Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

October 31 is Reformation Day, remembering when Martin Luther posted 95 Theses on the Wittenberg church door. If you want to commemorate the Reformation, there are dozens of landmark days stretched over decades you could choose. There's little point in arguing which day.

But it can make your head spin to think about where Luther's mind was on October 31, 1517, about how little of what would come he either expected or planned. In 1517, Luther hoped and assumed that when church officials heard of indulgences, they would be as outraged as he was. In 1517, Luther believed that the pope would be a fair arbiter, wanting to remove church corruption. In 1517, Luther was no more than a university professor doing his small part in an academic debate. By 1520, all those expectations were turned on their heads.

If you think of other world events, you can see human beings aiming at their conclusions. Landing on the moon fifty years ago was declared a goal by President Kennedy and then planned and executed by NASA. Forming a more perfect union in the United States of America was a goal of patriots up and down the coast ready to cast off King George's tyranny. Nineteenth-century American writers like Walt Whitman glorified the American landscape, building an appreciation that led to National Park systems. When you follow those stories, there's often a fairly clear line from idea to conclusion. We realized what we should do, and then we did it.

The Reformation was not like that at all. Luther reacted to a crass corruption. Indulgences told people that when they gave money to specific deputies of the Roman church, their deceased loved ones could be spared suffering. Not a single part of that concept had any backing in the Bible. The Bible does not set up a transferable papal office. The Bible does not suggest offerings of money can cover other people's sins. The Bible does not say those who die in the faith suffer in purgatory. Yet Rome defended all of that while raking in money.

As Luther picked away at the first ugly scab of indulgences, he realized there was deeper corruption. It wasn't just that many church leaders were ready to manipulate others' beliefs for their greed. The bedrock teachings of the church had shifted from the foundation of the earlier churches. The grace of Jesus had been replaced with human striving. Luther didn't know what he was aiming for any more than a drowning man knows what his flailing arms will find to grasp.

Luther did not aim to leave the Roman Catholic communion. He tried to reform from within. Once the Lutherans were thrown out, they did not set up Luther as a pope or give anyone authority to direct how Reformation would play out. Instead, Luther went to work translating the Bible so that everyone could read for themselves. He penned catechisms that could be used in the home to summarize the basics of the Bible. They gave the aim and direction of Reformation over to the Word and Christians' faithful response to the Word.

That means that when we celebrate Reformation, we don't celebrate something that was completed on October 31, 1517. We celebrate something that began and must continue among us today. Our own dreams and aims, our own expectations and plans, must take the back seat to the Word. We must be in the Word, reading, praying, studying, worshipping. The Word remakes us, just as the Word made us in the beginning. The Word breathes back into us the Spirit of life. Where hope is restored, anything, not just a church, can rise again. Thanks be to God!







The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod

In the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther closed his eyes forever. And the hand that hammered the 95 Theses into the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517, penned its final words: "We are all beggars. This is true."

And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free. Ironic, isn't it? That, in order to be free, you must be a beggar; you must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas or birthday present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't much like being in someone's debt.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. But we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. And this is His legacy to the Christian Church. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

And, if we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything – forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This is not because of any worthiness or merit in us, but it is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace.

On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. And you receive. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the life-blood of the Christian Church. God justifies us, and He declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This is not because of our works; this is because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther would point us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars. But we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us, who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – even in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless, we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace.

So inexhaustible are the riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism and Holy Communion – that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are not only inexhaustibly satisfied but have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise. *LCMS Stewardship Ministry*
