Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

"Resolution" is a word with many meanings, but they all tend towards the idea of something being determined and set, like concrete hardening. An hour-long TV show comes to a resolution in the last few minutes, the murderer discovered, captured, and all peril over. A couple come to a resolution, rejecting two offers and accepting the last, putting in motion the sale of their home and move to a new location. Our New Year's resolutions reflect ideals we really want to put into action.

The funny thing is how "resolutions" often end up broken. The TV show starts the next episode with a new mystery, new murder, and new peril for the heroes. The bank doesn't come through and the sale falls apart. Our New Year's goals are too often forgotten by Super Bowl Sunday.

It's not just our world where firm intentions soften. In Jesus' parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15), both sons' resolve recedes before the father. Only the father's love remains firm. Jesus knew this wasn't a modern issue, but a human nature issue.

The first prodigal leaves his family behind to live in dissolution. When the money runs out and he's out of options, he makes a resolution. He'll go home and ask to be a servant in his father's house. At least the servants eat well. (And maybe pity will lead to him working his way back into his father's favor.)

Meanwhile, the second son looks like he's been resolutely good. He's worked day in and day out for his father. It's only when the first son returns, and the father welcomes him home that the second son rebels. He resolves not to go into the party being thrown for the profligate.

The genius of Jesus' parable is how the father interacts with both of these sons. There is no worry about the father's dignity. He runs to the unclean son and pleads with the self-righteous son. His love would crumble both their resolutions.

The son who would work his way back is instead received with grace. The son who complains he was always working is told that everything the father had was always his.

This is the great problem with approaching God by resolutions of our (fleeting) good intentions. We end up approaching God as a boss and our time with Him as a duty we must resolve to do. He doesn't want stern duty. He loves us and wants us to rejoice in love with Him and one another.

If you've made a resolution to come to church more or to read the Bible more or to pray more, these are all good as far as they go. Only don't let them limit God's response. We recognize the need to discipline our hearts and make regular time and space for God. But more than that, we come to expect His grace to override even our best intentions, for His love and goodness to pick up our feeble resolutions and make them glorious new beginnings.

He is the Rock that is higher than us (Psalm 61). His steadfast love is a sure refuge. In reading His Word we find wisdom and grace. In coming among His people, we find His Spirit building up and restoring. In prayer, we find His door open to us.





Newsletter Article - January 2020

Our God is a God who works through means. He can and has worked immediately without agency, as the Bible testifies, but primarily, on the whole and for the most part, our God works through means. He does this not only for all of our earthly needs but also for all of our spiritual needs. And He does this for our benefit.

He provides for all our needs of this body and life through means. He gives us fathers and mothers to care for us when we are young. Through them, God provides house and home, food and clothing, education and training in the arts and work of this world.

He gives us good government to protect us from harm and danger; He gives us faithful neighbors and good friends to help in times of need and lack. He gives us employers who trade our work for income so that we may acquire the needs of the body. He gives us brains and brawn so that we will have something to trade with those employers for that needed income. This work, which we are able to do only because of what God has provided to us, redounds to the benefit of others. And so, the cycle of God giving through means continues.

He provides for all our needs of our souls. He sent His Son into the flesh to be our Savior. In that body, our Lord Jesus Christ lived the life that God demands of us all – a life we have failed to live because of our sins – and, in that body, He made payment for those sins on the cross, once and for all.

God delivers this forgiveness through the means of His Word and Sacraments. He calls pastors to proclaim, in His stead and by His command, that our sins are forgiven for Jesus' sake. Through these same pastors, God Himself claims us as His own in Holy Baptism, placing His own name on us in water and Word, igniting faith by the gift of the Holy Spirit. And He gives us His life-giving body and blood to nourish us in this same faith until the end. Our God is a God who works through means.

This is true also of stewardship. This is what St. Paul wrote in Philippians:

"I have received full payment, and more. I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:18–19).

The gift St. Paul received from the Philippian church is a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. They gave to God. God provided for St. Paul through the Philippians. And the God who loves both Paul and the Philippians will supply their every need according to the riches in Christ Jesus. Our God is a God who works through means.

"For all the promises of God find their Yes in [Jesus Christ]," St. Paul tells us in 2 Cor. 1:20. This is true also of you. Trust in the God who provides for all that we need in body and soul through means. And not only will you find His "yes" to you, but others will find it, too, through you. "But as you excel in everything – in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you – see that you excel in this act of grace also" (2 Cor. 8:7).

The Ladies Group made shawls in November and delivered them to the residents of the Masonic Home in December. The shawls were filled with goodies for the resident. They focused on the residents that don't have family in the area and don't get many visitors.
