Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Our Synod met in convention over the past several days. Officials are elected and issues discussed. Some issues are new and some are not.

Since 1959, ten times Synod conventions have passed similar resolutions as one that passed unanimously July 23, 2019: The LCMS "publicly [condemns] the sin of racism in all its manifestations." The resolution continued to mark racism as a sin of pride that "denies the biblical truth that all humanity has a common origin in Adam." So, we're encouraged to work toward racial reconciliation.

If you step back, it's sadly curious that Synod has felt it necessary to condemn racism ten times over 60 years. What is the staying power of racism? How can it seem so obviously wrong to so many and yet endure as a temptation with power?

I'm not sure I can answer those questions. Moreover, I'm not sure, the more we look, that there's any sin we've learned to leave behind. Furthermore, it is often when we feel most secure against a certain temptation that it sneaks up on us. Advances in technology have not been able to cure souls. Refined social structures have not eradicated greed, envy, or sloth.

In Romans 7, Paul talks about how the law and sin are connected. He begins in verse seven saying that he would have known covetousness had it not been for the commandment saying, "You shall not covet." But then, in verse eight, Paul adds this: "Sin seizing an opportunity through the commandment, produced in me all kinds of covetousness. For apart from the law, sin lies dead." Just a few verses later, he laments. "The very commandment that promised life proved to be death to me."

Part of us, when we hear something is wrong, wants to rebel. If we make ten more resolutions about racism, the true words won't change false hearts. Why do we make resolutions, then? There are several reasons. First, it is important in a time of moral flux to make it clear to any who want to know what we believe to be true. The law can act as a guide. Second, it is good to bolster public standards. The law can act as a curb. There is one more important reason. We reaffirm that every human being is made in the image of God, requiring not only respect but also love, and we do this to hold a mirror before our own selves. Social ills endure because not a one of us is fully healthy. The only One who is pure has ascended to the right hand of the Father, an anchor behind the veil to bring us home (Hebrews 6).

He is the One who will finally bring us all together, every tribe and nation, praising Him in every language, harmonized by the Holy Spirit, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" (Revelation 7:9-10).

When any persistent sin frustrates us, either in society at large or in our own personal lives, looking to the hope of the salvation we have in the Lamb not only restores our peace, but reminds us how He overcomes. He endured racial prejudice dying under a title of mockery, "King of the Jews." He is risen again, savior of all nations, king of kings, and prince of peace. In Him, we are more than conquerors (Revelation 2, Romans 8:37).

The Project Connect rack at the back of the church has been recently stocked. Please stop by and check out the pamphlets.


YOU KNOW YOU MIGHT BE A LUTHERAN IF...



THE LUTHERAN CHURCH—MISSOURI SYNOD LCMS STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY AUGUST 2019

Have you ever noticed the subtle ceremony of receiving the offerings during the Divine Service? The offerings are collected in plates or baskets, and they are brought forward and given to the pastor or an assistant. The pastor turns toward the altar, and, as he slightly bows his head, the offerings are raised slightly to the Lord and placed on the altar or an adjacent table.

Why do we have this ceremony? And what does it teach us? For that is what ceremony does – it teaches, as the Augsburg Confession tells us what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV, 1–3).

Originally, this ceremony included more than simply bringing forward what was collected in the offering plates. The elements for the Holy Communion – the bread and the wine – were brought forward with the offerings. The offerings and elements were lifted toward the Lord and placed upon the altar. The altar, now made a table, would be set for the Lord's Supper.

Gifts brought to the altar come from the sweat of His people's brow. They are the bread and wine, the fruits of His people's labor in this fallen world. After six days of labor and toil, the people are to bring a generous proportion for the Lord's work. Gifts set upon the altar are offered to the Lord for Him to take up and press into service for His gracious work.

For what is offered to the Lord from the sweat of His people's brow – the bread of anxious toil – comes back to us as the bread of life. The bread comes down from heaven that whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup will receive life through the forgiveness of their sins.

This is not unlike what the Lord did for His people in the Old Testament:

"You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, because the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the money for whatever you desire – oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household." (Deut. 14:22-26)

What a blessing! God provides for us in all things. He provides bread from the sweat of our brows. He receives this from us in the first-fruits offerings we give to Him in thanksgiving and praise, and He turns these into spiritual bread. He gives this heavenly bread – the bread of eternal life – back to us so we might have joy.

So, the next time you are in the Divine Service, watch this ceremony in wonder. The offerings we have given to Him, the Lord gives back to us in His supper so that we may rejoice in the salvation He won for us upon the cross.


