Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

When the calendar flips to May, you really get a sense that the season is changing. The heat goes off, the windows open (unless you need to guard against the pollen!), and sometimes you truly feel what they mean about spring being in the air. The end of school gets counted down. Yard work is in full bloom.

In the church year, this May brings us our last two great celebrations, Pentecost and Holy Trinity. The days that follow, over two dozen Sundays, are simply numbered "after Pentecost." We change our paraments to green to mark this season as one of growth. We celebrate on Pentecost (May 20 this year), the pouring out of the Holy Spirit upon all flesh. Then through our growing season, we focus on being built up in the Spirit, strengthening the roots of our faith and producing the fruits of love.

The first Sunday after Pentecost is Holy Trinity Sunday, when we say the Athanasian Creed, and celebrate the revelation that the Almighty is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, three persons, one God, now and forever. This celebration reminds us that our growth in love flows out of God's eternal triune love (see 1 John, especially 4:7-21).

As your years add up, I think you learn to enjoy what each season is for. A.E. Houseman wrote a beautiful little poem about just this theme. It begins:

Loveliest of trees the cherry now Is hung with bloom along the bough, And stands about the woodland ride Wearing white for Eastertide

The poem continues to count down how many more times he may get to go see the cherry in bloom, it happening only once a year. Fifty springs more will not be enough to treasure that sight, so he will go to see right now.

None of us know how many earthly years are left to us, fifty, five, or fewer still. We only know, in the faith, that Christ's death and resurrection means our final year of seeing the cherry blossoms will lead to the eternal joy of seeing the crowds of saints dressed in a more dazzling white still, a feast without end. In the meantime, we will soon change our altar paraments from the white of celebration, joy, and victory to the green of growth. What we seek is not the passing wonder of a bloom, but the steady growth of good habits, self-discipline, and enduring hope.

For those cherry trees really to shine, they need those summers of growth, branches reaching farther, trunks spreading wide, roots digging deep. Next Spring the white of Eastertide will be fuller yet. But only when, for now, we plan not just vacations and summer jobs but to grow in the God of all grace.

#### **GLUTEN-FREE COMMUNION**




#### **COLLECTING USED EYEGLASSES**

St. Paul teaches, "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Galatians 6:6).

And again, he says, "Do you not know that those who are employed in the temple service get their food from the temple, and those who serve at the altar share in the sacrificial offerings? In the same way, the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Corinthians 9:13–14).

In other words, ministers of the gospel are supported by the offerings of those who are served by them. And this is how the Church lives even now. It is standard practice.

But this deserves closer examination. For it instructs us not *just* that we are to give but also *what* we are to give. And it does so with four little words: "In the same way ..."

St. Paul is building his case for supporting the preachers of the Gospel with the sacrificial giving of individual members on the example of the Old Testament people who supported the Levites with their offerings and sacrifices.

We're to support the Gospel ministry "in the same way." But how did the Old Testament people support the Levites? Moses records this: "You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always" (Deuteronomy 14:22-23).

The Levites were supported by the tithe, 10 percent of all the yearly yield of that which was harvested.

Does that seem like a lot? Does it surprise you that St. Paul instructs us that we are to support the New Testament Gospel ministry "in the same way?"

If it does, ask yourself: is the Church's job in the New Testament bigger or smaller than the Levites' job in the Old Testament? Back then there was one Temple, and the ministry was almost exclusively located in one nation among the descendants of Abraham.

Jesus calls us to teach and baptize all nations (Matt. 28). And there are churches and ministries all around the world. How could we support this new Gospel ministry with anything less than the Israelites supported the Old Testament ministry?

Of course, we are free to give more, for we have received more than those in the Old Testament. We have received the fullness of God's revelation, the fullness of His salvation, the fulfillment of everything that God promised to do.

For we have received Christ, God's own Son, in the flesh, who took upon himself our sins and in exchange gave us his righteousness. The Father claimed us as his own in Holy Baptism.

He gathers us together in the place where his name dwells to feast on the first fruits of the resurrection, the risen and living body and blood of his Son, our Lord, Jesus. He reminds us that we are His, that all things are ours because we belong to Him. He blesses us here in time with physical and spiritual gifts.

In the same way, and in response to his fatherly divine goodness and mercy, we gladly give to those who proclaim to us "the excellencies of him who called us out of darkness and into his marvelous light."

For once we were not a people, but now we are God's people; once we had not received mercy, but now we have indeed (1 Peter 2:9-10).




## **LIFE QUOTES**




