 list) and then move on with your day. I have my phone set to go off at the traditional monastic "hours of the day" (6 am, 9am, 12 noon, 3 pm, 6 pm and 9 pm) just as a way to make sure I'm staying "centered." Sometimes this leads to long conversations with God but mostly it's just a moment with God. Whether its minutes with God or just a moment, it always seems to move me in the right direction. I find myself going from negative to positive, from nervous to peaceful, from narcissistic to altruistic.

Another habit I've developed is morning devotions. As an early riser that's what works for me, but I know of members who fit their devotional life into their lunch hour or bed time routine. The timing of the day isn't as important as making the time in your day. Our church provides two different devotional books free of charge. Both are designed to take as little as 2 minutes to as much as 15 minutes to read each day. Just reading the inspirational devotion for the day takes as little as two minutes. Add in reading the Bible passage its based on and/or spending time at the end in prayer can result in a very nurturing and satisfying spiritual 15 minutes. Considering all the stuff we experience in a 24 hour period that robs our joy and weakens our spirit doesn't it make sense to spend less than 1/4 of an hour of those 24 hours in "Thee Time" to offset that?

Of course our church offers very good Sunday morning Bible studies. Yet, I'm not sure folks who've never dipped their toes into the life giving water of God's Word, feel comfortable diving into the depths of God's Word in an hour long Bible Study. Maybe just encouraging people to take a baby step in the right direction of reading a little bit of the Bible consistently will lead to a journey that has lasting (eternal) consequences for the better? This year maybe your list of Top Ten priorities can include "read my bible more regularly" or "Have a little more THEE time." I'm sure God would love that and I'm sure it would result in more inner peace than moments spent on "candy crush." I'm also confident those moments of "Thee time" will provide more minutes of joy and inspiration than the "me time" spent on Twitter or Facebook.

JANUARY BENEVOLENCE: Samaritan's Purse

December 10, 2021 an unprecedented swarm of deadly nighttime tornadoes tore through several states, leaving a long trail of death and destruction. After watching this on the news, it's hard to imagine losing everything you have including sometimes your loved ones. As our hearts go out to the victims, we would like to support Samaritan's Purse for our benevolence in January. Their staff were on the ground less than 24 hours after the tornado, trying to assess the damage. They are working with local officials, emergency management and church partners to develop a strategic relief response in these hurting communities. Two Disaster Response Units — tractor trailer loads with equipment and supplies — are now there with another one on the way.

Please pray for emergency responders and ongoing search efforts; for the many people affected by these storms as they grieve and recover; for Samaritan Purse staff members as they assess the situation and begin to serve the hurting in Jesus' name.



The story of how Michael King Jr. became Martin Luther King Jr.

Martin Luther King Jr. was born 90 years ago, on Jan. 15, 1929. But the name on his original birth certificate — filed April 12, 1934, five years after King was born — was not Martin.

Nor was it Luther. In fact, for the first years of his life, he was Michael King. And it wasn't until he was 28 that, on July 23, 1957, his birth certificate was revised. The name Michael was crossed out, next to which someone printed carefully in black ink: "Martin Luther, Jr."

The story of how Michael became Martin began in 1934 when King's father, who then was known as the Rev. Michael King or M.L. King, was senior pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church and a prominent minister in Atlanta. In the summer of 1934, King's church sent him on a whirlwind trip. He traveled to Rome, Tunisia, Egypt, Jerusalem and Bethlehem before setting sail to Berlin, where he would attend a Baptist World Alliance meeting, according to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Research and Education Institute at Stanford University.

The trip to Germany, historians say, had a profound effect on the elder King. King arrived in Berlin a year after Adolf Hitler became chancellor. During his trip, the senior King toured the country where, in 1517, the German monk and theologian Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the Wittenberg castle church, challenging the Catholic Church. The act would lead to the Protestant Reformation, the revolution that would split Western Christianity.

All around him in Berlin, King Sr. was seeing the rise of Nazi Germany. The Baptist alliance responded to that hatred with a resolution deploring "all racial animosity, and every form of oppression or unfair discrimination toward the Jews, toward coloured people, or toward subject races in any part of the world."

When the senior King returned home in August 1934, he was a different man, said Clayborne Carson, director of the King Institute. It was sometime in this year that he changed his name and changed his son's name, too.

"It was a big deal for him to go there, to the birthplace of Protestantism," said Carson, who edited "The Autobiography of Martin Luther King, Jr.," which was compiled and written after King's assassination. "That probably implanted the idea of changing his name to Martin Luther King."

The act was almost biblical. "Jacob became Israel, Saul of Tarsus became Paul, Simon became Peter," Taylor Branch wrote in "Parting the Waters: America in the King Years 1954-63." "For Mike King, who had come to Atlanta smelling like a mule, the switch to Martin Luther King caught the feeling of his leap to the stars."

The elder King was born Michael King on Dec. 19, 1897, in Stockbridge, Ga., where his father worked on a plantation as a sharecropper, according to the King Institute. Mike King left the plantation after accusing the owner of cheating his father out of money. In Atlanta, Mike King remade himself. "You can see him becoming more and more prestigious," Carson, who was charged by King's estate to edit his papers, told The Washington Post in an interview. "When he marries Alberta, he is a modestly educated preacher without a significant church ... and probably a third-grade education until he goes to Morehouse College."

King Sr. graduated from Morehouse in 1930, and when his father-in-law died, he became pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church. "From that point on, he is pretty much consistently called M.L.," Carson said. Many black people in the South used initials; they didn't want to be called by their first names. If they had initials, it was not an option for white people to call black people by their names.

Scholars say there is no definitive account of why the senior King changed his name, Carson said. "Daddy King himself said he changed the name because he had an uncle named Martin and an uncle named Luther, and he was following his father's wishes to change the name," Carson said. "But it seems likely he was affected by the trip to Berlin because that would have brought him in the land of Martin Luther. I think the obvious reason is Martin Luther sounded more distinguished than Mike King."

But the younger King initially "shrank from it, commenting publicly only once, after the Montgomery bus boycott, that 'perhaps' he 'earned' his name," Branch said. "Reverend King supplied the wish and the preparation, but it remained for strangers in the world at large to impose Martin Luther King's name upon him."






