Making peace by the blood of his cross — Colossians 1:15-20

Grace, peace, and mercy to you from the Lord, Jesus Christ!

In the era of World War I, nitrates were used both for gunpowder and fertilizer. When President Woodrow Wilson entered the United States in the war, his Secretary of State, William Jennings Bryan, resigned. Those against fighting believed we needed all the nitrates for farming and had none to spare for ammunition. From this debate was born the "guns or butter" language of economics.

We can apply this idea to the returning Hebrew exiles in 539 BC. Jerusalem had been destroyed and left barren. Those returning Jews had limited hours in a day. Every hour spent rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem was an hour not spent somewhere else. If you spent all your time cultivating olive and fig trees but had no wall or weapons, raiders could come and steal all the fruits of your labors. If you spent all your time rebuilding the walls, you'd have nothing worth defending. Somewhere between those two poles of guns and butter (or wall and fig vinaigrette), there was the right balance of hours in the day.

Societies are always debating how we allocate our time and our money on guns and butter. When someone asks if the moon landing was worth it or if that money should have gone to social programs, it's a guns or butter debate. When we talk about COVID lockdowns and keeping businesses afloat, it's a guns or butter debate (in this case defending against microbial invaders). There will always be someone who takes the position that there's no invader to fear: "More butter!" There will always be someone who takes the position that luxuries aren't nearly as important as life: "Guns for defense!" We generally work towards some kind of balance with which everyone can be disappointed, but not too disappointed.

But when those Jewish exiles returned to Jerusalem, the Lord did not see a two-dimensional curve where more guns meant less butter and vice versa. You can read about this in the books of Ezra, Nehemiah, Haggai, and Zechariah. Rather, the Lord saw a third way in which hours could be spent, a way that bolstered both their security and their satisfaction in life.

The whole point of coming back from exile was to build the city on the hill, to restore Zion. Every stone that went to the temple's foundation might look like a stone not laid in the walls. If you were stuck on guns versus butter, it would be easy to fall into seeing the temple as an item that took away from both guns and butter. The Lord understood it the opposite way. He would defend His people. He is our mighty fortress. He would fill His people with joy. His Word is sweeter than honey. Every hour spent rebuilding the temple was investment in both guns and butter.

Consider our world over the past year. Violent crime has risen sharply, in some cities as much as 50% higher. One study has found depression rates have tripled. Are these problems fixed just by handing out buttered biscuits or just by having a better armed police force? Or is the core problem the alienation and fear and despair taking hold during the past year? We have a God who draws

near to the alien, whose appearances regularly bring the message, "Be not afraid," and who publishes a Gospel of hope. In the 6th century before Christ, the Jews needed to build the temple. In our century, we need to build up the church. We need to reach out to our neighbors.

It starts with exiles returning home. We will not all return at the same pace. Every church has a lot of different kinds of people, each making decisions in their families with different factors in play. Our church will not be a place where members judge each other for returning to in-person gathering too quickly or too slowly. We know we need all kinds of people in our church. God gives us a variety of gifts. Wherever we are, we are lifting the whole church up in our prayers. We are keeping up the bonds

of fellowship through phone calls, social media links, cards, and more. Those who have been here for months are joyful in receiving back new returnees. We've had a lot of members coming in for private communions, while we also have a lot of other members learning to juggle masks and wooden serving blocks with our temporary Sunday communion set up. Either way, we who partake of the one bread are one body (1 Corinthians 10:17). We don't all see each other, but the Lord blesses the ties that bind.

Rebuilding the temple in Jerusalem took years. We pray that our rebuilding will not take so very long. At the same time, we also have a lot of labor ahead of us—not only to regather, but also to reach out to neighbors, co-workers, and friends. We all need the peace that surpasses understanding. We need the Spirit's strength to turn the other cheek when hurt. We need the release of being able to forgive through the grace of Jesus's cross. We need hope of eternal life and healing with the Lord. We need the bread from heaven, to gather at the table of the Lord. We need the joy of welcoming those receiving the second birth of water and the Spirit. We need to steady growth in the vine, studying Scriptures together. The "we" here is not just the we who were writing our names on pew pads one year ago, but the we of all the straying sheep whose Good Shepherd brings life.

So, while vaccines take hold and businesses find steadier streams of customers, we expect the old guns or butter debate will get another round of arguments. But we're not joining the wearisome arguments. We know the secret hack of the guns and butter curve. We know where our labors receive a blessing not just in this life but in the life to come. We are regathering Christ's church, rebuilding together at different paces but with a common goal. We want to share the powerful Gospel, with each other and our entire community. We don't want only to see all the faces we saw before in the pews beside us. We want also to add new faces to our fellowship. "The latter glory of this house shall be greater than the former, says the LORD of hosts. And in this place I will give peace, declares the LORD of hosts" (Haggai 2:9).

The prophet Haggai promised the Jews a rebuilding of a house of stones. That promise looked ahead to the temple of Jesus' body. We are now a house of living stones (1 Peter 2:5). Among us the glory of the new not only surpasses the old; rather, among us, gathered around Christ's gifts, He gives peace. Pray for this, brothers and sisters. Work for this. He will bless us in this work.



SUNDAY SCHOOL



Newsletter Article – March 2021

Hudson Taylor, a Nineteenth Century British missionary to China, is reported to have said, "God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word. Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Cor 10:5). Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life-giving, faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to gives thanks for His daily provision of it. God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned on the mount of the Lord it will be provided. The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return.

Thus, we set aside for the work of God a generous, first-fruits, proportion of the daily bread that God has given to us. This act of trust in the Lord's provision is the working out of our faith in Him. When budgetary discussions pop up our natural reaction is to point fingers. But remember your doctrine, and what your mother taught about pointing fingers. Our first natural reaction is not always right. In fact, when our thoughts are brought into captivity of Christ, our first reaction should be repentance. It should raise questions in our own lives. As good trees in Christ who are to bear good fruit, we should ask whether our thoughts have been taken captive by obedience to Christ. Have we given generously? Have we given our first-fruits? You know. And God knows. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron 16:9).

God will provide. He always has and He always will. He gives His meat in due season. He has not left you as orphans but has grafted you into His own family. You belong to Him. Remember this, letting this thought dwell in you richly. And you will then be rich toward others.
