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Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ,

How much things have changed since I last addressed you in a newsletter! We've kept in touch in new ways since then. We've been on the phone with each other. We've been texting, emailing, and Facebook messaging, even letter writing. We've seen elements of Divine Service recorded on YouTube videos. We have participated in video-conferenced Bible studies. We thank God for all the old and new methods of communication we do have.

But there is something to gathering in person that we miss and will grow to miss as long as social distancing continues. Those who have gone to a sporting event in person, as opposed to watching on TV, will remember part of this. When the crowd cheers, when you are there, you are caught up with them.

It's something we try to approximate on Palm Sunday, the dynamic of the excited crowd. We process in. We wave palms. Children lead the singing of "All Glory, Laud and Honor." Ideally, our spirits would get caught up in the kingliness of our Savior. Worthy is the Name!

But even when we can all gather in one place, we can't catch the full experience of Jerusalem in the first century. Matthew 21 describes how the crowd began to move as one. Imagine how many men were moved to lay their cloaks for each ascending step up the mountain. And when they ran out of cloaks, the idea struck them to remove branches. They clambered up trees, working together to haul the wood. Let no step of His humble donkey be upon plain path!

How can those about other business not take notice? The crowd kept building. They were not quiet. Matthew says they were "shouting." They sang out "Hosanna," which means "help" or "save." Here comes the savior. Here comes help. How do you not gather? "And when He entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up," Matthew reports.

We've been seeing pictures of usually bustling cities unstirred, settled, and quiet. It's what we are doing together to fight a novel virus, one that infects and lays quiet long enough for you, unaware, to keep about your routines, infecting more and more before it grips your breath.

There will come a time when the bustle returns, but then most people will be back to their own routines. Imagine, instead, a city—Jerusalem—all stirred in the same direction, all gathered to ask, swirling towards that singular question, "Who is this Savior?"

He would reveal the answer to that question in the week that followed. He would teach marvelously, as no one else could match. They gathered to hear Him. He is a rabbi and prophet.

He would stop up temple traffic, overturning tables. The economic flow of Jerusalem was dammed before He regathered twelve around a table to give of Himself. He is reformer and restorer.

He would be betrayed and condemned, gathering His opponents in the cover of darkness. He submitted in persisting peace. He is the Lamb of God.

He would suffer and die crucified. Even as many fled, He gathered a new family of believers. He is Messiah, the shoot from the stump of Jesse.

He would rise from the dead, alive forevermore. He promises to gather us all from our graves. He is the new Adam, our light and our life.

Gathering around Him is what we do when we recognize Him aright. Paul celebrates the mystery of our sacramental gathering, "Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread" (1 Corinthians 10:17).

Brothers and sisters, the Spirit makes us a people together drawn to gather around His gifts. As much as we can do to provide daily bread from the Word, we will feel something missing. We are missing from each other. It's important to recognize that lack up front. Realizing we are missing something should spur us to do what we can to bridge the gap for the weeks that are ahead.

Indeed, the church has a rich history of learning to overcome forced separation. From John still pastoring churches from exile in Revelation to modern days, we have examples to follow. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran pastor who was imprisoned by the Nazis for opposing the Reich, wrote a book about Christian fellowship, Life Together. An entire chapter is on "life apart." He teaches, "It is easily forgotten that the fellowship of Christian brethren is a gift of grace, a gift from the Kingdom of God that any day may be taken from us...Therefore, let him who until now has had the privilege of living a common Christian life with other Christians praise God's grace from the bottom of his heart."

We need to work harder today than we did a month ago at maintaining the bonds of fellowship. We need to pass the peace by phone and card and message. I know we are all out of regular routines, all working on other things. But our life together is not inessential. Get those habits of home family devotion going on a daily basis. Sing together in the home.

This is not new advice. "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:15-16).

