Seasonally Affected Disorder or S.A.D. is an illness many people suffer from. The lack of sunshine in the winter months can have more than a passing effect on people's moods. It can actually produce profound negative physical effects on them. Symptoms of S.A.D. can include: tiredness, fatigue, crying spells, irritability, trouble concentrating, body aches, loss of sex drive, inability to sleep, decreased activity levels, and overeating. When left untreated it can lead to a state of depression deep enough to produce suicidal thoughts and acts. Thankfully, despite the long gray days of winter, there are treatments that reduce and sometimes eliminate the negative effects of S.A.D. Folks don't have to endure or succumb to this illness if they just seek appropriate help and accept proper treatments.

I sometimes wonder if there is a similar type of spiritual illness that comes from an overexposure to the world's constantly gray depressing messages combined with a prolonged lack of exposure to THE SON, God's Son. Perhaps it could also be called SAD, Spiritually Affected Disorder? Symptoms could include: lethargy in loving others, self-doubt, self-loathing, inability to forgive, lack of purpose or a sense of inner peace, and nagging negative memories. Left untreated Spiritually Affected Disorder can lead to more serious life issues like severely broken relationships and endangering the direction of your eternal life.

Thankfully, despite our prolonged exposure to the world's "gray days," there are ways for us to reduce and eliminate its negative effects. As a pastor, I've seen positive results in folks who engaged in a spiritual health regimen of daily "soul vitamins" and weekly heart healthy activities. As you might have guessed the daily "soul vitamins" consist of moments of prayer and meditation as well as regular doses of devotional and scriptural reading. The weekly activity of joining other family members in praising God at Sunday worship does a good job of getting us outside (of ourselves) to enjoy the light of God's Son. In addition, many Sunday gatherings allow us to nourish ourselves with the sharing of God's meal. The Lord's Supper not only flushes out the deadly toxins of sin from our spirit but also nourishes us to share the light of God's love with others. In theory, if enough spiritually nourished Christians shared the light of God's love we might be able to stop the spread of this debilitating deadening spiritual disease, SAD, in its tracks all together.

Let's agree to take precautions against "SAD" this winter, See you Sunday,


Our current Wittenberg scholar is Corin Turkovich and she sent us greetings:

The church season between Christmas and the beginning of Lent is known as


Epiphany. A time when Jesus begins to reveal who he is to the world by calling disciples, performing miracles, and preaching God's Word.




SEASON OF LENT


The season of Lent comes early this year with Ash Wednesday landing on Wed. Mar 2. Council at its recent meeting approved hold-