And when we do gather again in one place, our voices will rise together again, a crescendo of praise and thanksgiving. We will break bread and raise the cup of blessing. As David was once overcome in the procession of God's people, maybe even someone will be led to dancing (2 Samuel 6). I mean, probably not, because we'll still be Lutherans. But maybe someone will feel like it almost.

Brothers and sisters, the Good Shepherd is leading and guiding His flock. Our regathering in Shelbyville, when it comes, will simply be a foretaste of the great congregation He has in store for the Last Day when He returns. We will feast and sing with all the saints. David will be dancing. Abraham and Isaac will ascend the mountain fearless: "The Lamb has been provided!" John will be restored to the seven churches. And we, too, will be in that number.

Until then, I leave you with the reminder of the Catechism: "The kingdom of God certainly comes of itself without our prayer, but we pray in this petition that it may come to us also." Amen.



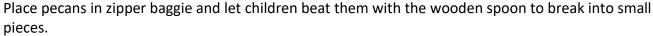

# **RESURRECTION COOKIES**

To be made the evening before Easter.

You need: 1c. whole pecans, 1 tsp. vinegar, 3 egg whites, pinch salt, 1c. sugar, zipper baggie, wooden spoon, tape, Bible.

### Preheat oven to 300 BEFORE BEGINNING.



Explain that after Jesus was arrested He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. Read John 19:1-3.

### Let each child smell the vinegar. Put 1 tsp. vinegar into mixing bowl.

Explain that when Jesus was thirsty on the cross he was given vinegar to drink. Read John 19:28-30.

### Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life.

Explain that Jesus gave His life to give us life. Read John 10:10-11.

### Sprinkle a little salt into each child's hand. Let them taste it and brush the rest into the bowl.

Explain that this represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. Read Luke 23:27.

So far the ingredients are not very appetizing.

### Add 1 c. sugar.

Explain that the sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know this and how to belong to Him. Read Ps. 34:8 and John 3:16.

### Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12 to 15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed.

Explain that the color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3.

### Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto wax paper covered cookie sheet.

Explain that each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. Read Matt. 27:57-60.

Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door and turn the oven OFF.

### Give each child a piece of tape and seal the oven door.


Explain that Jesus' tomb was sealed. Read Matt.27:65-66.

### GO TO BED!

Explain that they may feel sad to leave the cookies in the oven overnight Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. Read John 16:20 and 22.

On Easter morning, open the oven and give everyone a cookie.

Notice the cracked surface and take a bite. The cookies are hollow! On the first Easter Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty! Read Matt. 28:1-9

# The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod LCMS Stewardship Ministry

On the topic of stewardship, one of the most common questions a person might ask is *not* whether a Christian should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Of course, Christians should give to their church.

The most common question: "How much should I give?" But what they really mean is this: "Should Christians give a tithe of their income to their local congregation?" So, let's look at why you should or should not tithe.

Following are some reasons often offered for why Christians shouldn't give a tithe to their church.

Some say you shouldn't tithe because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. Lacking that command, there is no "Thus saith the Lord" and no "should" for giving a tithe to your congregation.

Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these, together with treasures (money), add up to more than a tithe.

Still others say they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church.

And there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of fear. If they tithe, they are afraid their gift will be misused, and they are afraid they won't have enough to get the things they use, want, or need.

Following are some reasons for why Christians should give a tithe to their church.

Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to give a tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to tithe and did. On top of this, St. Paul often describes the giving Christians are to do in similar terms as a tithe: a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of their income (1 Cor. 6:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? The reason for the Old Testament tithe was to support the full ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry.

What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther put in the *Small Catechism*'s Table of Duties to cover what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question about something entirely different. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? There, is after all, no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest we have, and it states simply for Christians to not neglect gathering together. Even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. It is the goal.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? I'd expect that conversation would be something like this: "I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life, and salvation, and to receive His gifts in the Word and the Sacraments. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it."

This same conversation is how we should approach the topic of the tithe. It's not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, the church is ecstatic that you're giving when you're giving in all these ways – time, talents, and treasures.
